In fact we'd be much better off without all of the things we have and what we still hope to gain; things weigh us down, they drain our energy, they get in the way of our relation- Pastor ships, they strangle our souls.

Happiness is not found in getting, it's found in giving.

I invite you to rediscover the joy of giving, and the freedom that giving produces. Pick something that's important to you, an object, and give it to somebody else. Choose a charity (or your Church) and make a significant donation. Take time out from work and duties and spend that time with someone who is important to you. Give, and discover what it's like to be truly alive, abundantly

We've all seen it; the Styrofoam coffee cups are replaced by eco-friendly biodegradable "hot" cups only to watch as consumers double-up on the new ecofriendly cups in order to have the same insulation feel as the Styrofoam cups. Another case in point: we all have seen the new "eco" rest-room facilities with the new soap dispensers that "foam" the soap so it lasts longer. Often, the normal paper towels have been replaced with the "100% Recycled" paper towels that, candidly, do not feel as substantial as the old paper towels we are all use to using to dry our hands. I have repeatedly observed people who trigger the soap dispenser three, four, and five times to obtain the "old" amount of soap they were accustomed to getting. Next, they turn to the eco-friendly paper towels and pull out one, two, three, sometimes four or five paper towels to dry their hands. I wondered, "what good is

History of The Closet: The Closet is a nonprofit thrift shop in the heart of historic downtown Herndon and has been in business for over 35 years. It is one of the community outreach ministries St. Timothy's supports.

The Closet was founded in 1974 by a handful of churches including St. Timothy's to assist low-income families by selling used clothing at a nominal price. Over the years, the mission has expanded and it has become a significant resource for the greater Herndon area. The Closet provides clothing to truly needy individuals and uses its profits to support worthwhile community programs.

The Closet sells a wide variety of donated items, including clothes and shoes; housewares such as dishes, kitchenware and linens; electronics; sporting goods; books, videos, cd's and record albums; artwork and frames; toys; and knickknacks. Donations are welcome.

LINK Holiday Basket News

LINK will serve over 700 families this holiday season by providing a week's worth of groceries to registered clients. The program changed this year to offer a more reliable system of scheduling families for pick-up of their groceries. In October, in person registration was held at two church distribution locations. As in past years, the food distributions are held at Trinity Presbyterian in Herndon and Christ the Redeemer Catholic Church in Sterling. Coat distributions are held at Sterling United Methodist.

Also new this year is the suggested donation of a BAG of groceries rather than the classic "can." Families typically receive 5 to 10 bags of groceries, based on number of family members, through this program. This requires a tremendous amount of donations. Cash donations are also welcome. Please make checks payable to LINK. Look for designated collection areas in Henry Hall to leave donations or, take them to the churches noted below.

The Holiday Basket program is an ideal opportunity for those who want to serve this season. Any age volunteer is welcome. Scout troops, students needing service hours, neighborhood and community groups are all encouraged to participate. In addition to food donations, LINK needs volunteers to collect and sort donations prior to the distribution date, translators, and volunteers to assist clients the day of distribution.


