St. Timothy's has the distinction of being a healthy and faithful parish. I frequently receive calls, requests for meetings, and pleas for help from other clergy and parish leaders. Even with all of that I don't believe we're better than other parish families. There's no magic in what we do. And I feel a little embarrassed that someone might think we're more faithful. I tell people we're just doing what we're asked to do, what our Savior commands us to do in the Gospel – love God, and love each other. 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people (just like you) behind that proverbial curtain making the magic of liturgy happen each week! Here are a few of the fears I have heard from people:

Myth: I'm afraid you're going to make me sing by myself ... in front of everyone.

Truth: I won't ever make anyone sing by themselves. We are in choir to learn to sing as a unified group, so singing together is our focus! However, if you feel compelled to burst into a joyful solo song, I certainly will not stop you!

Myth: Choir is boring.

Truth: Choir is fun! We have a welcome, fun-loving group of people in our adult choir and bell ringing group. We make jokes, laugh, and get some music-making done. We also like to gather to eat, drink, and generally, be merry!

Myth: Choir takes too much time. I'm too busy.

Truth: I am an extremely punctual person - we start on time and we end on time. So, your commitment to choir or bell ringing will only be one and a half hours of rehearsal a week. I understand that you are making an offering of your time and talents to St. Timothy's, so I want to be a good steward of that gift. We make music, learn, laugh and are finished by 8:30 pm.

Myth: Bells are mysterious, complex instruments that take decades to master.

Truth: Bell are actually simple instruments that can be easily learned. Children can play bells. Your cat might have one around its neck! Playing bells is a fantastic way to

learn to count. I can meet with you one-on-one if you need extra help.

Myth: There are so many people involved that I won't make a difference.

Truth: All of our ensembles are in desperate need of more members! We have 2-4 bell spots open that MUST be filled. We need about 10-12 more singers in our adult choir. In short, you WILL make a difference!

Myth: I don't sing.

Truth: You might not have never sung in a choir before, but if you can talk, you can sing! And, like all things new, you might be a little apprehensive at first. But, I suggest starting the walk down the yellow brick road this fall- you may not understand everything you see and hear at first, but I can promise you that, like Dorothy, you'll make some new friends and have a fresh perspective on the beautiful liturgy as you start your journey of learning about music!

Q: What are "Track 1" and "Track 2" readings, and which one are we using?

A. During the long "green" season after Pentecost (note the color of our Altar linens during the summer), there are two "tracks" (or strands) each week in the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) for Old Testament readings. Within each track, there is a Psalm chosen to accompany that particular lesson.

The RCL allows us to make use of either of these tracks, but once a track has been selected, it should be followed through to the end of the Pentecost season, rather than jumping back and forth between the two.

The first track of Old Testament readings ("Track 1"), which we are currently using, follows major stories and themes read mostly continuously from week to week. Since our readings follow a three year cycle, these themes are explored over the course of the three years. In Year A we begin with Genesis, in Year B we hear some of the great monarch narratives (King David, King Solomon), and in Year C we read from the later prophets.

A second track of readings ("Track 2") follows the Roman Catholic tradition of thematically pairing the Old Testament reading with the Gospel reading, often typologically—where the Old Testament reading is interpreted as a sort of foretelling of Jesus Christ's life and ministry. This second track is almost identical to our previous Book of Common Prayer lectionary.
