
Holy Week and Easter

Holy Week begins on April 17 this year, Palm Sunday (which is also called The Sunday of the Passion). Our services on Palm Sunday are at the usual times of 8:00 am, 9:30 am, and 11:00 am - but we begin our journey in the parish hall rather than the Sanctuary. After the palm branches are blessed, we will walk to the Sanctuary for the rest of the service. In the course of our Palm Sunday services, we will hear the entire passion story, recalling how Jesus entered Jerusalem from the Mt. of Olives, and all that transpired - betraval, arrest, mock trial and beating, his crucifixion, and death. Our services on this poignant day remind us that Jesus was willing to give his life - and did to demonstrate the love of God.

We will have a healing Holy Eucharist at 12:15 pm on April 20, Holy Wednesday. A priest will lay hands of every person who attends, anoint each worshipper, and offer a prayer. The priest will come to each person in the pew to anoint (etc.), and serve Holy Communion.

Thursday in Holy Week (April 21) is called Maundy Thursday. The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin "Mandatum" which means "command." We will hear the story of the Last Supper, which Jesus

The Church commemorates the Communion on Good Friday. Last Supper as the first Holy Eucharist. In this Passover Jesus offers himself, he becomes the sacrificial lamb in a New Passover, a new covenant. And it will be our last supper, our last Holy Communion, until the Easter feast.



Friday in Holy Week (April 22) is called Good Friday - not because Jesus' terrible death on a cross is a good thing, but because his death accomplishes a great good. He becomes our sin and dies, and we rise with him on Easter to the new life of grace. By his suffering

> On Holy Saturday our Altar Guild and Flower Guild transform the sanctuary with flowers, banners, and white fabric on the altar.

Easter Sunday is April 24 and, along with Christmas, Ascension, and Pentecost, is one of the great celebrations of the Church! Services will be at 8:00 am, 9:30 am, and 11:00 am. The music will be amazing! During each service, children will be invited to cover a cross with flowers which the Church will supply but you may also bring flowers. And we will host an Easter egg hunt in the front yard of the Church (the Van Buren Street side) - weather permitting, at approximately 12:30 pm. One thousand eggs will be placed for the occasion. And, if the weather

is inclement, the egg hunt will be moved indoors.

Therefore when you pledge (I hope and pray all of our church family members will) please maintain or increase your giving to the general fund (the annual operating fund), and make an additional pledge to the capital campaign. We can succeed with the capital campaign without compromising what we now do.

Organ Update and Gifts to Glorify the Lord Campaign Information

After many years of study and prayer, this month Saint Timothy's will finally initiate a capital campaign to replace our failing 145 year old Tracker organ, make needed improvements to the building and create a contingency fund for current and future facility expenses. It has been a long journey since 2002 just getting to our kick-off. Here is a timeline of where we've been and where we're going:

• 2002 St. Tim's initiated a study of the viability of the Tracker organ after notification by then-Organist John Ackley of numerous problems. A variety of experts recommended

that repair was going to be continuous, difficult and expensive.

2004 An Organ Committee was formed with new Musical Director and Organist, Peter Waggoner, to study options to replace the organ. Visitations were made to churches with various types of organs, and the committee consulted with organ makers.

2008 After 4 years of thorough study, the Vestry voted to accept the Organ Committee's recommendation to replace the Tracker with a pipe organ.

2009 Miller, Beam & Paganelli, Inc. was hired to provide an acoustical study of our Sanctuary.

2010 Kirby-Smith Associates, a professional fund-raising company, was hired to assess the congregation's ability to conduct a successful capital campaign. The feasibility study was positive and the "Gifts to Glorify the Lord" campaign became a reality.

2011 The campaign is scheduled to be held over several weeks in May 2011, with three year projected timeline for planning, designing, and building.

2012 The order for a new organ is placed, with 50% of necessary funds collected.

2014 Installation of organ, improvements made for lighting and acoustics, and reserve funded for future capital expenses completed.

Q: At Communion, do I have to take the wine? If I don't want to, what do I do?

A: No, you do not have to take the wine (or the bread, for that matter). If you would like bread only, hold out your hands for the bread, and when the wine comes to you, fold your arms, crossed across your chest with hands at either shoulder. This position is also used if you would like to come up to the rail to receive a blessing, but do not wish you take Communion. If you would like to receive both bread and wine, you have the option to consume both separately (eating the bread from your hands and drinking from the chalice), or you may consume both together (holding your bread until the wine Ian comes to you, and dipping a small

Partnership with St. Mathieu's in Haiti

St. Timothy's continues to be blessed by our role in supporting the students of St. Mathieu's. Since September of 2010, we have donated over \$4,000 to provide uniforms, books, and backpacks for eighteen students. The congregation has been generous in providing the funds needed to support the students for the 2010-2011 school year. Because of this generosity, we have committed continued support over the next several years until the youngest of these 18 children has completed primary school.

When the program was initiated last fall, one of the greatest challenges was getting the money to St. Mathieu's for use as it was intended. With all the obstacles Haiti faces, it would not have been surprising for funds to be diverted to other needs. In recent months, changes by the Diocese of Haiti have simplified communication between St. Timothy's and St. Mathieu's and streamlined the process for donating money. The Bishop of Haiti established the Partnership Program in late 2010. This program pairs groups or individuals to a priest partner in Haiti. The priest provides regular reports to their donor partner and updates the donor on news from the parish. The program also provides a simple and safe method for sending goods and funds to specific recipients in Haiti; donations are sent to the diocese at an address in Florida and, from there, the Diocese of Haiti takes responsibility for ensuring delivery to the designated parties. St. Timothy's partners with Pere Michelin St. Louis. Pere Michelin, who assists the priest in charge for Chapoteau, Pere Lafontant, communicates with St. Timothy's on behalf of the St. Mathieu's director and the parish of Chapoteau where St. Mathieu's is located.

Father Brad and members of the congregation have been communicating with Pere Michelin via email since September 2010. Father Brad was able to meet with him briefly during his recent visit to Haiti. As there are no computers or electricity in Chapoteau, and the director does not speak English, we rely on Pere Michelin as the intermediary. The Partnership Program is of considerable benefit in allowing St. Timothy's to support St. Mathieu's successfully.

Since establishing the partnership with St. Mathieu's, many obstacles have been overcome. We began with the names of the students and a limited list of requirements and costs; since then we have defined specific expenses for each child and established regular contact with the local priest and with the director of the school. And, with continued donations and support from the congregation, we have been able to send eighteen children in Chapoteau to school, many of whom may not have been able to attend at all. In coming months we look forward to knowing the students of St. Mathieu's in more personal ways. As we continue to learn about the community of Chapoteau and St. Mathieu's, we welcome the opportunity to share with you. An updated Frequently Asked Questions sheet has been placed in Henry Hall near the St. Mathieu's display, and a Haiti page has been added to the Service Ministry page of the St. Timothy's website. World Water Day was March 22, 2011

Concerned about global water supplies? Maybe not. Concerned about your local water supply? Absolutely yes. Water has become one of the most "endangered" resources globally and locally. While Fairfax County does a fantastic job at keeping our water clean and drinkable, there simply is not enough to go around. Growing populations also stress and strain the government's ability to provide sufficient drinkable water. Individual conservation efforts (shorter showers, nonwatering of home lawns, low-flow faucets and toilets) are very important but the real water users (and abusers) are corporations, industry, and failed water management practices. During the summer months, huge amounts of water are wasted every day by corporations for landscaping needs. Who hasn't seen the classic automatic sprinkler running at a local company's site during the middle of the day (most evaporates) or during a rain storm (duh)? This water is the same drinkable water that comes from your tap. What a waste. What to do? Long-term solutions must be implemented now in order to have a positive impact. First, become educated about water and its use. The Food Table Ministry is a recently formed ministry at St. Timothy's, created to address a growing need in our parish. Many hungry visitors come in to the church during the week in need of assistance. As their numbers have grown, the clergy and parish administrator have identified a need for volunteer assistance in directing these guests to the food pantry in the kitchen for an immediate hot meal, handing out grocery store gift cards, or distributing bus tokens. The days and times volunteer assistance is most needed are Tuesdays and Thursdays between the hours of 10am and 2pm, although it would also be welcomed at any other time. Volunteers who speak Spanish would be an extra help, but the ability to speak Spanish is in no way a requirement. All volunteers will be warmly welcomed and appreciated. Suggested "shifts" are 10:00am-12:00pm-2:00pm; 12:00pm and however, a shift of less than 2 hours will also be gratefully accepted. All volunteering for this ministry will be welcomed.

If we get enough volunteers, we are also hoping to schedule volunteer pairs for each shift, to assist each other with tasks as well as keep each other company when there are no visitors. Perhaps you already know of someone you'd like to pair up with!
