<u>Remember</u>

It wasn't very long ago that we Northern Virginians were up to our mid-sections in snow. It was beautiful. And it was a serious impediment to normal activity: schools closed, businesses shut down, and churches cancelled services. I recall looking out of the window of my home; watching my driveway, the road, sidewalk, bushes, and mailbox, disappear under growing mountains of frozen flakes. I thought I'd be shoveling snow forever!

When spring finally came – in all its soul stirring glory – I realized I had forgotten how beautiful this season is. I forgot how resplendent the daffodils and cherry blossoms are, how beautiful the birds sound, how intoxicatingly fragrant the hyacinths are, how magnificent creation is awakening from winter's icy doldrums.

In the frigid grip of winter, I forgot the life-giving wonder of spring. Forgetfulness is an undeniable feature of our nature. Time stands still when we are in pain, and we think the suffering will never end; we forget what it's like to be pain-free. Likewise when we are celebrating, having a wonderful time, we forget the work we have to do, the challenges we will later have to face. In the midst of one thing or another, our focus narrows. While one thing dominates our perspective, other things are forgotten.

It happens with faith too. In the midst of our overloaded schedules, the demands of life, we lose our connection to God; we forget the promises of God. It is inevitable. And that's why coming together every week to hear readings from the Bible, sing hymns, recite the Creed, and pray, is so important.

Hence, for me, "remember" is one of the most important and powerful words in our worship. We are reminded in our Holy Eucharist that Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said "Do this for the remembrance of me." He did likewise with the cup of wine. And this is more than an invitation to mental recollection. The Hebrew word, *zakar*, and the Greek word, *anamnesis*, have meaning far beyond active memory. The Lord's Supper is not just a symbolic re-enactment of the Last Supper; it is a re-membering, a re-gathering, a coming together of Jesus Christ and the people of God. Jesus said, "When two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" [Matthew 18:20]. As we actively recall the things that Jesus said and did, he becomes present. In our worship we recall the truths and promises of our faith, and we are reunited with each other, with God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

Of course our Savior is with us whether we are aware of him or not (thanks be to God); Jesus promised, "I am with you always, even to the end of the age" [Matthew 28:20]. It is important to realize, however, that we do forget God's promises of grace and redemption, and we lose our sense of His Presence – our connection with the source of life, the One who is life.

Thus, we come to Church to "re-member." In our worship together we renew our bonds with each other; with our Creator, Savior, and Sanctifier.

He claims, "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much" (Luke 16:10). Being faithful means being connected to the one who gives us life, faith, and energy for the work He calls us to do.

May we, the people of St. Timothy's, give ourselves in great love to whatever small things we claim as "ours" to do. God will give the growth.

The Breath of God?



The U.S. wind industry had its best year yet in 2009, with enough new generating capacity installed to power the state of Washington, according to a report the American Wind Energy Association. The nearly 10,000 megawatts of generating capacity added in 2009 expanded production of the nation's wind fleet by 39 percent, said the report . Wind now rivals natural gas as the leading source of new electric generation in the U.S., with the two combining to account for 80 percent of the new capacity added in the U.S. last year. Current estimates conclude that wind generates about two percent of the country's electricity, and it is being counted on to help move the country away from traditional sources of fuel that contribute to global warming. Texas leads the country in wind generation with about three times the production of the next highest state. Iowa ("Is this Heaven?" "No, it's just Iowa"). After Iowa are California, Washington and Minnesota. Hey? Where's Virginia in all of this? E-mail your elected officials and encourage a greater use of alternative energy sources in Virginia (and, remember, there is no such thing as "clean" coal). A New Twist on Eco-Travel?

The governor of the U.S. Virgin Islands has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with federal agencies to develop a clean energy development strategy for the territory. The U.S. Virgin Islands hopes to reduce its reliance on fossil fuels by 60 percent within the next 15 years by developing its renewable energy resources. The MOU calls for the National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) and federal agencies to work with the U.S. Virgin Islands to establish a renewable energy deployment strategy for the islands that includes transportation, electricity generation and transmission, energy efficiency, and tourism and industry, as well as a communications and public education campaign. Currently, the U.S. Virgin Islands rely entirely on fossil fuels to meet their energy demands. Not only do the islands have among the highest energy prices in the U.S., their economy is especially vulnerable to supply disruptions and price fluctuations. This new move could be a showcase of how to reduce one's reliance on fossil fuels. To all of us Stewards of Creation, this seems to be yet another reason to visit the USVI. 
