Our Faith

Have the actual bones of Jesus and his family been found? That's the current question. A group of ossuaries were recently discovered in a subterranean "cave." And what really caused a stir is these ossuaries were inscribed with the names of Jesus, Mary, Joseph, etc. While this is fairly sensational, it has been noted that these were common names, and that there is no method for verifying, one way or another, if one of these ossuaries contains actual remains of the Jesus of Christian faith. We can only speculate.

Claims about Jesus of Nazareth – that he was/is the Son of God, God incarnate, miracle worker, Messiah, Christ, resurrected Savior, ascended Sovereign – raised questions from the very beginning. Our sacred writings (i.e., The Bible) make it clear that his closest associates "doubted." The religious establishment "refused to believe." The Apostles proclamations about him were viewed with suspicion. Through the ensuing years who he was (is), what he did (does), has been studied from every conceivable angle. Bottom line; there is no "proof." Some people believe, and some people don't.

However, even the most ardent believer must admit that the assertions about Jesus are fantastic. They defy natural law and press credibility to the limit. Was he the Supreme Being in the flesh? Did he heal people instantaneously? Did he create food out of nothing? Did he raise the dead? Did he rise from death, and ascend to Heaven? Eye witnesses say "yes." Believers say "yes." It is a matter of faith.

According to the Gospels people in his own time asked for proof, irrefutable signs and displays of his godness. And he was tempted – to turn stones into bread and feed all of the world's starving people, to throw himself down from the pinnacle of the Temple and prove, once and for all, that he is the holy one of God. Even as he hung on the cross spectators challenge him to "Come down from the cross." He was taunted, "Save yourself and us." Jesus himself realized that all the miracles he performed were not enough to convince those who just wouldn't believe.

When Pontius Pilate asked Jesus "What is truth?" Jesus was silent. Presumably there was nothing left to say. What words would convince this man? "The Way, the Truth, and the Life" stood before the Roman Procurator, but all he saw was a beaten man. *cont. on pg2, col.1*

Now the Green Blade Riseth

At the beginning of every spring, I think of my favorite scene from C.S. Lewis' book The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe. Aslan, a great lion and the true king of Narnia, has been killed by the White Witch, and the children who love him are bereft. Suddenly, they hear a great crack and see that the stone table on which Aslan was sacrificed has broken in two. Aslan appears to them, raised from the dead. He greets the children and then plays with them in the meadow. Everywhere he leaps, new flowers spring up.

As I walk in the cool mornings and see new flowers in clusters on the grass, defying winter, I think, "Aslan has been here!" In this time of year as Lent gives way to Easter, we have the chance to reflect on what in our life has been dead and broken throughout the winter. One of our quieter Easter hymns, "Now the Green Blade Riseth" acknowledges that resurrection often comes before whatever is broken, dry, or dead has been hauled away. Signs of life poke through before the snow has completely melted. In the final verse of this hymn, we sing, "When our hearts are wintry, grieving, or in pain, thy touch can call us back to life again, fields of our hearts that dead and bare have been: Love is come again like wheat that springeth green." In this season, may we watch with each other for signs of new life springing up within us. When we see these signs, we can cry out with delight, "Alleluia! Christ is Risen! The Lord is Risen indeed, Alleluia."

Allen Will Be Leaving Us Soon

May 6th is Allen Pruitt's final Sunday at St. Timothy's. Allen came to us in the Fall of 2005, the beginning of his second year in Seminary, with a commitment to work 12 hours a week until his graduation. The Episcopal Church requires 2 years of field education with a trained and experienced clergy Supervisor and Lay Committee. Students practice and improve their liturgical, preaching, and leadership skills, receive feedback and evaluations. In the two years he has been with us Allen has received a lot from us, and given a lot in return. We are grateful for him, for his gifts and ministry, and we pray for him as he begins his ministry as a Priest of the Episcopal Church. Allen, go in peace to love and serve the Lord! When Nicodemus questioned what the followers of Jesus were saying, Jesus said to him "It's like the wind. You do not know where it comes from or where it goes." But we can see the effect of wind in the rustling of leaves. My faith, therefore, is not based on archeological proof. Nor does the lack of archeological proof threaten my faith. I believe because of the miracles in my own life. I believe because, even if I can't see God, I see what I consider undeniable evidence of God's love. Every way I examine my life, the lives of people I know, life in general, it unfailingly adds up to what I profess in the Nicene and Apostle's Creed.

We will never prove one way or another that Jesus is, or is not, The Christ. As Paul said, "We live by faith." We live also with the promise that we will one day see Him "face to face" in the Kingdom of Heaven. We can enjoy the dialogue, the probing, questioning, testing for what it is - humanity's hunger and thirst for knowledge, our search for signs, our desire for proof. And we can still be secure in our faith.

The March and April Agape is dedicated to St. Timothy's three Mission groups: the Youth Group's Dungannon trip, the Lakota Mission Team, and the Habitat for Humanity International/Domestic Team. The three groups will benefit greatly from your generous donations. Below are brief descriptions of the Mission groups.

The Youth Group and their annual trip to the Dungannon region in southwest Virginia. Dunngannon is one of the poorest regions in the state. Here, the Youth spend a week renovating substandard houses and developing interpersonal skills that will stay with them for a lifetime.

The **Lakota Mission Team** and their annual trip to the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. Pine Ridge is one of the poorest counties in the country. The team spends a week on the reservation, developing relationships, experiencing the Native American life style and repairing houses in the area. This year the Lakota Team will make two trips, one in the spring and one in the fall.

The **Habitat for Humanity International/Domestic Team**. Last year the team helped rebuild an area still recovering from storm damage from over a year ago. Two years ago the team spent a week in Botswana, Africa building two homes for families.

The Service Ministry asks your support for these three groups of dedicated individuals who are striving to make a difference in the world. During March and April, you will hear from representatives from these groups who will tell you about their mission and their individual experiences. When you get the yellow Agape envelopes in a Sunday bulletin, you will be able to designate your donation to be split equally among the teams or you may specify an individual team as the beneficiary of your donation. The groups thank you for your support and look forward to another year's journey into the world as members of your congregation, to help with their hands and to spread the love of Christ among those who need their help the most. —*Keith Pinkard*

• Baby-sit during the day so Mom can actually take a bit of time for herself


· Do the grocery shopping

requested by the participants. Contact Rev. Leslie if you wish to join this popular class.




