I thought I was keenly aware of the exquisite frailty and wondrous grace of life until the news of recent natural disasters put me on my knees more than ever. Lord, have mercy on those assaulted by hurricanes and earthquakes.

It is frightening to realize just how impotent and vulnerable we are. We take inordinate pride in our buildings and technology. We imagine we are secure, but we are not. On any day the clouds overhead can gather in fury, the earth beneath us can buckle, creation is devastated, people and animals perish. Scientists disagree about the causes - some say we have disrupted this planet's balance with greenhouse gases, causing more numerous and more severe storms. Others say we are simply in that part of a natural planetary cycle with greater storm activity. Either way, the earth is busy and in some places dangerous. Literally and actually, life on fault lines is tenuous.

Some people despair. Some others "seize the day" (carpe diem). Christians neither sink into dark fear nor seek escape in hedonistic revelry. We turn to God for the assurance that we are loved, that we have been given the gift of eternal life in Jesus Christ. And we turn to our neighbors to lend our aid. We work for justice, freedom, and peace. In the midst of life's upheavals the people of God are called to be generously charitable, indiscriminately compassionate. We share our material resources with those who suffer. And we share our faith as well.

Life is too precious and good to waste in hopelessness, too challenging and frail to squander in riotous living. Christ came to give us abundant life, life with all the sorrows and all the joys, and life without end.

From the Book of Common Prayer, "In the midst of things we cannot fully understand give us grace, O God, to trust and believe in the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, and the resurrection to everlasting life." Amen.

And I leave you with this traditional Gaelic blessing:

May the road rise to meet you,

Many blessings until we meet again,

May the wind be always at your back,

May the sun shine warm upon your face;

The rains fall soft upon your fields and until we again,

May God hold you in the palm of His hand.

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Vestry Notes:

From Vestry minutes of September 26, 2005

Approved October 24, 2005

Treasurer's Report: For the budget to remain on target, approximately \$10,200 must be provided at each Sunday and holiday for the remainder of the year.

 $^{\text{t}}$ The debt reduction fund has received donations totaling \$32,050.

✤ Year to date expenses are in line with budgets except for some unbudgeted items including an unplanned computer purchase and payroll services.

The diocese has requested that St. Timothy's contribute \$4.25 per household per year (or about \$1,300) for publication of the Virginia Episcopalian. The Finance Committee recommends placement of a notice in the Word requesting voluntary contributions.

✤ Vestry approved requested reduction of the fee charged to TOPS, a weight loss group for use of church space.

The Town of Herndon has approved the final inspection of required repairs. The escrow funds (\$30,000) must be released by action of the Herndon Town council and is anticipated to be received by the end of October.

Action Items:

The budget for the courtyard project is \$25,000.
St. Timothy's has collected \$10,000. Landscaping is postponed until Spring.

The Finance Committee will prepare a proposal to ask for funds from the congregation for the Diocesan Mustard Seed Fund. This fund has been used, in the past, to purchase our elevator and support our Lakota project.

✤ St. Timothy's is developing a gift registry. "Wish list" items for parishioners to donate should be forwarded to Jan Koch. All gifts must be approved by the Vestry.

✤ Kedron has accepted a new call as Director of Church Relations with Episcopal Relief and Development to begin in November.

Therefore, with God's help, we will: open our doors, enhance our worship, and increase our involvement through all of our ministries. The 2006 budgets for the ministries should be completed by the October Vestry meeting. A brief summary of ministry activities for the Annual Report should be sent to Pat McGibbon as soon as possible.

The church Annual Meeting is scheduled for January 8. The Vestry retreat will be held January 14-15. Retiring Vestry members (Dave Parker, Tom McLenigan, Lili Soto-Harmon and Pat MacGibbon) and the clergy for the nominating committee for the next Vestry. Nominees for Vestry, endowment fund, and delegates to the regional and diocesan Council should be posted 30 days prior to the election.

✤ A Braille prayer book consisting of 13 volumes has been purchased (and dedicated).

Our Suffragan Bishop, David C. Jones, will be with us at our 11:00 am service of Confirmation on Sunday, December 4th. And we will honor Bishop Jones with a reception following the service. Christmas Luminaries

For the past few years (thanks to some very stalwart souls, and weather permitting) we have had luminaries around our outdoor chapel on Christmas Eve. They add a very reverent touch to our celebration of Christ's birth. And we hope to have them again this year, but we'd like to do something different. As we encourage St. Timothy's members to contribute a poinsettia to decorate the Altar and Sanctuary, and publish the thanksgivings and memorials of contributors, we will likewise do with the luminaries. Individuals, couples, or families may contribute a luminary (or luminaries) in memory or thanksgiving. These will be published. And, contributors will actually have an opportunity to set the luminary(ies) out along the path to and around the outdoor chapel. The luminary bags, sand, and candles will be provided by the Church. Watch for information as we get closer to the Feast of the Incarnation.

Do You Know About Our Wednesday Service?

St. Timothy's has at least four services every week – three on Sunday (8:00 am, 9:30 am, and 11:00 am). We also have a service every Wednesday at 12:15 pm. Wednesday services are "Healing and Holy Eucharist." The life of a different saint or martyr is remembered each week in the Scripture readings and brief homily. After prayers and confession the celebrant dips his/her thumb in oil that has been blessed and gently makes the sign of the cross on the forehead of each person who wishes to be anointed, while a prayer for the healing of body, mind, and spirit is quietly offered. The service lasts about 40 minutes and is a peaceful way to reconnect with the One who loves us, and restores us.

You Can Be An Angel To Someone

The Service Ministry is once again sponsoring an Angel Tree this Christmas to help local families have a bright and happy holiday. You can show a child or adult the light of God's love by taking a tag from the Angel Tree and purchasing a gift for that person to open on Christmas morning. LINK Holiday Food Program

Volunteers Needed For 3 Hours To Help On December 20th.

We've started our forth session of the Nurturing Parenting Program already! This time the focus is on

families raising African-American children. So far it's a great success. The last night of the session will be on December 20th and we need help. Did I mention good food & cake are involved? On December 20th St. Tim's will heat up the food that the participating families bring to the church, serve it & CUT the CAKE! Then clean up. This will

Volunteer Needs for Day Labor Project Project Hope & Harmony

The following positions are needed:

Site Coordinators – Shift workers needed to assist in daily work of matching employers with laborers and referring laborers to on-site and off-site program resources. Needed initially for general assistance during initial days of operation, and thereafter to fill out shift schedules and/or substitute for absences. Training provided; Spanish a plus, but not necessary. Time commitment: regular or as available anytime M-F, 6am-11am or Sa-Su, 7am-12noon.

Site Opening Transition Guides and Monitors – Assist laborers and employers find the site on opening day and in the days/weeks following. Will guide walkers, cyclists, and motorists to the new site during the hours of operation, and from the site upon daily closing, and assist in monitoring/reporting any problems. Training provided, Spanish a plus but not necessary.

ESL Coordinator – Manage outreach, scheduling and logistics for a regular on-site ESL program offered by staffed by volunteers (identify human and didactic materials needed, schedule and supervise volunteers).

Workshop Trainers – Offer or coordinate off-site workshops/trainings to be held after site closing in vocational/educational areas identified by day laborers, such as: carpentry, painting (styles and textures), landscaping, plumbing, HVAC, machinery use and safety, welding, measurement conversions (US standards), electrical, tile and brick-laying, carpet/floor installation, reading architectural/construction plans, computer/tech skills, occupational safety, HAZMAT removal, Field Engineer assistant.

Bicycle Donations Campaign Manager – Promote and coordinate donations of appropriate, working bicycles for day laborer use; take charge of donation log, storing, distribution to day laborers. Coordinate repairs and donations of accessories such as locks, helmets, repair kits.

Bicycle Mechanics/Handymen – Provide timely repair of bicycles donated to the project and/or conduct bicycle repair seminars for day laborers.

Translators – Translate written materials (minutes, articles, letters, newsletters, site signage, official handouts, etc.) from English to Spanish, or vice versa.

Professional Services (Pro Bono or Nonprofit Discount) – Immediate:

Contractor – to oversee construction of sidewalk and other impermeable services on the site (identify human and material resources needed and supervise effort) and shelter; oversee installation of bicycle racks and traffic flow, parking, other signage on site (early November).

Mechanical/Plumbing/Electrical Engineer(s) – to guide PH&H through steps needed to get mobile office connected to water/sewer/electricity, and control booth to electricity (mid-October); to guide PH&H through steps to get shelter connected to electricity (mid-November).

GIS/Mapping Specialist – to prepare a large, mounted aerial photo with route overlays showing the approved day labor site and recommended public access routes to it; prepare inexpensive pocket maps to the site, for laborers (showing recommended public access routes) and for current and potential employers (a "how to get there" map).

Interpreters – to interpret for English-only and Spanish-only participants in public venues (e.g., Community Advisory Board meetings, worker assemblies, public hearings, press events, etc.)

Landscaping – to recommend and oversee plantings of additional shrubbery and flowering plants as appropriate.

Other Key Positions (Opening and Ongoing)

Opening Day Celebration Organizers – to prepare mailing list of invitees, send invitations, organize Opening Day agenda, prepare logistics, set-up, clean-up.

Vendor Researchers – to research options and present recommendations and bids for service providers needed on site: mobile food vendor, trash collection, portable johns.

Handymen/women – to work with day laborers in doing odd jobs in preparation for site opening (clean siding of mobile office, put on mobile office skirt, spruce up area with mulch and other landscaping ideas, paint for parking area curbs and lines, etc.)

Move-In Assistants – to work with day laborers to help with moving day packing, transportation, unpacking, set-up, etc.

Committee Positions – to serve on Project Hope & Harmony committees for ongoing work such as Advocacy and Communications, Community Outreach, Facilities Management, Program and Volunteer Coordination, or other committees/task forces of interest.

Rev. Lauren Stanley to Preach on November 13

The Rev. Lauren R. Stanley is an appointed missionary in the Diocese of Renk in the Episcopal Church of Sudan. She began what she hopes will be a six-year term of service in July of this year. Her call to mission is focused primarily in two ways: first as a witness, both to the Sudanese by her presence in Renk, and for the Sudanese on her visits back to the United States; and second as a teacher of peace in a land torn by war for the last 21 years. Rev. Stanley teaches at the Renk Bible College, helping to re-establish that institution after it was demolished by the Sudanese government in 2004 in order to build a new highway. At present, she teaches Introduction to Theology; in the Winter Term, she will teach classes in Christian Doctrine and English.



EFM is a four year curriculum, developed by the University of the South, School of Theology. Each class concludes with our worship as a community of faith.

Our group meets on Tuesday mornings at St. Timothy's from 9:30 to noon, January to December. For the convenience of mothers of school-age children, we adjust our schedule to match the Fairfax County school calendar, including breaks for "snow days", holidays, and summer vacation.
