Stewardship of People

"Follow me and I will make you fish for people!" -Mark 1:17

We heard this verse from Mark's gospel at the end of January. Fishing for people is a strange concept. Taken out of context, this idea might seem to be all about numbers. Catch and pile up as many people as you can! A closer look at Jesus' ministry reveals that he is not interested piling up people so that he can brag about how

many lives he's touched on the surface. He is interested in going deep—fishing within people to find and heal what is hurt and to draw out what is real and enduring.

At this year's Vestry retreat, we discerned a call to focus on stewardship of people. We, the people of St. Tim's, have such rich gifts in each other, such amazing resources waiting to be discovered. Some of us have been at the church for one Sunday, others for 25 years. On Sunday mornings, we each sit in our individual pews, brimming with potential, longing for someone to heal us where we hurt and to notice and draw out the best of who we are.

So how do we get from where we are, each at different points on our faith journey, longing to be transformed, to a place where we feel connected to each other as valued members of the body of Christ?

We begin by showing up and tuning our senses to those around us. We might notice that the person next to us has a strong voice or a child the same age as ours; we might see someone standing alone at coffee hour or uncertain during the service. We pray for the courage to make an introduction and to follow up with that person week by week. We can look for opportunities to build up community: eating with our parish family at the Pancake Supper on Shrove Tuesday and sitting next to someone we don't know; joining a small group to get to know others with similar passions for ministry; participating in the class Serving from the Heart to explore our own spiritual gifts and to recognize those of others.

At ordination, new priests are reminded, "You are to love and serve the people among whom you work, caring alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor" (BCP 531). These words are not just for clergy, but for the priesthood of all believers. They echo our charge from the baptismal covenant "to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves" (BCP 305). We are all called by Jesus to "fish for people," to be stewards of those around us, valuing each one as a true gift from God. As we engage in this work, we will find Christ healing what is hurt within us and drawing out the best of who we are as the body of Christ in this place.

Ministry of the Month: Vestry



In January, an orderly transfer of power took place not only in Washington, DC, but also right here at St. Timothy's as our 2009 Vestry assumed its duties. New members Cheryl Brock, Patrick Hobson, Kathy Lombard, Steve Page, and Vestry-Alternate Alain Bashore were elected at the January 11 annual meeting. They join returning Vestry members, as well as our Treasurer and our Registrar.

Immediately after the announcement of the election results, the new Vestry held its first meeting to elect the Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Treasurer and Registrar. The following weekend, a Vestry retreat held at the National Cathedral's College of Preachers offered Vestry and Clergy an opportunity to reflect on – and to discern how best to build towards – the future of St. Timothy's.

2009 Challenges and Goals

During the retreat, the group agreed on their overall goal: to build on the great achievements of 2008, especially in the area of Stewardship. (The group also remains aware that the current economic downturn is expected to have a financial impact.) Increasing St. Timothy's ministry to parishioners and to the community at large remains a continuing priority. Another key objective is welcoming newcomers, conveying to them the vitality of St. Timothy's church family and helping them feel at home. The group used the term "Stewardship of People" to help articulate its vision.

An important discussion centered on how the Vestry might better help St. Timothy's various ministries accomplish their missions – and how the ministries, in turn, might better support the needs of the parish. Understanding that ministries have natural lifecycles and that change is inherent in any lifecycle, the group intentionally examined current structures without preconceived notions. The Vestry will continue the dialogue, and is committed to keeping the parish informed of any potential updates.

Junior Warden Dave Hixon characterized the Vestry's inspiration throughout the retreat weekend with a quote, paraphrased from Abraham Lincoln and carved into the stone walls of the National Cathedral: "...without God's help, we cannot succeed; with God's help, we cannot fail." With Vestry leaders grounded in this belief, the year ahead holds great promise for St. Timothy's.

Vestry meetings are held on the fourth Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in Room B-1. These meetings are open to all church members. Requests to be on the agenda (e.g., for presentations or proposals) may be made to the Clergy and/or Wardens, and should be made at least one week prior to a meeting.

Vestry FYI

Did you know?

Vestry members are baptized Christians of at least 18 years of age, elected by the congregation to serve as the legal representatives of the parish in all matters concerning its corporate property and the relations of the parish to its Clergy.

The Vestry functions with 12 members. Vestry members may serve only one term of three years. Terms rotate, so that new members are elected every year. St. Timothy's elects its Vestry members during services preceding the annual parish meeting (on the second Sunday in January). On January 11, 2009, four new members were elected to our Vestry, to replace the four members who retired. The person ranked fifth in the election was designated as Vestry-Alternate for the coming year.

The Senior Warden (sometimes referred to as "the Rector's Warden") and the Junior Warden (sometimes referred to as "the People's Warden"), the Treasurer and the Registrar are elected by the Vestry and hold their positions for one year. The Wardens provide leadership within the Vestry, serve as "official" liaisons to the Clergy, and are authorized to sign checks on behalf of the church.

The Vestry-Alternate is encouraged to fully partake in Vestry meetings and discussions. Although the Alternate is not required to attend meetings and is not able to vote, the Alternate must be prepared to step in should a Vestry member withdraw during the year. In that case, the Alternate would serve until the next election.

Annual Vestry Retreat

Each year, on the weekend following Vestry elections, all Vestry members - returning and new - participate in a weekend retreat. In addition to the 12 members of the Vestry, the Rector, the Associate Rector, the Vestry-Alternate, the Treasurer, and the Registrar are also invited. For the past few years, the retreat has been held at the National Cathedral's College of Preachers. The retreat starts with dinner on Friday evening and concludes with Eucharist on Sunday morning. An invited presenter typically speaks on a pastoral or spiritual theme. This retreat and other activities help bind the Vestry as a working group, rather than merely a collection of people. (Even individuals who have been quite active at St. Timothy's may not have met other individuals who attend a different service. The retreat offers everyone an opportunity to become acquainted.)

Liaisons to the Ministries

Vestry members also assume a liaison function with one of the *nearly 30 ministries* at St. Timothy's. The Junior Warden serves as "Ad Hoc Liaison" to all ministries not served by a designated liaison. The Senior Warden is considered a member of every ministry and assists wherever necessary.

The liaison function is designed to provide a two-way communications channel between the Vestry and the ministry: to keep ministries aware of anything that might affect them, and to enable ministries to bring issues to the Vestry's attention. Liaisons generally attend their ministry's meetings and actively participate in ministry activities. Liaisons are also required to review and countersign any expense vouchers completed by their Ministry Chair. Liaison assignments are renewed every year at the Vestry retreat.

Some ministries also participate in Vestry-Ministry meetings. This successful innovation grew from the realization that – in addition to the good work of the liaisons – some ministries could benefit from enhanced communication with the larger parish, in order to stay informed and to avoid unnecessary duplication of effort.

Vestry Meetings

Vestry meetings, held monthly, are open to all church members.

Although not a member of the Vestry, the Rector proposes the agenda for comment prior to the meeting, and facilitates the group's working through it during the meeting, with the assistance of the Wardens. Meetings start with members being invited to share where "they have recently seen God in their life," followed by an inspired reading and prayer. The Treasurer reports on income, spending and any budget issues. The group then works through items of ongoing and existing business. Meetings conclude with the singing of the Doxology.

Invited guests and those who request to address the Vestry - such as individual parishioners, committee members and Ministry Chairs - may make presentations or proposals during Vestry meetings.

The Vestry at St. Timothy's is characterized by – and committed to – a stated resolve to work towards consensus. There have been very few motions that, once presented, have not been carried unanimously.

St. Timothy's is scheduled to provide meals and volunteers for the Hypothermia Homeless Shelter at the North County Human Services Building, 1850 Cameron Glen Drive, in Reston. Each Wednesday evening in February, we need to cater breakfast, lunch and dinner for 40 clients and serve dinner to the clients. A sign up sheet can be found in Henry Hall. We really need your help to meet our obligation to serve those in need in our community.

Food preparation guidelines, menu suggestions and full volunteer position descriptions are available. Many in our congregation volunteered at the shelter the past two years and we can let you know exactly what to expect. Preparing meals for our homeless neighbors is a wonderful activity to do with your St. Tim's ministry, family or friends. Children especially take pride in preparing bagged lunches and simple breakfasts. Serving dinner at the shelter on Wednesday evenings is an amazing opportunity to put a face on homelessness and we think you will be surprised who you meet. Most shelter clients are employed and have found themselves in an unimaginable situation due to the economy and high cost of housing in our region.

THANK YOU in advance for your caring and compassion, and for ensuring the success of the 2008/2009 North County Hypothermia Prevention Program. So many men and women in our community will receive shelter and a warm meal as a result of your time and efforts. The Closet - Reduce, Recycle and Volunteer

As the new volunteer coordinator for The Closet, I wanted to know the history, and thought you might like to read about it too.

The Closet was founded in 1974 by a handful of churches – St. Timothy's was one of the founding members – to assist low-income families by selling used clothing at a nominal price. Over the years, the mission has expanded and it has become a significant resource for the greater Herndon area. The Closet continues to be a source of low-cost clothing and household necessities for those on a tight budget. It also provides clothing at no charge to truly needy individuals and uses its profits to support worthwhile community programs. Items that don't sell are donated to needy communities in the western part of the state.

The Closet sells a wide variety of donated items, including clothes and shoes; housewares such as dishes, kitchenware and linens; electronics; sporting goods; books, videos, CD's and record albums; artwork and frames; toys; and knickknacks.

Collectors and antiques buffs like to check The Closet's shelves for unusual books, plates and collectibles. Bargain hunters often find brand-new or never-used merchandise at a fraction of the retail price. On shopping days, eager shoppers begin lining up outside before the store opens.

To donate items, drop by on Thursday or Saturday between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. You can help the small staff by donating only items that are in useable condition. We can't accept some items because of space limitations or health department regulations. (Check the website for more details www.theclosetinc.org). Reduce your clutter and recycle items by donating them to The Closet.

Members of St. Timothy can support The Closet in two ways - donating items and volunteering time to staff the store.

St. Timothy's is committed to providing volunteers two or three days a month. There are two shifts of two hours 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, and 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m. St. Timothy's is asked to provide two people for each shift. Volunteers help the paid staff with the running of The Closet.

Lent

The first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 25th. We will have three services – 6:30 a.m., 12:15 p.m., and 7:30 p.m. Ashes will be imposed at each service (on the forehead, in the form of a cross). Each service is also a Holy Eucharist. A sermon will be given at the 7:30 pm service.

The ashes, which were created from the palm branches used in last year's Palm Sunday service, remind us of our




mortality, the consequence of human sin, and of God's great love and mercy in Jesus Christ. During this season we therefore commit ourselves to "self-examination and repentance, [to] prayer, fasting, and self-

denial; and [to] reading and meditating on God's holy Word." Material will be made available to assist you through your Lenten journey.

This is a solemn season. The Church typically refrains from saying or singing "Alleluias," from the Sacramental celebrations of Baptism and Marriage, preferring a penitential tone for our Sunday services. However, God's people are not without joy. For we know Christ has risen. Jesus has conquered sin and death. Therefore every Sunday of the year is an Easter festival. The forty days of Lent do not include Sundays.

I don't need a Stephen Minister; I can handle everything by my self.

You don't know how wrong I was. A few of the Stephen Leaders knew me and knew about the load I was carrying. They said they could arrange for someone to talk with me on a strictly confidential basis. They were not there to lighten my burden, but just to provide someone to share my feelings with. Brave me, no, I did not need someone to talk with, I could handle this on my own. I did not feel I needed any help. There were many people needier than I.

When a Stephen Leader first approached me I had recently moved my mother and her unmarried brother into this area and put them in assisted living. They both suffered from advanced Alzheimer's. And at the time of their move, I was working close to 10 hours a day, making time every night to see both of them. This schedule went on for a year and a half, when I finally decided to retire. After retirement I spent 6 days a week at the nursing home, watching both of them fail, feeling totally helpless. My

mother had no idea who I was, I was just someone who came to visit every day. To this day my uncle still does not know who I am.

Hospice was finally called in and six months later my mother passed. By this time I was in overload. What hurt the most was that I was some stranger who came to visit every day. She always complained that her daughter never came to visit. I finally needed someone with whom to share my thoughts and hurt. I went back to the Stephen Leader and asked if we could talk.

A couple of weeks after the funeral my Stephen Minister and I had our first visit. When we first met I was very apprehensive about what to do or say. But as the meeting progressed it became easy to put into words the various things on my mind. I was able to finally share the hurt I was feeling with someone outside of my immediate family. I was able to share how totally powerless I felt against such a devastating disease. She was a great listener and did not judge how I had cared for my mother.

I now realize that I didn't have to be extremely "needy" to deserve a Stephen Minister, and that the relationship doesn't have to be for several years. Sometimes even our minor daily difficulties can mount up and become such a burden that it is difficult to carry on as usual. It sure is helpful to know that at those times we have an active Stephen Ministry in our Church that can meet with us, pray with us and for us, and assist us to work out our difficulties by helping us with our own processes.

So, like a lot of other folks who may have turned down an offer of a Stephen Minister, or who never even considered it: "I don't need a Stephen Minister" but I'm sure glad I talked with one.


Feed Our Teens [Except during the 30-Hour Famine]
