## The Episcopal Church

I have been busy reading some very thought provoking books, catching up on home projects, helping my younger son get ready for his freshman year in college, and reflecting on what transpired in our Church's General Convention. Regarding the latter, the delegates to General Convention boldly reaffirmed the Episcopal Church's commitment to global mission and our membership in the Anglican Communion. In the name of Jesus Christ, and on behalf of all Episcopalians, they demonstrated strong commitment to improved human rights in the Philippines, peace and reconciliation in Sudan, advocacy for the Haitian people, better relations with Cuba, prayer for the people of Israel and Palestine, an end to the war in Iraq, relief for the victims of international gangs, environmental responsibility and conservation, fulfillment of the Millennium Development Goals, and unceasing prayer for all of God's people. And this is only a small part of the whole story. I know the delegates from the Diocese of Virginia, as well as many others from around the country (including a former seminary intern at St. Tim's!). I believe they demonstrated great faith and accountability. I am proud of them, and I am proud of the Episcopal Church.

And yet it's no surprise; in spite of all the faithful and good things accomplished by our General Convention delegates the media highlighted only two decisions, neither as inflammatory as some headlines indicated. First, the Church affirmed the ministry of *all* people - including gays, lesbians, transgendered, and bisexual individuals. Of course historically all kinds of people have embraced the Church's mission, often making great personal sacrifices for the love of God. We now recognize and clear the way for all people to be active lay ministers, deacons, priests, and bishops. Every aspirant for ordained ministry will now receive fair consideration based on his or her call and qualifications. Second, the Church has not approved the blessing of same-gender unions, but has called for a study of such rites already in use, especially in states where these

## God Willing, us Willing.

"Without God, we cannot; without us, God will not." The Rev. Dr. David Schlafer preached this message at St. Timothy's on July 5. He reflected on Mark 6: 1-13, where Jesus, who has been doing deeds of power wherever he goes, suddenly can do "no deed of power." It can be discouraging in ministry when volunteers dwindle to one or two dedicated people. It feels hard to access God's power. The work seems overwhelming and dependent on limited human resources. However, in my three years here as an associate, I have seen dramatic transformations of ministries moving from such discouragement into abundant new life. The turning point comes when two or three leaders are willing to "step out first," to make an honest assessment of the ministry, to invite others to generate ideas, and to commit time and energy to a The Holy Spirit takes off, and people concrete goal. follow. On August 1, the Vestry and Ministry Chairs will meet to discuss the coming year. The Stewardship Committee, run by two dedicated leaders, will elicit the support and ideas of all of the ministries to envision what work we'd like to do together as a congregation and the resources we'll need to carry out that work. I look forward to seeing God work powerfully among us this fall in the way we pool our resources to do the ministry he's called us to do in 2010. With God, there's nothing we cannot do. We simply need to step out first in faith.

# The 76th General Convention, July 8-17: Mission and Authenticity

Among the many issues discussed at the 76th General Convention were a focus on local and international mission, the reality of same-sex unions in some legal jurisdictions, and access for all the baptized in the ordination process.

The 76th General Convention affirmed that "mission is the heartbeat of the church." Mission means that we are sent out to spread the good news of God's love and care for all. The three-year budget passed by General Convention emphasizes mission in local parishes. This local emphasis did not overshadow a vibrant concern for world mission. The convention passed resolutions in support of "troubled and besieged communities," including those in Haiti, Honduras, Pakistan, and Sudan among others."

The secular press paid most of its attention to two resolutions, C056 and D025, that dealt with human sexuality. C056 acknowledged the reality that many dioceses are in civil jurisdictions "where same-gender marriage, civil unions, or domestic partnerships are legal" and need to "provide generous pastoral response to meet the needs of members of this church." C056 charged the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music along with the House of Bishops Theology Committee to "collect and

develop theological resources and liturgies of blessing for same-gender holy unions, to be presented to the 77<sup>th</sup> General Convention for formal consideration." The word "consideration" deliberately replaced the word "action" in an earlier version of the resolution. At the same time, the resolution stated, "Honoring the theological diversity of this Church, no bishop or other member of the clergy shall be compelled to authorize or officiate at such liturgies." In other words, the resolution respects the reality that not all Episcopalians are in the same place in regard to this issue.

The other resolution that got attention in the press, D025, has to do with the ordination process. The Rev. Lauren Stanley offered this summary: "The amended resolution guarantees access to the process, but not to ordination. All baptized persons shall have full access to the discernment process." Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori and President of the House of Deputies Bonnie Anderson wrote and hand delivered a formal letter to Archbishop Rowan Williams presenting the context for these resolutions. They also e-mailed the letter to the primates of the communion. They offered, "We understand Resolution D025 to be more descriptive than prescriptive in nature— a statement that reaffirms commitments already made by the Episcopal Church and that acknowledges certain realities of our common life. Nothing in the resolution goes beyond what has already been provided under our Constitution and Canons for many years." They emphasized, "it is not our desire to give offense...We remain keenly aware of the concerns and sensibilities of our brothers and sisters in other churches across the communion...We believe also that the honesty reflected in this resolution is essential if indeed we are to live into the deep communion that we all profess and earnestly desire."2

I read articles from delegates all over the country representing a wide theological spectrum. Regardless of how they voted, most of these authors shared a tone of collegiality, of hope, and of excitement about spreading the good news. I am very aware that the Church is a human institution, flawed and imperfect. However, we are also Christ's body, led by the Spirit. I am proud to be part of the Episcopal Church, a part of the family that does not cover up disagreement, that is committed to listening and discerning in community, and that seeks to reach out to all in the name of Christ.

unions are now legal. The blessing of same-gender unions will be reconsidered in the 2012 General Convention.

The Episcopal Church's General Convention is a wonder to behold. We are quite unlike many other denominations in the world-wide Christian family. We study the Bible and the Church's traditions. We pray. We listen to the Holy Spirit. We meet and deliberate in councils. Lay and ordained individuals participate. No single person or group rules. As a consequence (curse, blessing, or both), change rarely happens very quickly. We believe the Word of God is alive, that we are continually guided, often in strange new ways, and that fidelity to God's will requires careful discernment.

We believe The Episcopal Church is governed by our Savior Jesus Christ whose love and will are revealed to all of God's people. So our national structure is in evidence locally: ministries and missions are determined and conducted by all the Baptized members of the parish; the Vestry manages the property and allocates resources; the clergy (with the assistance of other members) provide sacramental, educational, and pastoral support. Thus all Baptized members in good standing of St. Timothy's are welcome and encouraged to served on the Vestry and participate in the ministries to which we are called by God.

## <u>OPPORTUNITY: Community Volunteer at</u> the Closet (Service Ministry)

#### Who is Needed for This Opportunity?

Anyone with a passion for furthering the mission and ministry of the Church through lending an occasional helping hand at the Closet. No prior experience required!

#### Why Are You Needed?

The Closet, a nonprofit thrift shop in the heart of historic downtown Herndon, was founded in 1974 by St. Timothy's and a handful of other churches to assist lowincome families by selling used clothing at a nominal price. Over the years, this mission has expanded, largely thanks to the generosity of volunteers. Every year the Closet donates approximately 90% of its proceeds after expenses to a variety of worthwhile causes in our local community—the total donations now exceed more than \$2 million. The Closet is chiefly run by volunteer help you can make a tangible difference in the lives of others through giving a few hours of your time. Another way to help The Closet is to donate items on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday between 10 am and 2 pm. #### What Do You Have to Do?

Duties are non-demanding and varied, depending on need and number of available volunteers, so flexibility is the key. Here are some examples of tasks that you might do:

- Make price tags and place on clothes;
- Hang priced clothes on hangers and move to sale area:
- Organize and stock shelves with priced items;
- Bag items that are sold;
- Work the jewelry counter;
- Supervise the dressing room area;
- One of our younger volunteers once dressed Barbies during her volunteer time at the Closet!

#### How Do You Do It?

It's simple! St. Timothy's is assigned days (may be during the week or on a Saturday) for providing volunteer help. A volunteer shift is 2 hours (10 am – 12 noon or noon – 2 pm). Contact our Closet volunteer coordinator Holly Hartge (see below), then show up 15 minutes before your assigned shift. The Closet manager will give you a short tour and assign you a task.

#### Star Trek Meets The Steward of Creation


The Canadian Press recently released a report on the good and the bad of Nanotechnology. The good includes that nanoparticles are likely to be used in cleaning up contaminated sites because of their ability to break apart toxic molecules. They are also likely to reduce global energy demand because of the efficiency they bring to electronics. The bad suggests that little is known about how nanoparticles interact with living systems, including what makes them toxic, whether they can move up food chains or even how they can be detected. Unfortunately, consumers have learned, time and time again, that there are trade-offs for nearly every thing in our lives. Tefloncoated cookware are easy to use and clean, but have been found to release plastic molecules into one's food. Nalgene bottles come in every shape and size but, when made with BPA plastics, were found to, once again, release plastic into the food substance left in continuous contact. Nanotechnology has great potential, and, quite possibly, great risk. Be aware of your choices and pray. (A message from St. Timothy's Steward of Creation)

## The EPA's Ability To Assess Toxic Chemicals Found Lacking

A recently released congressional audit concluded that the Environmental Protection Agency's ability to assess toxic chemicals is as broken as the nation's financial markets and needs a total overhaul. The Government Accountability Office has released a report saying the EPA lacks even basic information to say whether chemicals pose substantial health risks to the public. The GAO calls for actions to streamline and increase the transparency of the EPA's registry of chemicals. The GAO also calls for measures to enhance the agency's ability to obtain health and safety information from the chemical industry. Therefore, be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be. And whatever your labors and aspirations in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace in your soul. With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams; it is still a beautiful world. Be cheerful.
