God's Grace When Miracles Don't Happen

Luke uses the word "Grace" once in his Gospel, and ten times in the Book of Acts. John uses the word three times. The word is not in the Gospels of Matthew or Mark. But it appears more than a hundred times in the pastoral letters of Paul and the other apostles!

The Greek word *charis* means "favor," "kindness," "mercy," or "blessing." Paul (et al) uses *charis* to speak of God's general disposition toward human beings. Though completely undeserving, God favors us, acts kindly toward us, is merciful, and blesses us. The Apostles make the point that we are constantly showered by the grace of God; divine favor, kindness, mercy, and blessing rain down upon us at every moment, especially when we need these gifts most. Paul declares that we get just what we need, and even more than we need; that God's grace is both sufficient and super-abundant.

But it is not a "quick fix." God doesn't deliver meals when we are hungry, medicine when we are sick or injured, or otherwise attend to our immediate corporeal needs. God has created this world with sufficient resources for all of us (the problem is we aren't very good at sharing), and works through the Holy Spirit to strengthen our faith and compassion. We usually want the quick fix, but Scripture testifies that God gives us more.

When I was in seminary, my first child, my daughter, was very ill. I prayed night and day for God to heal her, but did not get "the miracle" I wanted. I went to my spiritual advisor (Rachel Hosmer, the most godly person I have ever met) and asked her about praying for miracles. Rachel was 72 at the time and suffered very painful arthritis in her spine. She understood my urgency and pain; she listened very patiently. When I was done pouring my soul out to her she responded very simply "I ask God once for what I want, and ever after for the grace to accept what God gives me." It took me a very long time to appreciate her words of wisdom.

God did not take the arthritis, the pain, away for Rachel. God gave her the grace to accept her mortality, and the faith to believe in eternal life without suffering. So, rather than focusing on her painful condition, she concentrated on helping other people. She lived out her years with great faith, dignity, and compassion. Very few people had any idea that she suffered so much.

Miracles (i.e., "quick fixes") do happen, in Biblical stories and in life. But not often, and always as a reminder that "God does better things than we can desire or pray for" (The Book of Common Prayer page 831). Paul makes the point that "the sufferings of this present time are nothing compared to the glory that will be revealed to us" (Romans 8:18). Paul also declared that "The power of God is made perfect in human weakness" (2nd Corinthians 12:9), that God works in and through our trials for a greater good.

As Rachel taught, I now begin my prayers with a request for what I want, then renew my faith that God will do greater things than I desire, and ask for the grace to be a faithful servant – trusting that God's grace will prevail, and that one day we will be with Christ in Paradise.

We celebrate God's victory over sin and death, and thank God for enveloping us in constant and triumphant heavenly grace.

Also in July, our new Journey to Adulthood leaders spend half a day in required Diocesan training for workers with youth, our Godly Play teachers will continue to teach at the 9:30 AM service, and our Dungannon Mission Team will gear up for the annual work and mission trip to help the residents of Dungannon, Virginia with significant housing repair projects (July 31-August 7). Our Service Ministry will to work with us to raise money for 15 children at St. Mathieu's School in Haiti. Countless other ministries are putting hours of preparation into fall faith formation opportunities for people of all ages. It's inspiring to see how vibrant life continues to be at St. Timothy's even in the middle of summer and in the midst of vacations. May God continue to bless us all in our work and in our rest.

God Knits US Into Wholeness



The Shawl Ministry of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church is a prayerful ministry of knitting and crocheting that reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace, as well as to those celebrating births, baptisms, or other milestones. The shawls and lap robes that we make and give away offer tangible evidence of our prayers.

The Shawl Ministry was born after Jackie Clattenburg purchased the book, <u>Knitting into the Mystery</u>, by Susan S. Jorgensen and Susan S. Izard, and shared it with a few people. On May 5, 2005, Jackie and Janet Dopsovic started the first meeting with Sharon Lew, Susan Nixon, Florita Tildon, and others. Later, Donna McGrath formatted the cards of comfort and helped select the spiritual verses. Upon joining the ministry, Lorna Moran served as one of the greeters/instructors for new members. To date, 380 people have received our knitted and crocheted gifts. Three of our recipients are centenarians. The oldest recipient, the Aunt of Kaworu (Carol) Yanagihara, is 107 years old.

When we began the Shawl Ministry, we based the knitting on a three-stitch pattern to symbolize the Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. As our ministry has grown, we have expanded our patterns and have welcomed people from different churches in the Herndon-Reston area.

As we pass yarn through our needles, we weave prayers and blessings into the shawls. The designers begin each shawl with prayers for the recipient and continue to pray throughout the creation of the shawl. We conduct a special ritual when the shawl is completed and ready to be given away. Our members gather in a circle. Each of us holds onto the shawl, and we bless it with a prayer. We then fold the shawl and place on it a written blessing that honors, comforts, and supports the recipient.

Some of our continuing projects include:

- shawls for members, families, and friends of St. Timothy's congregation
- shawls for members of Harbor House in Herndon, VA
- hats, scarves, and mittens for St. Timothy's Christmas tree
- shawls and sweaters for the children on the Reservation at Pine Ridge, South Dakota
- lap robes for our men and women of the US Armed Forces.

The Shawl Ministry invites you to join us. God equips those who are called. We meet the first and third Wednesdays of each month at 7:00 PM at St. Timothy's. To know that our shawls may speak love and prayers into another person's heart is rewarding. Come help us celebrate as God knits us into wholeness.

A Yearly Blessing

On May 22, 2010, St. Timothy took its yearly mission to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. The group was unusually small: only four of us traveled to the reservation. The task assigned to us this year was replacing a kitchen floor in the home of a local resident. This job entailed removing existing flooring, unhooking and moving sink and gas stove, and removing the sub-floor as well as the actual floor. Once the floor was removed, we discovered that two of the joists were rotten and in need of replacement. A large material list was generated and one member accompanied Pastor Rupp (Retreat center administrator) to get supplies. We were able to get all building supplies as well as new flooring back to the job site in a small Ford SUV in ONE trip! Work took three full days and by the end of it, a beautiful faux wood floor was installed and in our "spare" time we repaired the front door. The homeowner as very happy!

Life at the retreat center had not changed much since last year. We welcomed many local children every day at 4:00 p.m. for fun and games. The number of children had increased to such a level that Pastor Rupp separated the days they could visit by their age. Early in the week we saw kids seven and younger, and the older kids came the last few days. The weekly dinner meal for the kids was now held on two days to handle the large number.

The evenings following "Children's Time" were spent with us hosting guests at the retreat center. These guests would talk about life on the reservation, explain different customs such as sweat lodges, or share their abundant artistic talents. We were treated to a delightful evening with Valerie Brown Eyes as she made quill art. Barbara Dull Knife, a tribal council member, shared her insights on some of the issues affecting the reservation today. Kelly Looking Horse led an extremely interesting tour for us. This tour included the Bureau of Indian Affairs office, the free food distribution center and warehouse, the new bus service office, the Tribal Council building and the local jail.

The week flew by very quickly and we ended it with a nice visit with Reverend Two Bulls at his church at Red Table—on the edge of the Badlands. We left with our usual sense of awe at the beauty of the land, the limitless generosity of the people and a strong feeling of camaraderie within the group.

<u>Saínts Alíve</u>

On Saturday, June 12, ministry leaders and representatives were treated to an in-depth explanation of the new 2011 budget process and a financial tutorial. This special event, sponsored by VoCoSuM, included a presentation from Kathy Lombard, Junior Warden, on the timelines of the new budget process and 2011 Vestry Goals; this year we will be submitting ministry budgets for 2011 earlier than in previous budget cycles. The new plan will allow for more coordination and budget planning on the part of the Finance Ministry and the Vestry.

Rick Wilson presented a thorough review of the financial reports, voucher preparation, the 2010 budget, and insights into the ministry preparation of the 2011 budget submissions. He also fielded individual issues/concerns presented by the Ministry representatives who were present. It was a wealth of knowledge presented to us in just over an hour!

A special thank you to Rick Wilson and Kathy Lombard for sharing their knowledge, time, and talent with the ministry leaders.

<u>Scouts Canoe Trip</u>

This month our main focus was on our annual canoe trip, this year to the Rappahannock River. Although it was hot and the water levels were low, everyone still had a lot of fun. We were also able to see lots of wildlife and nature. We camped about 13 miles downstream from our starting point and canoed a total of 24 miles over the two days. Our group contained 13 canoes and a kayak.

For the next month we will focus on camping to prepare new scouts for summer camp. Have a great month!

<u>Support for Children in Haiti</u>

On June 6, 2010 the Service Ministry began raising funds to send 15 children in the village of Chapoteau, Haiti to school. Hopefully, enough money will be raised to provide tuition, uniforms, shoes, backpacks and school supplies for these children who attend St. Matthieu's Episcopal School.

Throughout this year, the Service Ministry has searched for a personal way to reach out to the people of Haiti. The Rev. Wisnel Dejardin, Seminarian who is from Haiti, met with the ministry to discuss ways that St. Timothy's might provide support. It was learned that Wisnel himself has provided money to send children to school and education is something he views as very important to improving the life of all Haitians.

After determining the specifics of what is needed, it was decided that the initial effort will be to raise money specifically for the children's education and provide the essentials for them to attend school in the fall of 2010. Working with Wisnel while he is in Haiti this summer we will obtain uniforms, shoes and supplies for the students and forward money to pay tuition for them.

Please visit the display in Henry Hall with details about the children of St. Matthieu's. You can see their names, ages and a delightful photo of them gathered near the school. The children we will support range in age from 8 to 15. Unlike the US, often children do not start school when they turn five. Rather, they attend school when there is enough money for them to go and they are able to get there. The Episcopal Diocese runs the school and provides teachers.

This is an opportunity for every member of St. Timothy's to have a direct effect on the life of someone in Haiti. Regular updates will be offered to the congregation and we have the benefit of Wisnel's personal contact with the children and the people of Chapoteau. Please be generous in your donation so that we may be successful in this mission.

When we have time to relax, we sometimes feel an urge to look at a sunset, climb a mountain, listen to music, or be inspired by a book; but our Lord Jesus took his disciples into the desert, on a boat, or to a mountain to pray and meditate upon their mission in life. All of His teachings were about God's will and how our lives should be led. Jesus sent his disciples out with nothing but their clothes and they successfully drew people into the church which had no church, no buildings, no administration, etc.

We are relatively wealthy, have belongings and "stuff." We do good works, but when do we pray and meditate? One hour a week at church? Then perhaps we are distracted by the music or who we must see after the service, the presence of others around us, finding the right page in the bulletin and a thousand other things. God must be very disappointed when our attention is drawn away from Him. How many people, besides the clergy, say the offices of Morning and Evening Prayer? Does anyone recite a rosary? Who just sits still at the end of the day and thanks God for everything that has happened, or asks for help for the whole world?

It is hard not to feel guilty when you realize your shortcomings, but the great thing is that if we are truly


sorry, we are forgiven. We can keep God foremost in our hearts and minds: life can be quite different. Church life can be transformed when it is God-centered and not people-centered to the extent of having to ask, "Where is God in all of this?"

Holy Wisdom Monastery in Madison, Wisconsin recently earned the highest non-commercial award issued to date by the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) organization -- Platinum! Green elements include outstanding indoor quality, water saving, 99 percent recycling of the old building's materials, and use of geothermal and solar power. The Project Specialist for St. Louis-based Vertegy (who assisted in the construction) highlighted how the landscaping chosen by the Monastery did not require irrigation and the ultra-quiet equipment used inside allowed for a greater connection to the "outside" even while inside the building.
