Share Your Vision

We were recently asked by the Stewardship ministers to share our vision for St. Timothy's. This simple request was sent to every household on our mailing list, and handed out to every adult who came to one of our Sunday services on September 10th. It may be that you've never thought about the Church's mission - doesn't Jesus already make it very clear, in the Gospels, what we are to do? Or maybe you've never shared your thoughts with anyone before - who would you tell? Would your ideas really make a difference? In the Episcopal Church "vision", our sense of mission, doesn't come from the clergy, or from the Church staff; it comes from all of us, all the people of God. Those unique inspirations that no one else has had, as well as the inspirations shared by many, are all very important in determining how we respond to God and our neighbors – in this community and in the world. Each of us has our own singular missions – listening to a co-worker who is going through a rough time, sharing faith with a friend, taking a meal to a neighbor in distress, giving some of our financial treasure to support an important endeavor. We also have common ministries - congregational worship, helping the marginal and homeless in this community, missions in other places, inviting and welcoming people into this family of God.

Your vision, your inspiration, is critical in determining how we, the people of St. Timothy's, honor God and serve our neighbors in the name of Jesus Christ. If you haven't thought about this, please do. And if you haven't shared your vision with anyone, please do. Spend some quiet moments alone with God. Ask God to show you want God wants you to do, what God wants the Church to do. Be receptive; illumination may come right away, and all at once, or it may come later, a little bit at a time. Record your thoughts. And share them with our Stewardship ministers or with your clergy. God's mission is

A rule of life consists of simple things: saying prayers at meals or before bed, worshipping in community, teaching or taking a class, or participating in an outreach project. Making this list can help you take stock of the routines that are already in place and new patterns you might want to explore. May this season be one that fills your spirit with good things! St. Timothy's Fall & Winter Celebrations

We are in the last weeks of the Church's longest season, Pentecost, our celebration of God's presence in the Holy Spirit. On November 5th we will give thanks for All the Saints (and acknowledge St. Timothy's 138th birthday!). In the evening of November 19th we will join with Christians of various denominations for our annual ecumenical Thanksgiving Holy Communion service (hosted this year by the good people of Herndon United Methodist Church – the offering will go to LINK). We will have an 11:00 am Holy Eucharist on November 23rd, Thanksgiving Day. The last Sunday of the Pentecost season is November 26, also known as Christ the King Sunday. The season of Advent begins on December 3rd. And, because the 4th Sunday of Advent is also Christmas Eve we will have only one service that morning, at 9:30 am. We will have our usual Christmas Eve services at 5:00 pm (children's service; adults welcome), 7:00 pm (traditional service), and 10:00 pm (carols, anthems, and traditional service), and Christmas Day service at 11:00 am.

Stewardship Annual Pledge Drive Begins October 1.

Please prayerfully consider the level of financial support you can provide to keep St. Timothy's mission and ministries strong. The following is provided for your consideration:

"Proportionate giving" means that shares of our personal resources of time and talents and treasure are being devoted to God's work on a regular schedule. It is a commitment made in response to the love which God has shown for us through His Son, Jesus Christ, as well in events of daily life. It is an offering of "our selves, our souls and our bodies".

This simple worksheet offers a means of determining one's present percentage level of pledged *financial* support for St Timothy's and establishing a commitment for the coming year. This is intended for personal use with prayerful consideration in the privacy of your home. Along with this we also ask your prayerful consideration of how you might share your *time* and *talents* in the service of God through joining in the many activities and ministries of our church.

1. To find your current level of financial support of our church, divide your annual pledge by your income for the same period.

Example: Your figures:
A. Current income \$ 20,000 \$
B. Current pledge \$ 600 \$
C. Current percentage level 3% %
(Divide line B by line A)

- 2. A financial commitment for the coming year might be based on the following requested increase by 1% of gross income option:
 - 1. Expected income \$ 21,000
 - 2. Current percentage plus 1%=4% %
 - 3. New commitment \$ 840

Your annual commitment can be remitted in weekly, monthly, quarterly, semi-annual or annual offerings. Thank you for participating with St. Timothy's in building up the visible presence of God in the world.

Well Done, Good and Faithful Steward

What do you think of when you hear the word Stewardship? For many, money is the first thing that comes to mind. Giving of one's treasure is just a part of faithful Stewardship. Being in partnership with God during one's lifetime, recognizing that God loves us, sharing that love with others, and having an impact on others loving God is being a faithful steward. The following is the fifth in a series of articles that have appeared in the WORD throughout the year in which parishioners have tried to express their answer to the call of Stewardship. The following was contributed by Caitlin Vierra, a member of our youth group, taken in part from a Sermon she delivered in February 2006.



Be a Good Steward

Have you ever thought about how blessed you are? Living in this area of Virginia, in this part of the world, gives us unfair advantages compared to most of the world's population. Most of you probably understand where I am coming from. Still others aren't aware of what goes on outside of our community: people begging for money in the streets of DC and New York, children in third world countries starving, people dying because they can't get proper treatment for a sickness as simple as an ear infection. These people suffer so much yet you hear stories of how the Lord is involved in their lives in a very uplifting way and how they appreciate so much what we take for granted.

I saw this first hand when I participated in the youth group's mission trip to Dungannon. I remember the first house I ever worked on. The woman couldn't have been older than my parents. She didn't have much. She lived in a trailer with her daughter and didn't have money to splurge on her like most parents do. Her porch was – well, if you stepped further out than 3 feet I swear you would've fallen through, and SHE – HAD - NO - TELEVISION. I think most teens live off of TV so it would've been miserable and unbearable for most of us. Anyway, her house was our jobsite and we were to redo the porch, the roof, and the ceiling in her sitting area. I'll never forget the moment we finished our work. Sarah, Steph, and I were giving her a backpack full of goodies for her daughter when she started to cry... it touched all of our hearts. You don't really realize how helping out a little bit in a person's life can make such a difference. We hugged her as tears of happiness streamed down her face. She could barely talk, but I clearly remember her saying, "God bless you", and she told us how grateful she was that God sent us to do good in her community which had so little. My heart was touched by what felt like the warmth of the sun's rays.

Fall Choir Schedule Offers Something For Everyone

Sing to the Lord a NEW SONG! It is time once again to announce the beginning of a new year of singing and ringing to the glory of God! We have many opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to become involved in our Music Ministry. As always, I want to encourage everyone to come and check us out! Our choirs meet weekly for rehearsals and sing and ring regularly for Sunday services and other special occasions. Previous musical experience is never required and becoming a member of one of our ensembles is a fantastic way to become acquainted with the basics of music.

So, without further ado, here is our schedule for the 2006-2007 season of music at St. Timothy's:

TUESDAY: 6:00 – 7:00 p.m. YOUTH CHOIR Ages 8+

7:00 – 8:30 p.m. ST. CECILIA CHOIR Intergenerational - no minimum age requirement

WEDNESDAY: 6:00 – 7:00 p.m. HANDBELL CHOIR Ages 13+

7:00 - 8:00 p.m. HANDBELL CHOIR Ages 14+

THURSDAY: 7:30 – 9:00 p.m. ST. AMBROSE CHOIR Ages 14+

Youth Choir: is for youths ages 8 and older. We use the training methods developed by the Royal School of Church Music which teaches choristers the basics of music reading, theory, and correct vocal production. It is a valuable way for youth to become actively involved in the life of the Church and learn about the vital ministry and gift of music.

St. Cecilia Choir: provides choral support in the form of hymns and anthems for the 9:30 a.m. service each Sunday. Beginning this year, we will be meeting on Tuesday evenings to rehearse music for the following Sunday. We encourage everyone interested, including parents and their children, to come together and help lead the congregation in making a Joyful Noise!

Handbell Choirs: We have such a great interest in ringing handbells at St. Timothy's that we discovered one choir simply was not enough! Therefore, now we have two choirs that will begin meeting on Wednesdays to rehearse and ring as scheduled throughout the year. Traditionally, our first handbell choir is more accessible to those who may be new to ringing or reading music. However, both choirs continually welcome new members as space permits, so I encourage everyone to turn in their registration forms as early as possible!

St. Ambrose Choir: is for "adults" ages 14 and older. This choir meets regularly for rehearsals and sings each Sunday for the 11:00 a.m. service, providing musical support through the singing of hymns and anthems.

Last year the Music Ministry began what turned out to be a successful and inspiring concert series featuring musicians from the area, followed by dessert receptions and a time for fellowship.

This year, I am excited to announce we have a number of exceptionally talented artists planning to come and share their gifts with St. Timothy's.

Green Flag Schools?

Check this out at www.greenflagschools.org. The Green Flag Program gives students the opportunity to become stewards of the earth through investigation and action in their schools. By examining their school and community to find and solve environmental problems, students are taking an active role in protecting creation.

Most importantly, the Green Flag Program empowers teachers, parents and community leaders to protect our children – priceless yet vulnerable members of the human family. Unfortunately, children's environmental health is often neglected in the school environment. In most schools across the country, little is known about common school contaminates, and so little policy exists to protect children from environmental hazards. Poor indoor air quality, toxic pesticides, hazardous cleaning products, diesel fumes – all these and more threaten the health and well-being of children in schools today. The Green Flag Program engages school communities with these issues, and provides them with the tools they need to pass protective policies and protect their children from harm.

St. Timothy's gleaners really showed their stuff on Saturday, September 23rd. Each gleaner averaged about 80 pounds of apples during the course of the morning. In total, the gleaners that came out that morning picked approximately 3,700 pounds of apples or more than 11,000 servings -- all that will be in the hands of those who need it most within 24 to 48 hours. Gleaning is the ancient Biblical tradition of taking the leftover from the harvest and getting it to those most in need. Today, the Society of St. Andrew coordinates gleaning trips across the country -- approximately 30,000 volunteers nationwide help to glean over 15 million pounds of fresh fruit and produce that would otherwise go to waste in the fields. St. Timothy's gleaners brought back approximately 30 pounds of apples to donate to the Reston Interfaith shelter. See you next year!
