### Botswana Habitat Mission



On July 14th, our Associate Rector Kedron Jarvis led eleven of your fellow parishioners on a Habitat for Humanity mission to Botswana, in southern Africa. We arrived

at the village of Letlhakane two days later, and moved into a local hotel, where we took most of our meals. In

trying to describe the village, the words impoverished, cluttered and arid come to my mind. On Sunday, July 17th, we began what would be eight consecutive days of work on two houses, (four full days and four half days). We were introduced to the two women



who would eventually occupy these homes. The first was Olie, a single mother of three, who was living nearby in crowded conditions with her extended family. The second was Tracy, a married mother of one, whose husband was a painter. Tracy was living in a one-room mud hut with a thatched roof, with no elec-

tricity or running water.

The team was also introduced to two professional builders, Molefhe and O.T., and with their patient guidance and the help of several of Olie and Tracy's friends and family members, we began work at both sites. We mixed concrete, we mixed mortar, we made blocks,

and we set the blocks in place. We also poured the concrete floor at Tracey's house, and put the roof on Olie's house, as well as digging a latrine pit for her. The houses were



about a half-mile away from each other, and we usually walked from one to the other. When it was time for us to go, Olie's house was fully constructed, (only needing caulking, glass in the window frames, and the doors



to be hung). Tracey's house was half completed, and we were told it would be finished by Molefe and O.T. in the very near future. The ribbon cutting ceremony at Olie's house was very emotional, as


she said she had never thought it would be possible to own her own house. We presented house warming gifts



new tools to the builders. We also left work clothes, tools, and toys and balls for the children, for later use and distribution by the local Habitat

The team got along exceedingly well with each other. There were a few sick days for some, but by in large we remained healthy and returned home safely. We ate well, including several meals of goat meat. We found the people of Botswana to be friendly, polite and soft spoken. Aside from the actual construction that was accomplished, we feel we also showed the local people that Christians from far off places care for their well being. We also believe we demonstrated what can be



accomplished though volunteerism, and hope we will inspire others to greater involvement, both in Botswana and here back home.

We thank all our supporters, both financial

and moral. Your prayers and well wishes helped get us through this mission. We also give great thanks to God for allowing us to serve, and to be served, and seeing us returned safely to our families and friends. ## Dungannon Mission Trip 2005

It's impossible to imagine the circumstances surrounding the lives of the people of Dungannon, Virginia and the minimalist conditions in which they must live as part of the poorest county in the state. But even though the situation

is so different from ours in Northern Virginia, teenagers and adults from local churches persevere every summer to improve the living conditions for these people as best they can.

St. Timothy's annual youth mission trip has expanded in breadth every year. This summer, the youth groups and chaperones of four Region V churches—St. Timothy's, St. Thomas, St. Anne's, and Holy Cross—spent one week in Dungannon from July 30 through August 6 to repair and rebuild substandard housing for the residents. The 63 participants lived together in a modest building called the Phoenix Center that has been set up by the Dungannon Development Commission to house people working onsite.

Although the trip contains many activities designed for fun, the main focus is the work that is done on the houses / trailers. This year, a substantial number of large projects were undertaken, and both the teens and adults worked tremendously hard to complete as much as possible from Monday through Friday time period. Teenagers were shuffled around daily among several work sites to most efficiently complete the tasks,

and several stayed at the Phoenix Center each day to do



work there. As always, the projects were ambitious, requiring the participants to build wheelchair ramps and decks, remove and install flooring, install doors, spackle and paint, and remove and install bathroom fixtures. From early in the morning until the early evening, everyone worked selflessly, despite the heat, to complete what wasn't thought possible. The truest indication of the dedica-



tion of the participants came on Friday evening, when a group went back to their site in the late hours of the night to finish up work that was left unfinished that day. They worked past midnight,



returning home to the center even later, truly embodying the altruistic spirit of this mission trip.

The town of Dungannon is minimal compared to Northern Virginia, but that doesn't mean it is without its benefits. For the most part, participants visit the two main attractions, the Dollar General

and Scotty's Market, everyday. At these places everyone buys miniature treats for their "secret buddies," selected at the beginning of the week. All week, secret buddies placed candy and other small items in others' brown bags anonymously, and they revealed themselves to each other

at the end of the week. Elsewhere in the town, numerous churches gave the participants a place to attend worship on Sunday morning; the Falls at Little Stoney National Park provided a 24-foot waterfall for a refreshing and "very cold" swim; and soccer fields and basketball courts



offered the perfect places to relieve stress after a day of working. The most fun, of course, comes with the midweek trip to Kingsport, Tennessee for a night of bowling,

eating at Pizza-Hut, and power shopping (15 minutes) at Wal-Mart.



After a day of work, an adequate amount of free time was given to allow for soccer games or trips to the Dollar General, but later in the

evenings, an evening program was conducted to help everyone understand the purpose of this trip. In small groups, teens and adults would discuss the theme of the week—"Lord, when did I see you?"—by reading relevant Biblical passages and connecting these to the work offered to the residents of Dungannon. The discussions led to understanding that by offering these services to these people, the participants were offering them to God as well, and that God could be manifest in numerous ways. A Holy Eucharist service, led by The Rev. Brad Rundlett, Thursday evening helped reinforce this idea. At the Holy Eucharist service, many of the participants gave witness, explaining where and when they saw God on the Mission Trip.

St. Timothy's Youth Group sent an unprecedented 29 teens and adults on this year's Mission Trip. Given the



success of it, and the willingness of our teens and adults to offer their time and talents to the people of Dungannon, that number should only grow in coming years.

## Nightwatch - Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine New York City

We are trying to organize a trip to New York City in October for a program called Nightwatch at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, which is described below. Since 1975, this program for High School youth groups has hosted thousands of people of all ages for one or two exciting nights of fun, discovery and worship at an overnight stay inside the Cathedral. Every weekend from October through May, groups of up to 100 youth and adults attend this weekend experience in the world's largest gothic cathedral.

The standard Nightwatch program includes:

- A chance for youth from different churches and denominations to meet one another in an atmosphere of games and music.
- An opportunity to interact with a representative from one of the Cathedral's social, environmental or arts ministries
- A candlelight meditation utilizing the vast Cathedral space, and a quality worship experience, celebrating the Eucharist at the high altar.
- A daytime tour of the Cathedral, highlighting the story of the Cathedral as well as Christian tradition as it is embodied in the building.
