



### St. Timothy's Episcopal Church



I hope all of our members are now aware that St. Timothy's has been experiencing a financial crunch. This has improved in recent months, but we still have a way to go. This crisis has provoked some very inspired meetings with our Vestry and Ministry leaders - one with Diocesan Stewardship and Development Officer Patsy Bjorling, and one led by our Senior Warden, Duncan Hutcheon. Both of these meetings were very productive, and a lot of exciting things are now in the works.

Twenty-five copies of "The Giving Myths" by Stephen B. McSwain are circulating. The author challenges a lot of what we think about stewardship. His basic premise is "the happiest and most fulfilled people are those who have learned to give themselves and their resources away." I am not yet through the book but I find myself agreeing with what he has to say. He insists that "We do not need more financial advancement programs. Instead, I think the answer [to decreased charitable giving] lies in helping people rediscover their real purpose in life" which is "living to give and giving to live."

Our Communications ministers have created a theme for this, "Abundant Giving, Abundant Life." And our stewardship and Vestry have identified some marks of spiritual health. As we embrace the joy of giving we hope to see (1) more people attending our worship services, (2) more of our members pledging, (3) the creation of an organ fund to replace our 140 year old Tracker, and (4) a budget to fully fund our missions and ministries.

Each ministry is being asked to create a realistic vision for their work, a clear sense of what God is calling us as a Christian community to do. This will help our Finance ministers develop a mission budget for St. Timothy's, which will be presented to all of us later this year so we can see exactly what we support with our pledges.

When I came to St. Timothy's fourteen years ago I was very impressed with the strong commitment to assist struggling neighbors in this community and around the world. That tradition continues. Together we give help and hope to the Lakota people on the Pine Ridge Reservation, residents of Dungannon in Appalachia, people devastated by natural disasters, orphans in Honduras, the people of Sudan, abused women and children in this community, people who are unemployed, people without food, people who are homeless, children and adults who need medical

attention and can't afford it, people in spiritual crisis, people with physical and mental disabilities, people who suffer from addiction, men and women studying to become ordained servants of the Church, and people in the Armed Forces around the globe. In addition, St. Timothy's provides programs, services, and sacramental support for members, through every stage of the human journey.

We are extraordinarily blessed, even in these economically trying times. And among our blessings is being created in the image of God. We are created to give, and experience the great joy of giving. I invite you to experience Abundant Giving, Abundant Life.

## Gettysburg Civil War Battlefield -- By Horse Back!

Do you like to go horseback riding? Do you enjoy history? How about both together? The Youth Group (and their families) are going horseback riding on a two-hour tour of the Gettysburg Civil War Battlefield, May 24th! See the battle as most officers did – from horseback! The Sign-up Sheet is on the Youth Group Board (Henry Hall).

THE SMALL PRINT (but very important if you want to ride!):

**When?** Saturday, May 24, 9-11 am (15-16 riders max); and 12-2 pm (five additional riders but only if we need these spaces). If we fill up the morning ride, we have reserved a few extra spaces tagging along with another group at noon. These "extra" spaces will have to be released back to the stables no later than Friday, May 9, so sign up now so we can determine if we need these spaces or not!!

**Where?** Well, Gettysburg Civil War Battlefield (silly). Okay . . . *the straight answer is that we'll car-pool from St. Tim's leaving at 6:30 am*, Saturday morning arriving at Artillery Ridge Stables and Campground (address is 610 Taneytown Road) no later than 8:15 am. Plan to bring a bag lunch and water. NOTE: If, and only if, we need the noon-time spaces, this group may wish to leave mid-morning to arrive by 11:15 am.

**Why?** Fun and fellowship (duh!).

What does it cost? \$61 per person for the two-hour ride. Plan to pay the stables directly, or if only your child is going, then write the check to "National Riding Stable" (if there are any mix up's Mr. Dubishar will use his credit card and we can sort things out later).

**What's the age?** Eight years or older. Fifteen years or younger must be accompanied by an adult. No more than four riders can be 8-12 years. At least four riders must be adults.

Are there other rules? Yep. Lots! Waiver forms (every person must complete a form BEFORE leaving St. Tim's and give it to Mr. Dubishar!); We must arrive at the stables 45 minutes before ride time (i.e., 8:15 am); Max. weight 240 lbs. Seventeen years and younger MUST HAVE PARENT SIGNATURE on waiver form. Sneakers or boots required (no slip on's or open-toed shoes). If you cancel there is a fee. Questions? This has resulted in changing the way our Church thinks about our mission and our calling to serve.

The progress we have made is a great start in a process that needs to continue. We need to move forward on this path so we can grow as a Church and continue the mission God calls us to do for our fellow humans.

## *Ministry of the Month*

### *Pastoral Care – People Helping People*

The Bible repeatedly offers the *shepherd* as a metaphor for one who provides help and guidance to those in need. Brad and Leslie represent the obvious shepherds within our midst, routinely reaching out to the many members of our church community. However, anyone remotely familiar with the sheep-herding process also knows that a shepherd can't go it alone. Keeping the flock together and on the right path requires some support. Accordingly, St. Timothy's has created the Pastoral Care Ministry as a means of providing aid to those who need it.

Pastoral Care is a quiet ministry, often acting behind the scenes . . . but don't let this inaudibility fool you. "When help is needed we jump into action," says Pastoral Care Chairman Shirley Ratliff, who serves as the Ministry's activity coordinator and volunteer dispatcher.

"We have an active pool of 40 to 45 volunteers, who we call the St. Timothy's *Helping Hands*," notes Shirley, who adds that these individuals are available to address problems of almost every nature and size. And over the years, Pastoral Care volunteers have performed a wide range of tasks and services.

St. Timothy's Helping Hands have mailed sympathy, get-well, thinking-of-you, congratulations, and birthday cards to many members of our parish. They've prepared and delivered meals. These volunteers have visited the sick, elderly, and infirm—reading to them, playing games with them, and generally keeping them company.

Helping Hands representatives have provided transportation to doctors' offices, grocery stores, church, and other locales. They've orchestrated receptions following funerals. They've maintained prayer chains, walked dogs, mowed grass, and the list of services goes on and on. You could say that these dedicated helpers are virtually all things to all people.

In addition to Helping Hands, Pastoral Care encompasses the church's Stephen and Shawl Ministries. The Stephen Ministry is a primarily lay-led and lay-run program and offers a full cadre of trained members who provide confidential, one-to-one Christian care. In addition to our clergy Stephen Leaders, Fr. Brad and Rev. Leslie, St. Timothy's currently has 5 lay Stephen Leaders (Ralph and Florita Tildon, Jim Hendrick, Jane Perry and Cheryl Brock) and 18 trained Stephen Ministers, each of whom has taken the initial 50 hours of required training. Stephen Ministers attend twice-monthly peer group meetings and participate in ongoing continuing education. These members reach out to individuals, both in our congregation and the larger

community, who are having difficulty coping with the challenges in their lives. For information on requesting or becoming a Stephen Minister, please contact Fr. Brad at 703-437-3790, or e-mail [st.stephen@saint-timothys.org](mailto:st.stephen@saint-timothys.org).

The Shawl Ministry is chaired by Jackie Clattenburg. This group of talented people make shawls and other knitted items to give to others as a tangible means of support and love. When completed, each shawl is blessed by the group before it is given to the recipient. The group welcomes anyone interested in participating, teaching those who do not already know how to knit or crochet. This year the ministry became ecumenical, welcoming members from the community and encouraging the start-up of other shawl ministries at other churches. Requests for shawls may be made by contacting Jackie or any other member of the ministry directly or through [pastoralcare@saint-timothys.org](mailto:pastoralcare@saint-timothys.org). The Shawl Ministry meets in the Narthex on the first and third Wednesdays of the month from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm.

Most recently, Pastoral Care has initiated a fourth branch of its outreach effort—the Small Groups Ministry—with hopes of offering a fully functioning subcommittee by this Fall. The idea behind the Small Groups Ministry is simple. The St. Timothy's congregation is made up of a large cross-section of members who, despite this diversity, share many common interests.

"Why not use those interests as a way to bring members together?" Shirley rhetorically asks. She suggests that by making these connections, old and new church members will get to know one another, fostering a greater sense of fellowship within the church community. The Small Groups Ministry will bring parishioners together through social groups, book clubs, Bible studies, sports teams, and various other functions.

Shirley and her team do a fantastic job but they could always use an extra set of "hands" to help out when the need arises. The Stephen Ministry program seeks compassionate and caring folks who will be reflective listeners. The Small Group Ministry needs organizers, impassioned hobbyists, and facilitators, and the Shawl Ministry would certainly welcome those who like to express themselves through fabrics.

## Stephen Ministry Caring Workshop a Great Success



Stephen Ministers from St. Timothy’s joined with Stephen Ministers from Herndon United Methodist Church (HUMC) and Trinity Presbyterian Church in hosting a half-day Stephen Series Caring Ministry Workshop on Saturday, April 26. Nearly 75 people from 15 different congregations in the metro area attended the event, including 10 parishioners from St. Timothy’s.

The workshop was intended to introduce churches to Stephen Ministry and to allow them to interact with current Stephen Ministry congregations. Two trained presenters from Stephen Ministries St. Louis introduced three topics: Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief, An Introduction to the Stephen Series System of Lay Caregiving, and How to Care in a Distinctively Christian Way. Workshop participants received a sample of Stephen Ministry training and learned some hands-on effective ministry skills that they could use immediately. The workshop format additionally provided great opportunities for folks to share experiences and ideas.

The success of the workshop also highlighted the joint cooperative teamwork between the three co-hosting Stephen Ministry congregations, of which the presenters from Stephen Ministries St. Louis were highly complimentary. Stephen Ministers and Leaders from St. Timothy’s, HUMC and Trinity worked closely together in planning and handling publicity, refreshments, registration, logistics, and all of the “pieces” involved in a highly successful workshop.

The three churches hope to continue the tradition of cooperation and resource sharing by jointly presenting another Stephen Ministry 50-hour training class beginning in September 2008.

St. Tim’s Stephen Ministers and Leaders want to take this opportunity to once again thank the congregation for its continued generous support of this program.
