One of my favorites (though it is not assigned to Advent or Christmas) is number 475 in our hymnal. Both the melody and the words touch a deep place in my soul, especially during this time of year.

- 1. God himself is with us; let us all adore him, and with awe appear before him. God is here within us; souls in silence fear him, humbly, fervently draw near him. Now his own who have known God, in worship lowly, yield their spirits wholly.
- 2. Gladly, Lord we offer thine to be for ever, soul and life and each endeavor. Help us to surrender earth's deceitful treasures, pride of life, and sinful pleasures: thou alone shalt be known Lord of all our being, life's true way decreeing.
- 3. Thou pervadest all things; let thy radiant beauty light mine eyes to see my duty. As the tender flowers eagerly unfold them, to the sunlight calmly hold them, so let me quietly in thy rays imbue me; let thy light shine through me.

I rarely get through the final verse without a lump in my throat and tears in my eyes..

4. Come abide within me; let my soul, like Mary, be thine earthly sanctuary. Come indwelling Spirit, with transfiguring splendor; love and honor will I render. Where I go here below, let me how before thee, know thee, and adore thee.

It is the phrase "let my soul like Mary, be thine earthly sanctuary" that most speaks to the season. The One whose return we long for in Advent, whose first coming we celSmile, you're in worship!

Join the Lakota Mission Trip in May 2005

Saint Timothy's Lakota team is planning a third annual mission trip to Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, South

Dakota, and we'd like you to join us. Pine Ridge is one of the poorest counties in the nation. The unemployment rate of its



people is 75% to 85%. The average annual income of American Indians in South Dakota is \$4,040, according to a 1990 census.

The team members are called to serve the Lakota people. We volunteer our time and talent by listening to the Lakota people and by extending a helping hand through work projects to foster hope and trust. In addition to performing work projects, we are involved in a variety of cultural learning experiences with members of the tribe.

The Sioux are best known for their fine quilting and beadwork. The star quilt is a symbol of our gathering together into one people. Each piece in a quilt is important, and, at the same each piece is nothing by itself. A beautifully finished quilt comes together by the work of human hands and hearts.

Like the symbolism of a quilt, will you come together with us to Pine Ridge? We need your hands and hearts. The trip is tentatively planned for May 14-21, 2005. The cost per person is approximately \$500. No experience is required.

What do we really need?

Some wise person once said, "True wealth is determined not by what one acquires, but by what one gives away." In a time of year when "getting presents" (i.e., getting more stuff) is encouraged in such a wholesale fashion (and it's good for the economy!), these words are well worth pondering. Most of us have far more than we need, and most of what we want besides. There's no question about our wanting all kinds of things, but do we really "need" any more material goods? Of course not. And according to the Bible, more is definitely not better.

The Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke each relate the story of our Savior's encounter with a rich young man (Mt. 19:16-30, Mk. 10:17-31, Lk. 18:18-30). He approached Jesus and asked, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus reminded him of the Ten Commandments. The young man insisted that he had been faithful in all of them. But Jesus looked in his heart and saw what was missing. The Son of God said, "Go sell what you own and distribute the money to the poor." The Gospel records that "When the young man heard this he went away grieving, for he had many possessions." It might be more instructive to say, "The man went away grieving for his many possessions had him." When it comes to "many possessions" the subject and object are in question.

According to Scripture, wealth is one of the greatest impediments to salvation, not because it is bad, not because money and things are evil. Rather because the more we have, generally speaking, the more anxious and less generous we become. Most usually our many possessions possess us.

Christmas is a good time to reconsider what we want and what we need. Especially in this culture of consumerism we are encouraged to want many things. However, as God's Holy Word makes clear, we need only one thing – the saving love of God in Jesus Christ.

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ebrate in Christmas, waits to be conceived in us, to be born in our love for God and each other.

It has been said that "s/he who sings prays twice." Indeed our hymns are poetic prayers set to music. Thus, from time to time, it is good to pray the text of our hymns without the music. This makes us appreciate the words, when we sing them, even more. And notice the hymns and carols that touch you in deep places; pray them. I believe, as a result, Christ will be born in the love and joy that swells in your being. "Get into the spirit", and let the Spirit get into you.

Annual Parish Meeting

Our Annual Parish Meeting will be on Sunday, January 9th. During each of our three morning services, members of the parish will have the opportunity to vote for four people to serve a three-year term on our governing board, the Vestry. Twelve people serve on the Vestry. We elect four new members each year. Every person who is 16 years of age or older, and whose Baptism is recorded in our record books (by virtue of being Baptized here, by transfer from another Episcopal Church, by being Received from another denomination by one of our Bishops, or by otherwise having our Parish Administrator record the date and place of Baptism in our record books), may vote. After our 11:00 am service (at approximately 12:15 pm) we will all gather in the parish hall for food, and discussion of our budget and mission priorities for 2005. The new and currently serving Vestry will go on a weekend retreat, with our clergy, January 14th-16th.
