From the Rector: The Gift of Hope

On Saturday, November 9th, six of us from St. Timothy's will fly from Dulles to Port-au-Prince, Haiti, where friends will greet us. We will visit in the city with Pere Kesner Gracia, then ride to the village of Cange. On our way we will also visit the village of Mirebalais, which has a brand new teaching hospital. When I conducted medical missions to Haiti in 1982 and 1983, I stayed in Mirebalais; that village, Cange, and Peligre were the poorest in the country; they are now model villages. Change can happen, but it takes time and dedication.

In Cange, the closest city to "our" village of Chapateau that can accomodate us, the new priest there - Pere Milor - and I will conduct a Sunday morning Holy Eucharist attended by about 700 people (standing room only for folks who are late!). The choir is amazing! These often frail, undernourished, faithful people can blow the walls down and raise the roof with singing! The service will last two hours - or more. And we will attend another service that evening which has to be experienced to be believed – the people, old and young, dance and sing for at least two hours! There are no prayer books or hymnals; everything is memorized or spontaneous.

On Monday Pere Milor will go with us to Chapoteau. Getting to this small, isolated village involves riding for awhile in a couple of trucks (a dozen trucks were given to the Diocese of Haiti by the Diocese of Virginia), climbing into a small boat, crossing Lake Peligre, and scaling a steep mountain. Much of this area has never been mapped. Three-fourths of Haiti is mountainous; the highest peaks are almost 9000 feet above sea level. It's the dry season; temperatures will be in the mid 90's. There won't be any air conditioning anywhere we go, and precious little water- except what we buy.

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Bishop Shannon Johnston visits Nov. 24

Our Diocesan Bishop will visit us on Sunday November 24th at 2:00 pm. That's an unusual time but our three Bishops have 185 Churches, several schools and other institutions to visit ever year. Bishop Shannon will Confirm, Receive, or hear the reaffirmation of vows of several people, possibly including some of our Latin American sisters and brothers who worship in St. Timothy's on Saturday evening from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm. Our friend The Rev. Natividad Menjivar started this mission, and it is well attended. The Bishop will also preside at a Holy Eucharist service for us. I hope you will worship Sunday morning, welcome our Bishop in the afternoon, and come support our newest members.

LINK Holiday Food Program

On November 16, LINK will hold the annual Thanksgiving food distribution at Trinity Presbyterian in Herndon and Christ the Redeemer Catholic Church in Sterling. During the program, LINK provides a week of groceries to eligible families. In addition, coats, hats and gloves are distributed at Sterling United Methodist Church. With your help, over 800 families were served in November 2012.

Donations of non-perishable food can be placed in the collection box on the lower level near the stairs. Gently used coats, hats and gloves are also welcome.

Volunteers are needed Nov. 11 thru 16 to assist with sorting and transporting food, and escorting clients during distribution on the 16th. The quartet Patagonia Winds and our handbell choir will accompany our organ. And our choirs combine to create indescribably beautiful celebrations of our Savior's birth. Come, and bring family, neighbors, friends, and co-workers to experience a soul stirring evening. +

8 cents + Lions = Vision!

Consider the humble donation of unused eyeglasses in the Henry Hall drop box.

According to The World Health Organization, 153 million people have uncorrected refractive errors (near-sightedness, far-sightedness or astigmatism). Most of these vision impairments are quickly diagnosed and easy to treat with corrective lenses. Still, millions of people in developing nations and the U.S. are pushed deeper into poverty simply because they don't have glasses. They can't learn, because reading is difficult. They can't work to the best of their ability, because they can't see clearly.

Lions clubs collect millions of eyeglasses each year to address the need for glasses. It costs Lions less than \$0.08 to provide a pair of recycled eyeglasses and change someone's life. For children, clear vision means a better education, healthier development and a better quality of life. For adults, it means greater employment opportunity and economic strength. For seniors it means less dependence on others.

Cornerstones: Why did Reston Interfaith Change its Name?

As the current Vice Chair of Cornerstones representing St. Timothy's, I wanted to share more information about our recent name change. The Board of Directors, after a thorough and thoughtful process, voted to change the name of Reston Interfaith to Cornerstones. If you are like me, this will take a bit of time to sink in and fully adopt. I also hope like me that after living with the name a bit you will be as excited as I am.

Let me share a few of the reasons informing our decision.

- We are seeking to be ever more inclusive of all our supporters and donors.
- Our services are now being provided throughout northwestern Fairfax County. As advocates for those in need, our voice is heard beyond Reston—throughout

Northern VA and metro DC, in Richmond and on Capitol Hill.

- The name Cornerstones has meaning in each of our faith traditions and we will always hold to the core values that our congregation brings to the mission.
- At the same time the name lends itself to expanded outreach to additional groups and supporters.
- Most importantly, the new name highlights our mission to help families build more stable lives. A cornerstone connotes a pivotal element around which this happens.

As the transitional tagline says: "Reston Interfaith has changed its name. The mission remains the same." We will have the ongoing opportunity and responsibility to care for those in need in our community. We rolled out our new name at this end of this summer with a bang, thanks to support from The Container Store. The Container Store approached our organization and offered to pay for all media related to their new store opening in Reston and pledged to 10% of all sales during their opening weekend to Cornerstones. Thanks to the generosity of their store and its customers, Cornerstones earned \$22,000 in addition to a lot of free publicity.

I invite you to embrace the name and see how you can become a Cornerstone by visiting www.cornerstonesva.org. I'd also thank the Service Ministry for their support of Cornerstones throughout the years. I have been honored to serve Cornerstones on behalf of our congregation and look forward to continuing my service.

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At the top of the mountain, Renard will be waiting for us, with the twenty-five children we support and their parents. The children will have their uniforms on (the best clothing they have) and their school books. They will have a meal of rice and beans (their only meal for the day), and medical care is about two hours away if they need it. All of this is a gift from you. There are at least one hundred other children in the village who receive no support and thus don't go to school. Instead they try to fish in the polluted lake for sustanance, or work if they can find it.

While we are in Haiti we hope to visit Pere Wisnel and Pere Michelin (they are several hours away through one of the most densely populated urban areas in the world). When we return we will tell anyone who will listen what we have seen, and how we can help. Our friendship with the people of Haiti and our support of the children are more precious to them than we can possibly imagine. Through everything they suffer – crushing poverty, earthquakes, hurricanes – our relationship gives them the priceless gift of hope. And they show us faith and generosity way beyond anything we have ever known.

This is also true with the poor and homeless here in Northern Virginia, in Appalachia, and on the Pine Ridge Reservation. When we help other people, we invariably receive more than we give. I invite you to spend a week in your church office, or sign up for the next trip to Dungannon, Pine Ridge, or Haiti. And I thank you, with all my heart and soul, for your support of these missions.

Did you know? November 22 is St. Cecelia Day!

Cecilia is traditionally the patron saint of singers, organ builders, musicians and poets. Details of her life are not known and much of what we do know comes from later periods. 5th century sources tell that Cecilia was a Christian of noble birth and was betrothed to a pagan named Valerian. Cecilia's witness to Christ resulted in the conversion of Valerian and his brother, Tiburtius, but both were martyred and Cecilia was arrested as she attended to their burial. She, herself, is believed to have been martyred around 280 A.D.

Since the 14th century she has been shown in art often playing the organ, especially portrayed by Raphael in his famous altarpiece for San Giovanni-in Monte, Bologna, pained in 1516. Composers such as Handel, Purcell, Howells and Britten have written choral works and mass settings in her honor and many music schools, choral societies and concert series bear her name.

In view of the coming fundraising effort towards a new purchasing a new organ for St. Timothy's on November 17th, we can well remember Cecilia's love of music and her faith.
