Your presence makes a difference!

On my first day of college, my English professor stood before our class and said, "Today, everyone is present. Look around you. You are like actors in a play. If one of you is absent, no one else can fill your role exactly as you play it. Your presence makes a difference." We listened because we could tell that it really mattered to him that we had shown up. This professor was also realistic. He knew that we would miss some classes due to illness or oversleeping, but he insisted that if most of us were present most of the time, everyone would benefit—we'd have a much better class.

He was right. That class was one of the best. My professor's words came back to me as I heard Sunday School teachers reflect on the 2006-2007 program year. The teachers' message was clear: From the youngest class to the oldest, the students' presence made the difference. The Pre-K teachers remembered the best moments of their year as incarnational moments when people made Christ's love real to each other. One teacher inched across the floor on her belly to show her delighted three-year-olds how a caterpillar turns into a butterfly. She watched a friendship develop between two little girls, both new to St. Tim's, and heard them tell their parents that they wanted to come back to Sunday School to see their friends. A second Pre-K teacher said that her students helped her reconnect with her faith. She said, "it is a joy to receive their hugs, to listen to stories about home, and talk about all the ways that Jesus loves us... We learned to use glue sticks and sometimes we are even able to sit in a circle and listen to a story about Jesus – but only if it has lots of singing and a chance to act out the story and pretend we are Jesus."

The high school teachers did not have stories about glue sticks, but their most memorable classes were also incarnational. They contrasted how they felt on the day when they showed up with two dozen donuts and had to cancel class because there were so few students with the joyful day when they taught the "Loving Your Enemies" lesson. On the second day, they played an interactive game and had to start it over three times as more and more students came in the door! The teachers and the students had so much fun connecting that they ended up with a great discussion later on.

So students and parents: Everyone matters! Your presence makes a difference! If most of us show up most of the time, we'll have the chance to experience Christ in each other face to face. Let's make 2007-2008 one of the best Sunday School years ever!

"Love your neighbor as yourself"

When a majority of the members of Church of the Epiphany in Herndon voted to secede from the Episcopal Church other members who did not support that action were effectively left without a Church. The Church, and Church family they supported was no longer available to them. Many of them migrated to St. Timothy's and we welcomed the "Epiphany Episcopalians in Exile." However, these faithful and courageous people not only want to maintain their membership in the Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Virginia, but in their own Church, Church of the Epiphany. Our Vestry voted unanimously to offer whatever support we can.

Following a lot of prayer, meetings with other "exiles", discussions with our Bishops, the continuing Episcopalians from Epiphany have elected a new Vestry and set a date to resume their Sunday worship. By the grace of God we will host our neighbors in their worship, in our parish hall at 9:30 am, beginning on July 29th. The time was chosen so we could share coffee hours before and after. So, there will be two simultaneous worship services in our facilities on Sunday mornings at 9:30 am. They will start with a service once a month on the last Sunday of the month. As they grow, the frequency of services will increase to every other week or even every week (Go Epiphany!). Please welcome our sisters and brothers in Christ.

The Jeanie Schmidt Free Clinic (JSFC) and Reston interfaith in cooperation with Kids R First are collecting school supplies, goody bag items and backpacks this summer. School supplies and goody bags will be delivered to JSFC. Not sure what to buy? Copies of lists of requested items have been prepared for you and you can find these lists on the Service Ministry bulletin board in Henry Hall. Backpacks in all shapes, sizes and colors are needed and will be delivered to Reston Interfaith, who partners with Kids R First to obtain additional school supplies and resources. Last year we collected over 50 backpacks and enough school supplies and goody bag items to serve over 200 children. Let's do even better this year! Backpack donations are needed by Sunday, August 5. In coordination with this month's Agape offering to JSFC, we'll collect goody bags and school supplies through August. Don't forget to drop off your donations in the bins in Henry Hall. Help Me Help Others

My name is Maggie Perkinson, I'm almost sixteen years old, and I'm going to be a junior at Westfield High School this year. Some of you may know me because I sing in the St. Ambrose Choir during the 11:00 a.m. service. I'm reaching out to you because I will be participating in the Cure Autism Now Walk in Washington, D.C. on October 20, 2007 and I need your help. Please consider sponsoring me as I walk with others to help find a cure for this terrible disorder.

What is Autism? The Autism Society of America describes this condition as "a complex developmental disability that typically appears during the first three years of life and is the result of a neurological disorder that affects the normal functioning of the brain, impacting development in the areas of social interaction and communication skills."

I would describe it as a 13-year-old brother who never plays with you, hardly speaks or pays attention to you; in short, someone who takes more of an interest in objects than in people. Jack requires a babysitter of some sort all the time and we've hired a group of therapists to help him learn outside of his school program. He's a sweet boy, and I love to see him smile. But I can also see that his needs weigh heavily on my parents, so I do what I can to help out and I offer to watch him so that they can get out once in while.

Nearly 1.5 million Americans today are believed to be Autistic, and a new case of Autism is diagnosed almost every 20 minutes in this country alone. Autism is a terrible disorder that appears to be on the rise, and no one really knows what causes it. Funds are needed to help conduct research to find a cure, and that's why I'm walking. AGAPE for July/August

Jeanie Schmidt Free Clinic

Hi. I am Bill Sanger, a volunteer for the JSFC. Last month's Word outlined the clinic's operations. It noted that the clinic provides medical attention to 100 adult patients each year and has provided school and sport physical exams to over 1800 children over the past 5 years. These are services provided to low-income families who have no other resource for the treatments provided. The important thing to remember about the clinic is that IT MATTERS. Low-income families are getting medical help otherwise unavailable to them. The clinic literally saves lives.

The adult clinic treats high-blood pressure and diabetic patients on a recurring basis. If it were not for this clinic, many of the patients would be unaware of their medical needs, resulting in a trip to the emergency room, or worse.

The children's clinic is basically a one time only event. Families bring their children for free physical exams. The clinic is also open on Tuesday morning for consultations. The clinic volunteers also visit special events (fairs, etc.) to provide blood pressure testing.

What can you do:

1. Place a donation in an Agape envelope to provide needed funds.
2. Volunteer to provide needed services to those less fortunate. (This could include data entry operations and translating skills as well as helping with the patients.)
3. Provide a meal for the volunteers, who arrive at 5pm to set-up before the clinic opens. (Left-over food is given to adults at the adult clinic.)
4. Knit gloves (mittens) and hats for the children's clinic including items for babies, too young for school, but with brothers or sisters visiting the clinic.
5. Contribute used children's books and stuffed animals for the clinic.

- Shawl Ministry forms, for suggesting a shawl or blanket recipient (Members/Ministries, Pastoral Care link)

Remember, you can check the calendar page (it goes up to 3 years in the future!) any time to find out if a room is available for your meeting or event - click "view entire church calendar" to select the month and day you'd like to see. E-mail any website suggestions or content to gzetlan@gmail.com.

Stephen Ministry News

Our current Stephen Ministry program has been steadily growing since 2005 and includes 17 lay Stephen Ministers and 2 lay Stephen Leaders (additionally, Fr. Brad is a trained Stephen Leader). We are pleased and grateful that Stephen Minister Jim Hendrick will be attending the upcoming week-long Stephen Leader training session in Pittsburgh from July 29 – August 4. We wish Jim well and pray for a safe trip and meaningful experience.

Stephen Ministry is a program through which people are trained to help provide Christian caregiving to members of our congregation and community who are grieving, in crisis, or experiencing other stresses or challenges in life. Stephen Ministers receive 50 hours of initial training and continuing education in providing ongoing, loving Christian care to those who are experiencing life events such as separation/divorce, death of a loved one, illness, hospitalization, loss of a job, loneliness, and many other challenges.

How does Stephen Ministry work? Stephen Ministers do not take the place of the clergy, professional counselors or other health professionals. When a person is paired with a Stephen Minister, the Stephen Minister doesn't try to solve problems. Rather, he or she listens, cares, prays, and helps the care receiver find his or her

path to healing and wholeness. The Stephen Minister and care receiver generally meet for about an hour each week for as long as the need is there. Everything a care receiver says to his or her Stephen Minister is kept confidential.

Who benefits from Stephen Ministry? Everybody benefits. Those receiving care from Stephen Ministers benefit because they receive prayer and continuous support throughout the challenge they face. Stephen Ministers benefit through the spiritual growth they experience from being involved in this meaningful ministry. Our clergy benefit because the caring ministry at St. Timothy's is expanded. Most of all you benefit from the knowledge that this special care is available at St. Timothy's.

Bringing An Open Mind to Harry Potter

A couple weeks ago, amid unprecedented publicity for a book, the final volume of the Harry Potter series was released. The Christian responses to the series and its immense popularity have been mixed, ranging from those who flatly condemn Harry Potter as an explicit endorsement of witchcraft to those who praise it by writing tomes on the moral values it supports. The former have fought a mostly losing battle to keep the books out of schools, for fear that exposure to Harry Potter will lead to children embracing witchcraft and Satanism. The latter have created Bible studies that use Harry Potter as something from which to learn moral lessons before moving on to the Bible itself.

I am quite a fan of Harry Potter and made a point of reading the entirety of Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows on the Saturday it came out. I read it not as a way to learn the lifestyle of a wizard or in search of lessons to complement the Bible, but simply because I find Harry Potter enjoyable to read. Personally, I don't think either extreme of rejecting the series without reading it or elevating it to the status of moral guidebook is appropriate. However, I do think the books emphasize moral lessons that are particularly relevant for us today.

The evil of Lord Voldemort and his followers is ultimately rooted in hatred and fear of those of different heritage or species, a refusal to accept that a girl whose parents are mere dentists or an elf brought up as a servant can perform magic more successfully than a wizard descended from a long line of wizards. Such self-important prejudice is certainly prevalent today in a variety of contentious issues. Jesus, it should be noted, did not say 'love your neighbors as yourselves, as long as they are of the same gender, ethnicity, sexuality, etc. as you.' One of Voldemort's servant-allies goes by the name of Pius Thicknesse, a rather transparent reference to religious people who, in blindly embracing specific details of doctrine, aid human evils and fail to act toward the greater good. Jesus' encounter with the Pharisees who thought to condemn him for healing on the Sabbath is typical of his response to this: doing God's good of saving a life is of greater importance than following the Law by refraining from work on a holy day.

As Episcopalians, we are called to use reason alongside scripture and tradition in formulating our faith, and I would encourage all of you who have read or are reading or will read Harry Potter to turn your reason to the text. We should not condemn the books or sing their praises simply because others do, and, in thinking about the books, we should be open to the fact that God has spoken to people who follow Him through far more unlikely media than a boy wizard in a piece of fiction.
