
Thanksgiving Delights

You are warmly invited to join other parishioners on Tuesday, November 30 at 10:15 a.m. for a sample class of Education for Ministries' (EfM) Theological Reflection, refreshments and an opportunity to explore the possibilities for spiritual enrichment. Education for Ministry is a life enriching, and often life -changing, theological education course for lay persons. Offered as a distance learn-



ing program through the School of Theology at the University of the South, EfM is not just a program of learning the Bible; it teaches you

how to think theologically, deepens your faith, enhances and shapes your special gifts and ministries in your everyday life.



How does EfM work? Participants commit one year at a time to meet once a week in a group seminar. Completion of the course takes four years, during which you study the Scriptures, church history and contemporary theology. During your seminars, you discuss your readings, reflect theologically, worship, and share food together. Our new session will begin in January 2011, meeting on Tuesday mornings. Fuel Up with

Tree Trimmings!

UOP LLC, a company owned by Honeywell, has recently been chosen to supply its technology in the Rentech Inc. Rialto Renewable Energy Center in California. The Energy

Center will convert biomass (think yard waste, grass clip-



pings, tree trimmings) to transportation fuels such as clean diesel fuel. The center is anticipated to generate around 640 barrels-per-day of liquid fuel and 35 megawatts (mw) of base-load electricity, which is enough to power approximately 30,000 homes daily. It is efforts like these that seek to use our limited resources in ways never thought possible twenty years ago. (A Message from St. Timothy's Steward of Creation.)

LINK Holiday Basket News

The LINK food pantry is preparing to serve families in Reston, Herndon, and Ashburn with their annual Holiday Food Basket program. LINK will serve over 300 families during each of the basket distributions held in November and December. Families register in advance for a space on the distribution roster and are assigned a time to "shop." On the day of distribution, they are invited to collect a quantity of food, based on family size, at the host church. Families choose from a wide variety of non-perishable foods, fresh baked goods, and frozen meats.

The first distribution will take place Saturday, November 20 from 8:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. Food will be distributed at Trinity Presbyterian in Herndon and Christ the Redeemer Catholic Church in Sterling. Winter coats will also be distributed November 20, at Sterling United Methodist Church.

Food donations can be delivered to Henry Hall near the LINK grocery cart. Or, donations may be dropped off at the distribution locations during the times noted below. Volunteers are needed to assist with sorting food at either church prior to distribution, and on the day of distribution, help families collect their groceries or choose a winter coat.

Nominations for Vestry

Every January, at the Annual Parish Meeting, six new members are elected to serve on the Vestry. Nominees voted who rank in the top four will replace four outgoing members. The nominee ranked fifth will fill a oneyear vacant position, and the nominee ranked sixth will serve as Vestry

Alternate.

Leading up to this event, which falls on January 8, 2011, is the nominating process; this involves a nominating committee seeking potential candidates to run. The committee is made up of outgoing Vestry members; this year it is Jim Hendrick, Dave Hixon, Tricia Mussante, and Hollis Colie. You may have been approached by one or more of the members asking whether you would be interested in serving in this capacity. Perhaps you are interested in serving, but may not have been asked by a member. If you are called to this mission, you are encouraged to talk to one of the outgoing Vestry members about the nominating process. It is vital to gather information and understand the expectations and responsibilities involved. Once you have prayerfully considered your nomination and are ready to go forward, a committee member can help you with the process.

The following information helps to familiarize parish members with some of the requirements and expectations for Vestry members. Please do not hesitate to contact the committee with questions, or for more information. Names, telephone numbers and e-mails are listed on the last page of The WORD.

Vestry FYI

Did you know?

Vestry members must be baptized Christians of at least 16 years of age, elected by the congregation, and be willing to serve as a legal representative of the parish in all matters concerning its corporate property and the relationship of the parish to its Clergy.

The Vestry functions with 12 members. Vestry members may serve only one term of three years. Terms rotate, so that new members are elected every year.

The Senior Warden (sometimes referred to as "the Rector's Warden") and the Junior Warden (sometimes referred to as "the People's Warden"), the Treasurer and the Registrar are elected by the Vestry and hold their positions for one year. The Wardens provide leadership within the Vestry, serve as "official" liaisons to the Clergy, and are authorized to sign checks on behalf of the church.

The Vestry-Alternate is encouraged to fully participate in Vestry meetings and discussions. Although the Alternate is not required to attend meetings and is not able to vote, the Alternate must be prepared to step in should a Vestry member withdraw during the year; in which case, the Alternate would serve until the next election.

Liaisons to the Ministries

Vestry members also assume a liaison function with one of the *nearly 30 ministries* at St. Timothy's. The Junior Warden serves as "Ad Hoc Liaison" to all ministries not served by a designated liaison. The Senior Warden is considered a member of every ministry and assists wherever necessary.

The liaison function is designed to provide a two-way communication channel between the Vestry and the ministry: to keep ministries aware of anything that might affect them, and to enable ministries to bring issues to the Vestry's attention. Liaisons generally attend their ministry's meetings and participate in ministry activities. Liaisons are also required to review and countersign any expense vouchers completed by their Ministry Chair. Liaison assignments are renewed every year at the Vestry retreat.

All ministries are encouraged to participate in semi-annual Vestry-Ministry meetings. This successful innovation grew from the realization that some ministries could benefit from enhanced communication with the larger parish in order to stay informed.

Annual Vestry Retreat

Until this year, the weekend following Vestry elections, all Vestry members returning and new - have participated in a weekend retreat. For budget reason, this year's will only be one day at the church. In addition to the 12 members of the Vestry, the Rector, the Associate Rector, the Vestry-Alternate, the Treasurer, and the Registrar are all invited. This retreat, and other activities, help bind the Vestry as a working group, rather than merely a collection of people. (Even individuals who have been quite active at St. Timothy's may not have met other individuals who attend a different service. The retreat offers everyone an opportunity to become acquainted.)

Vestry Meetings

Vestry meetings are held monthly and are open to all church members.

Although not a member of the Vestry, the Rector proposes the agenda for

comment prior to the meeting and facilitates the meeting, with the assistance of the Wardens. Meetings start with members being invited to share where they have recently seen God in their life, followed by an inspired reading and prayer. The Treasurer reports on income, spending and any budget issues. The group then works through items of ongoing and new business. Meetings conclude with the singing of the Doxology.

Invited guests and those parishoners who have requested to address the Vestry may make presentations or proposals during the meetings.

Stewardship FAQ

The Stewardship Ministry is still actively seeking your pledges for 2011. You may send in or drop off your completed pledge form in the church office. Blank pledge forms are available in the narthex.

For those who may be interested, we are providing answers to some frequently asked questions:

1. How many families have been asked to pledge to St. Timothy's in 2011? The Stewardship sent out over 400 letters with pledge forms this year. Over 160 families pledged in 2010.

2. Does the Diocese of Virginia contribute to St. Timothy's? No. St. Timothy's, like many Episcopal churches, is self-sustaining. We pay our clergys' salaries and benefits, pay the mortgage, all property expenses, and provide for our ministries. In addition, we annually contribute to the Diocese.

3. What is the average amount pledged annually to St. Timothy's per household? In 2010, the average pledge per household is \$ 3,486.

4. What is the median amount

pledged annually per household? In 2010, the median pledge per household is \$ 2,100.

The Breath of God?

Well, actually, yes! He breathes life into us all and His spirit swirls all around us. Why not tap into this energy source at both a spiritual and physical level? The Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) has issued a report in October 2010 which comprehensively analyzes key factors impacting the deployment of offshore wind power in the United States. This report includes a detailed assessment of the nation's offshore wind industry and resources, including future job growth potential. The report also analyzes the technology challenges, economics, permitting procedures, and the potential risks and benefits of offshore deployment in U.S. waters. The NREL report finds that harnessing even a fraction of the nation's potential offshore wind resources, estimated to be more than 4,000 gw, could create thousands of jobs and help revitalize America's manufacturing sector, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, diversify U.S. energy supplies, and provide cost-competitive electricity to key coastal regions. 
