The Season of Lent is Upon Us

The Season of Lent (which comes from the Anglo-Saxon word for lengthen, acknowledging the lengthen-

ing of daylight) begins this year on March 1st and continues for forty days until Easter (Sundays are not considered days of Lent). The final week of Lent is called Holy Week. During Lent we remember the love of God exemplified in our Savior's willingness to suffer and die for



us. Thus our worship has a penitential and grateful tone. Ash Wednesday (so called because ashes are imposed on our foreheads as a sign of mortality and penitence) is the first day of Lent. We will have three services on Ash Wednesday - 6:30 am, 12:15 pm, and 7:30 pm. We will also have a 7:30 pm service on Maundy Thursday, April 13th (the word "Maundy" comes form the Latin mandatum which means mandate or command, as in Jesus' exhortation "to love one another as I love you"). And we will have two services on April 14th, Good Friday, at 12:15 pm and 7:30 pm (the word "Good" refers to what Jesus did, not what was done to him). At 12:15 pm we will review and pray through "The Stations of the Cross." At 7:30 pm we will hear the Gospel account of the Crucifixion and offer solemn prayers. To fully appreciate the miraculous gift of the Resurrection on Easter (April 16th) we must journey with our Savior through these forty days, hear the Scripture account of his final days as a human, acknowledge the great love that compelled Jesus to give his life for us. All of our Sunday services, including Easter, will be at the regular times of 8:00 am, 9:30 am, and 11:00 am. Come and worship with us, and invite family and friends to come with you.



Bishop's Visit on March 19

With the retirement of our Assistant From the Bishop Frank Gray our Diocesan Bishop Peter J. Lee and Suffragan Bishop David C. Jones have had to change their schedule of visitations (the Diocese of Virginia is the largest Diocese in the Episcopal Church comprising 195 congregations and 90,000 Episcopalians). So, instead of greeting one of our



Bishops as we usually do in late Fall, our 2006 visit will be March 19th. And instead of having one of our own Bishops we will welcome Bishop Ted Eastman, retired Bishop of Maryland. Bishop Eastman was Fr. Brad's Bishop when he served a Church in the Diocese of Maryland. And Bishop Eastman was the preacher when Fr. Brad was installed as our Rector. Because we just had Bishop Jones in December, we will not present anyone for Confirmation or to be Received on March 19th. We will all renew our Baptismal vows. Bishop Eastman will preach and celebrate at our 11:00 am service. There will be a reception at 12:30 pm.

Lenten Study Group

We will have a Lenten study and discussion group on the five Sunday evenings of Lent, March 5th through April 2nd, from 7:00 to 8:30 pm. The discussion will be based on Frederick Buechner's book The Faces of Jesus, A Life Story. Participants are encouraged to purchase the book (the best price I've found is amazon.com) and read the first two chapters (Annunciation and Nativity) before our initial meeting. There is no sign-up sheet. Show up and be prepared to learn and talk about Jesus.

Organ Committee Notes

—Fr. Brad

Because we have an extraordinarily gifted Music Director, most of us haven't noticed that our beloved Tracker organ is ailing. It is, after all, 143 years old. The organ originally belonged to the First Unitarian Church in Barre Massachusetts. The Church was going to be demolished for a parking lot, so the Board of Trustees started looking for a home for their Tracker. This came to the attention of members of St. Timothy's who subsequently traveled to Massachusetts, completely dis-



Therefore, with God's help, we will: open our doors, enhance our worship, and increase our involvement through all of our ministries. mantled the organ, transported it to Herndon, and spent more than a year reconditioning and re-assembling it. Our parish hall was then the sanctuary. A hole had to be cut in the ceiling to accommodate the instrument. Approximately 12 years later the Tracker was disassembled again for relocation in the new (current) sanctuary. A pit was constructed for the organ. The historic Tracker was originally constructed in 1863 and has served St. Timothy's for 37 years.

Organs, like all things, have a limited life-span. In recent years the cost of maintaining our organ has increased dramatically, and problems have become a regular feature. The organ is wearing out. Replacement parts have to be hand made or purchased from other organ companies and adapted. Tuning has become a serious problem. Expenses will continue to rise. Much of our music is now planned around what is and is not working.

A committee has been assembled to learn more about pipe organs (Peter is a great teacher!) – different kinds of organs, how they work, the usual maintenance required, and their projected life span. The committee consists of our Music Director, an engineer, an architect, a member of the Vestry, a member of our Finance ministry, and our Rector. The committee reported to the Vestry in a special meeting on February 13th. Then, at a regular meeting on February 27th the Vestry decided that the congregation should be invited to an open forum to learn about the organ, ask questions, and express views. The Vestry also planned to meet on Saturday, March 18th to consider all of the priorities of the Church. Meanwhile, the organ committee will continue to gather information and keep the Vestry informed. Please watch for information about an open congregational meeting.

We thank God for our Tracker organ, for the wonderful folks who retrieved it, rebuilt it, and installed it – for 37 years of service and inspiration! We thank God for our Music Director, Peter Waggoner - for his expertise and patience! We pray for the wisdom to be good stewards, and the faith to provide excellent musical support for generations of God's people!

9 January 2006 Dear Brad and the People of St. Timothy's:

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ, and may you and all the people of St. Timothy's be filled with God's blessings in this holy season of Epiphany.

I want to begin with the good news that we have all been waiting for: I at last have my Temporary Residency visa and work permit, and will be allowed to stay in Sudan for the next year! This is a huge accomplishment for all of us here in Sudan; my permit is only the 176th granted since this government came to power in 1983.

With that good news, I send you great thanks for all of your prayers and support. Because of both, I was able to return to Sudan, and through both I am sustained here in my ministry to the people of the Diocese of Renk, and on behalf of the people of St. Timothy's. I could not be here without your support, and I am deeply grateful.

I have been most warmly welcomed home in Sudan - people stop me on the street several times a day to greet me, to ask after my health (word spread quickly here that I was in the hospital there), and thank God for my return, and for all of the blessings you have bestowed upon them, both in gifts and prayers.

The tremendous gift you bestowed upon me during my visit — \$1,461 - has been combined with other money raised in the United States to be used to work on completing the Chapel of St. Michael at the Renk Bible College. Because of expenses and other work that needed to be done, we had to suspend work on the chapel last year. Now, with your help, we hope to put on the roof, pour a floor and perhaps install windows and doors before the end of this year.

Our work here in Renk continues to blossom. Right now, we have three teachers from the United States - the Rev. Shirley Smith Graham from Christ Church, Alexandria, and Duke graduate students Chad Eggleston and Mandy McMichael - teaching an intensive Hebrew course at the Renk Bible College. (They are the ones bringing this letter home to mail to you.)

We continue to work on the construction of the Cathedral of St. Matthew in Renk, which will be consecrated on 28 February by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Archbishop of Sudan, Bishop Daniel Deng Bul of Renk and Bishop Frank Gray, along with eight other Americans. Several from the American group will be made honorary Canons of the Cathedral at the service.

Just yesterday. Archdeacon Guliver traveled to the small town of Wadakona, about an hour south of here by boat, to baptize 22 new members of the Episcopal Church. Our many small parishes are flourishing, and on St. Stephen's Day, Bishop Daniel opened a new parish in Jelhak, with Father Titus Wai installed as the new vicar.

The only real problem we have encountered since my return has been a complete absence of a functioning Internet here in South Sudan. Try as we might, we cannot get a connection, which means that in the near future, our communications will be somewhat limited. However, through prayer and diligent work, we believe that even this problem will be overcome shortly.

I send you the greetings of Bishop Daniel Deng Bul, of the students and faculty of the Renk Bible College, of the people of the Diocese of Renk and the people of South Sudan, all of whom give thanks for you and pray for God's blessings in your lives. Please know that we think of you constantly and give thanks to God for bringing us together.

We visit those who are hospitalized or home bound. We work in the background.

What can you do? We are in need of Helping Hand members. Be part of as many or as few of the areas as you wish. Be on call for special needs. We need committee members, those who are willing to come to meetings on the **third Saturday of each month** to help keep things organized. (Helping Hands are always welcome to come and you can be part of both!) Pastoral Care needs you.



Living At The Time Of Christ

It is simply amazing that, even today, there are those living among us that were alive during Christ's time here on Earth. The Giant Sequoias in the Sierra Nevada range date back thousands of years and are among the largest, oldest, and most beautiful living things on Earth. In 2000, the Giant Sequoia National Monument was created by Presidential Proclamation. Within the boundaries of this new National Monument lie about half of the world's remaining groves of Giant Sequoias. Unfortunately, the current Administration and the U.S. Forest Service are acting on a new plan that would allow destructive logging and road building to occur within the boundaries of this National Monument - the granting to logging companies to build roads and clear-cut hundreds of openings two acres large throughout the Monument – up to 3,000 logging trucks a year worth of timber. Old growth forests in the Sierra Nevada have already been reduced, by some estimates, as much as 85 percent as a result of logging on National Forest and private timberlands. What can we do to protect God's Creation. First and foremost, become "aware" of the issues. Second, become involved, take action, speak out. Finally, pray that we may be responsible and caring Stewards for today and future generations.

The Youth Group and their annual trip to the Dungannon region in southwest Virginia. Dunngannon is one of the poorest regions in the state. Here, the Youth spend a week renovating substandard houses and developing interpersonal skills that will stay with them for a lifetime.

The Lakota Mission Team and their annual trip to the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. Pine Ridge is one of the poorest counties in the country. The team spends a week on the reservation, developing relationships, experiencing the Native American life style and repairing houses in the area.

The Habitat for Humanity International/Domestic Team and their trip to Florida. This year the team is focusing on helping rebuild an area still recovering from storm damage from over a year ago. Last year the team spent a week in Botswana, Africa building two homes for families.

The Service Ministry asks your support for these three groups of dedicated individuals who are striving to make a difference in the world. During March and April, you will hear from representatives from these groups who will tell you about their mission and their individual experiences. In the Sunday Bulletin you will find the yellow Agape envelopes. The groups thank you for your support and look forward to another years journey into the world as members of your congregation, to help with their hands and spread the love of Christ among those who need their help the most.




