Let Us Focus On Our Faith

I receive a fair number of emails, articles, and letters about current events in the Episcopal Church, and I appreciate this very much. It shows me that the members of St. Timothy's really care about the mission of God in Christ. Like many of you, I find the news alarming – not however because the Anglican Communion is divided (we've always held very different views), not because the news reports are so inflammatory and biased (sensationalism sells), not even because of the posturing, grandstanding, and power-grabbing going on (as unfortunately common in the Church as any other arena).

Yes, there is a lot at stake right now. The Episcopal Church's connection to the rest of the Anglican Communion is in question (it's been tenuous by the way since we first got together in 1886). In this country a half-dozen or so out of 110 Dioceses would like "alternative Primatial oversight." And 11 congregations in this Diocese have voted to separate from the other 184 congregations.

What really disturbs me is how distracting all of this is.

We still worship God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit. We still read the Bible and accept it as the inspired Word of God. We still profess the faith recorded in the Nicene and Apostle's Creeds. We still acknowledge our call to "proclaim by word and deed the Good News of God in Christ", to "seek and serve Christ in all persons loving our neighbors as ourselves", to "strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being." Nothing has changed.

In John's Gospel Jesus prays before his crucifixion that his disciples might be one as he (Jesus) and God are one. And then he gave his life. I believe our Savior created an indissoluble bond on the cross with his Body and Blood. I believe Christ unites us with God and one another for ever. Like it or not we are sisters and brothers in Christ, adopted children of God.

The Church has been splitting and reforming from the very beginning. God is still doing "a new thing", and God still has absolute dominion. Now and always, we are called to focus on Jesus Christ, and on the mission that has been entrusted to us – nothing more and nothing less. By all means keep up with the news, pray for the Anglican Communion, the Episcopal Church, and the Diocese of Virginia.

Storms will rise and subside. But do not lose heart. God will prevail. God will triumph. Our task is to remain faithful.

Journey To Jerusalem

The phrase "Lenten journey" brings up images for me of an introspective journey. Lent is a time of reflection and personal examination, but since the early Church, the Lenten journey has also been communal. By 350, pilgrimages to Jerusalem had become popular, especially in this season leading up to Easter.¹ The church then was by no means peaceful. Doctrinal wars erupted among bishops. Cyril, the Bishop of Jerusalem, was exiled three times. However, Cyril stayed focused on the communal journey instead of on personal rancor. He published instruction books for people preparing for baptism so that new converts could walk through the questions of their faith together before being baptized early on Easter morning. He is often credited with helping to develop the liturgies for Lent and Holy Week.² These early liturgies are the basis for the Holy Week services in our prayer book.

From the beginning, Christians have longed to do more than simply think about their faith; through worship and faith formation, they have literally walked the way of the cross together. This month at St. Tim's, we prepare again together to walk the way of the cross. In our Lenten preparation, we will wrestle with difficult Bible passages on Sunday evenings, stay up late serving at the Hypothermia shelter, and join other churches in Herndon to experience Tetélestai, a contemporary dramatic portrayal of Christ's Passion. As we journey together, we will grow stronger inwardly while turning our attention to others in our community who are with us on this Christian journey. In the end, if we focus on Christ and follow in his steps instead of fighting about who belongs on the journey, he will lead us all home.

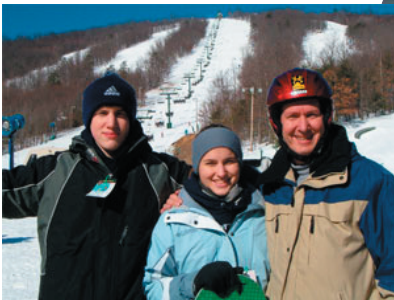

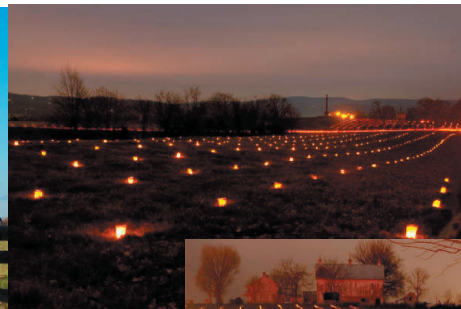
St. Timothy's Goes Skiing

March / April Agape -

The March and April Agape is dedicated to St. Timothy's three Mission groups: the Youth Group's Dungannon trip, the Lakota Mission Team, and the Habitat for Humanity International/Domestic Team. The three groups will benefit greatly from your generous donations. Below are brief descriptions of the Mission groups.

Youth Group's trip to the Dungannon

Dungannon is one of the poorest regions in southwest Virginia. Here, the Youth spend a week renovating substandard houses and developing interpersonal skills that will stay with them for a lifetime.

Lakota Mission Team

The team makes an annual trip to the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. Pine Ridge is one of the poorest counties in the country. The team spends a week on the reservation, developing relationships, experiencing the Native American lifestyle and repairing houses in the area. This year the Lakota Team will make two trips, one in the spring and one in the fall.

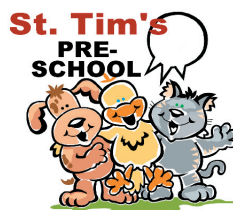
Habitat for Humanity International/Domestic Team.

They expect a maximum of 25 homeless adults to use this facility each evening.

As a Sponsoring Religious Organization, St. Timothy's has the Mondays in March to provide meals (dinner, breakfast and lunch) and volunteers for the evening shift (5 – 10:30 p.m.).

New Name, New Location, Our Mission Remains the Same.

The Herndon Free Clinic has changed its name to honor our founder and to acknowledge the broad support we receive from NW Fairfax county. We are now the **Jeanie Schmidt Free Clinic**. Through support from many in the community, including St Timothy's Episcopal Church, we are able to move into our own designated space as of March 1. We will be expanding our services to low income, uninsured members of the Herndon, Reston, Chantilly and Centreville communities at our clinics at 500 Grove St Herndon VA 20170. In recent months the Service ministry, on behalf of the congregation, has prepared and donated a meal for the clinic volunteers, sponsored a waiting room chair by donating \$100 for a plaque which reads, "From the people of St Timothy's Episcopal Church" to be placed on the wood base, donated \$800 from the Souper Bowl of Caring co-sponsored by the Youth Group, and has offered to support and participate in the upcoming Ribbon Cutting Event on March 7 and Open House on April 22. The volunteers, staff and patients of the JSFC are very grateful for the support St Timothy's provides through your prayers, volunteers, supplies, and much needed funds.

Antietam Memorial Illumination

On December 2, 2006 teenagers and adults from St. Timothy's Youth Group participated in the 18th Annual Antietam National Battlefield Memorial Illumination. This event is sponsored to remember the Civil War soldiers who were wounded or lost their lives at the Battle of Antietam, in a single day on September 17, 1862. We joined more than 1000 other volunteers from around the area, in placing 23,110 bags with candles aligned on the battlefield at 15-ft intervals. In late afternoon, the group lit the approximately 700 illuminaries that they were responsible for in their section of the battlefield. When dusk fell they made the field shine like stars in the sky in remembrance of those who sacrificed their lives or were wounded.

This was the Youth Group's ninth year participating in this service oriented event. Each year, those who participate camp out at Mapletree Campground in cabins heated by wood burning stoves. They cook their own food and have an outdoor Sunday Service.

We would like to extend our appreciation to those adults who went this year and provided the transportation. A special thanks goes to Mike Colie and Rick Wilson who were the parent coordinators. The Rev. Leslie Chadwick also was able to come up for the day to help. As is tradition a picture, of this year's illumination (provided by Valley Studio) is hanging in the hallway of the Narthex.

News – Time Sensitive

Editor's Comments: Our Global Warming has been losing out to the snow during the past several weeks. We have been enjoying Rev.
