## Living In the Power of the Resurrection

After the prayers in the Baptism service, the priest prays, "Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who

lives and reigns now and forever. Amen."

The ideas expressed in this prayer are so powerful and provocative — both negatively and positively — that they make me uncomfortable. To baptize anyone, especially a precious child, "into Christ's death" is shocking! Of course I know that the children I hold during Baptism are mortal. And I know they will suffer as every human being suffers. But the explicit reminder that they (we) will fail



and someday die is almost more than I can bear. That phrase hits me with all the raw force of Ash Wednesday's harsh declaration, "Remember you are dust, and to dust you will return."

On the other hand "living in the power of Christ's resurrection" is both a great reassurance and a great challenge. While eternal life in Christ is a promise of the Gospel, it is something else to believe this, to hold onto Christ's victory, especially in our darkest hours. To live in the power of his resurrection is to live with faith and joy, "not grieving as those who have no hope" [BCP Burial service]. To look for him to come again in glory is to believe that Jesus Christ is with us always even to the end, just as he promised; that he is with us especially when our need is greatest, that he has conquered sin and death once and for all, and that we shall be raised like him [St. Paul]. To "live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory" is to believe what St. Julian of Norwich declared Jesus showed her [published in her book "Showings"], that "all shall be well, and all will be well, and all manner of things shall be well," no matter how things may appear otherwise.

During Lent and Holy Week we are confronted with our sinful nature and mortality. On Easter we are reminded of God's love and mercy, and of Christ's victory. And with every Baptism we relive these truths.

## Being Present With God

We usually think of Lent as a time to simplify our lives during the stark end to winter. The joy of Easter, coinciding with spring, brings about the teeming of life. On one hand, we can relax and enjoy being outdoors by ourselves or with family and friends. On the other, the longer days and acceleration to the end of the school and program year can tempt us to cram too much into each day.

This Easter, I will get to participate in a 3-day retreat with my colleague group at an Episcopal Monastery called the Society of St. John the Evangelist. Praying and spending time at that monastery always makes me acutely aware of how fast-paced our lives are in Northern Virginia. It is a relief to stop multi-tasking for a moment and to be present with God. Each time I go, I realize that we don't have to wait for a retreat or vacation to practice that way of being. Curtis Almquist, the brother Superior of that monastery, offers two practical ways to slow down and regroup when activities, anxiety, and pressure begin to mount. He urges,

Do one thing at a time. Take time to savor your life, one moment at a time. This is called "being there." Jesus comes to us as God Emmanuel, God with us. Jesus will be really present to you in the real present. Now. Presume that God's presence and God's provision will be most available to you now. Stay in the moment. There is a reason why today is not tomorrow.

Be thankful. Begin your day with the amazement that you are yet alive, that you may have as much as one more day to know God, and love God, and serve God. Be grateful for even the smallest of things in life, what is undeniably good. This is "eucharistic living," eucharist being a Greek word which means "great thanksgiving." It is a way to pray without ceasing. This practice will not take away your trouble; however it will counterweight the balance of trouble, and re-proportion your life's concerns. Being thankful will change, consecrate even the most mundane things in life.

This Easter may we take time to savor God's abundant blessings and to be thankful for Jesus Christ who died for us and rose again to bring us into everlasting life.

## Stewardship In Troubled Times

The current economic crisis is affecting all of us to some degree or another. My pension and annuity are worth about half of what they were not very long ago. The fact that I'm not yet ready to retire is some comfort. But the same loss in savings for my children's college education is very distressing – my younger son goes to college this fall and my daughter will go to college next fall! We will do what we have to do and, thanks be to God, my wife and I are still employed.

I believe there is grace in everything that happens, though it is sometimes hard to see. One ray of light in these troubled times is the reminder of what's really important. We have a lot of blessings to count – family, friends, faith and our community of faith, home, food, clothing, health (I've got some aches and pains but most of me is still functioning very well), and we are surrounded by great natural beauty. I could go on for quite a while but I'll save it for my prayers of thanksgiving. With the reminder of what's really important comes the opportunity to refocus. Life is too precious to waste on worrying.

### With regard to the Church this means

(1) maintaining our commitment to mission. Every dollar given to St. Timothy's is directly connected to helping people, really. We keep this building open and operating for our Preschool, for people who suffer with the disease of addiction (there are 19 twelve-step meetings here every week!), Boy Scouts, the county's Nurturing Parent Program, people looking for financial help for essential needs, people who need spiritual support during a crisis, math tutoring for children, ministry meetings, Christian education for children and adults, and at least four worship services every week. Do you know, more people use our facilities during the week than come to all three of our Sunday services! We provide space and utilities for hundreds of people, every week. And your Church staff is part of this mission. We serve everyone who comes through the doors, whether they are members or not. We provide all kinds of assistance, counseling, and Sacramental services. St. Timothy's reaches out to the community and world too with Halloween parties, Christmas caroling, missions to Appalachia and the Pine Ridge Reservation; through The Closet, LINK, Reston Interfaith, Loudoun Abused Women's Shelter, Shawl Ministry, the Jeannie Schmidt Free Clinic, 30-Hour Famine, Souper Bowl of Caring, Episcopal Relief & Development, Agape offerings, our missionary in Sudan, the Angel Tree, Our Little Roses Orphanage in Honduras, the Diocesan fund for Human Need, and Clergy Discretionary Funds (and I know there's more, but you get the idea). Our pledges and donations make all of this happen.

- (2) We stay focused on our faith too. We worship together, sing hymns together, pray together; receive the Sacraments together. We care for one another through Stephen Ministry, our prayer list, home and hospital Communion, and private counseling. (By the way, please let your clergy know when you need our support and prayers!).
- (3) We maintain a carefully controlled budget, which is approved by the Vestry and reviewed by the entire congregation every year, reviewed by the Vestry and Finance Ministry every month, and audited every year. We have very clear procedures and controls. Our Diocese publishes compensation guidelines which are reviewed annually, and nobody on staff gets a bonus! Every member of the Church has access to the budget, to income and expenses. So, if you have a question or concern, ask.
- (4) Though Jesus taught more on the subject of wealth than anything else there's no arm-twisting in our Stewardship program. And your clergy pledge too, substantially.
- (5) The professional staff, Treasurer, and Finance Ministers, are thoroughly committed to being faithful stewards of your trust.

The bottom line is, in these stressful times as in good times, we remain focused on God, on Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit; we renew our faith and commitment to serve others in the name of Christ.

## Holy Week and Easter Services



Holy Week is always spring break for students, teachers, and administrators in Fairfax County Public Schools. So a lot of our Church family members travel. And for those of you who do, I hope your journey is safe and restorative. For those of us who stay

in town, St. Timothy's offers services that will touch your soul.

April 5th is Palm Sunday (also called The Sunday of the Passion). We will begin all three of our services – 8:00 a.m., 9:30 a.m., and 11:00 a.m. – in the parish hall. Palm branches will be blessed and we will then process all together to the Sanctuary for a dramatic reading of the Passion Gospel and Holy Communion.

On Wednesday of Holy Week (April 8th) we will have a 12:15 p.m. service that includes anointing with Holy Oil, a prayer for healing, and Holy Communion.

On Maundy Thursday (from the Latin word "Mandatum" which means "command"), April 9th, we will have a service at 7:30 p.m. which includes Holy Communion, The Stripping of the Altar, and placement of a large wooden cross in the Chancel; the service ends in silence.

On Good Friday (April 10th) we will have two services: The Stations of the Cross at 12:15 p.m., and Solemn Prayers at 7:30 p.m. The Church is open all day (as it is every weekday) for private meditation.

We will celebrate the Resurrection with great fanfare on Easter Sunday at 8:00 a.m., 9:30 a.m., and 11:00 a.m.

These services are important for many reasons. Our observances remind us of our true nature (we aren't perfect and cannot be perfect), God's love and forgiveness, and the promise of eternal life with Jesus Christ. We are reminded that grace surrounds us at all times, especially in our darkest moments, and that we have a glorious future with God.

If you will be out of town for Holy Week and Easter I hope you will consider finding an Episcopal Church to attend on these holy days. If you are in town please come to St. Timothy's, and invite neighbors, friends, visiting family members, and co-workers to come with you.

I wish you a most thoroughly blessed Holy Week and Easter.

# Open Arms: A New Ministry for St. <u>Timothy's New Members</u>

There's no denying that first impressions are lasting. Families shopping for a new home sometimes make up their minds about a particular house just moments after seeing it. Choosing a new church home, or "church shopping," is no different. We each open that door for the first time with our own set of values and a sense of "the way things should be."

So, how do we make newcomers to St. Timothy's feel welcome and at home? How do we engage them and bring them into our family? Those are the questions being tackled by the recently organized Open Arms Ministry, a committee of new and veteran churchgoers. The specific mission, as set by the ministry members, is actually threefold: to welcome newcomers, to make the current congregation feel at home, and to educate current members about the importance of interacting with St. Timothy's visitors and ways in which to do so—in essence, mingling the old with the new.

"During our retreat in January, the Vestry discussed the life cycle of a ministry. We knew evANGELism was a ministry in trouble, and as liaison to the evANGELism Ministry, I organized a brainstorming meeting in which we concluded that, for our purposes, evANGELism had run its course," says Open Arms Vestry liaison Genevieve Zetlan. "We decided to adjust our focus and concentrate on welcoming and engaging people, and the Open Arms Ministry was born."

And during its brief existence, this group has sprung to new life. Following the initial brainstorming session on February 1, the dozen ministry members are in the process of coordinating their first event. Open Arms is planning a newcomer reception on Saturday, April 18 at 5:00 p.m. in the narthex, as a warm-up for St. Timothy's *Charlie's Chili Cook-Off* later that evening. Beverages and hors d'oeuvres will be served, and snacks and activities will be provided for the kids. More information will be published in the bulletins in April.

The group is also developing a list of ongoing activities, designed to make St. Timothy's a more attractive and engaging environment. Open Arms is reviewing visitor materials that are placed in sanctuary pews and developing an all-inclusive newcomer packet, which should be ready by Easter, for greeters and others to distribute.

The ministry is developing curriculum for a new "Episcopalians 101" (or something to that effect), designed to familiarize those who may be new to the denomination with its traditions, unique language, and

(let's face it) quirks. The members' cadre of "Bread Deliverers" also delivers loaves of bread with greetings from St. Timothy's to all area visitors who sign the guest book, write a check, or fill in a pew card, a tradition continued from the evANGELism Ministry. And the group has identified another half-dozen ideas to consider, which they discussed at their second meeting on March 1.

Not bad for a church function that's been in existence for a couple of months. With the excitement and enthusiasm these members have demonstrated, you could say that they've embraced the ministry's mission and calling with . . . er . . . open arms.

"Our next meeting is Sunday, April 5, right after the 11:00 a.m. service, in Room B1 in the basement of the church," says Ministry Chair Jill Cox. "We plan to wrap up our plans for the newcomers' reception and discuss plans for future activities."

Why not join them? Show up for the April 5 meeting and introduce yourself, or contact Jill or Genevieve. The ministry could always use an extra set of arms, and the ministry welcomes new and innovative ideas for growing our congregation.

Open Arms is further evidence that St. Timothy's and the Episcopal Church are evolving in the service of God to meet the current-day needs and interests of its parishioners. The Vestry and the new Open Arms Ministry welcome your feedback.

## Expectant Mothers (and our stolen future)

Announced in January 2009, Canadian scientists are recruiting hundreds of pregnant women for a landmark, \$6-million epigenetic study designed to track whether 400 household chemicals that expectant mothers encounter, including the plastic chemicals bisphenol A (BPA) and phthalates, can trigger health problems in their children or even alter the babies' genetic makeup. The emerging field of epigenetics is based on the notion that the environment can cause certain genes to turn on or off, sometimes sowing the seeds for cancer or other serious illness later in life. This topic is the basis for the book Our Stolen Future by John Peterson Myers. Our Stolen Future brought world-wide attention to scientific discoveries about endocrine disruption and the fact that common contaminants can interfere with the natural signals controlling development of the fetus. # Have you ever tried Vietnamese ... plastic?


It was recently reported by the Vietnam government that Vietnamese researchers say they have come up with a plastic material for bags that is biodegradable and less expensive than traditional plastic bags. The material, called nanocomposite, is a mix of thermoplastic starch, polyvinyl alcohol and some food additives, and is said to fully degrade in land within a short time.
