Prepare The Way

We have entered the season of Advent, the first season of the Church year. The word "advent" means "coming" as in the Savior of the world is coming. With Christmas in mind we tend to think of our Savior coming in a past event, the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. However, the Scripture readings of Advent remind us that the One who came two millennia ago will come again, and this "second coming" will inaugurate the Kingdom in all its glory. Hence, while we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus we are urged to prepare for his triumphal return.

The Bible actually has a lot to say about how we are to prepare – "Do justice, love kindness, walk humbly with God" (Micah), "Seek first the Kingdom" (Matthew), "Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, be hospitable to strangers, clothe the naked, care for the sick, visit prisoners" (Matthew), and "Go into all the world and make disciples; baptize them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" (also Matthew) – just to present a few. It is also important to note that Jesus spoke much more about money and good stewardship than he did about any other matter. To summarize (and quite simply), we are supposed to live our faith, and share our faith.

Advent, the four weeks before Christmas, is therefore an important time to reflect on what we say in Church (vis-à-vis the Nicene and Apostles Creeds), and how this is expressed in our lives. Bottom line - Christ is coming, again, we don't know when. We should be ready. As John the Baptist announced, "Prepare the way of the Lord!"

Waiting For The Light

Advent has always been my favorite season of the church year. I like lighting one candle each week as we get closer to the light of Christ and singing the hymn, "Sleepers wake!... The time has come, O maidens wise! Rise up and give us light..."

When I was younger, I took turns with my brother and sister opening the drawers of our Advent calendar. My sister's godfather was a carpenter and made a small chest of twenty-four drawers with four candles on top. Each drawer had a number and Christian symbol painted on it and contained candy and wooden angel ornaments. Usually, waiting for anything made me feel impatient. With this Advent calendar, each day of waiting seemed special. Advent carried with it a quiet excitement, not the frenzy of a countdown, but the holiness of waiting with anticipation.

Advent teaches us to wait with expectation and anticipation because we know who and what is coming. We wait with assurance, knowing that our waiting will last for a fixed time and then light will burst forth. I pray that advent will also prepare us to wait with expectation and anticipation for the light even when we don't know how long our waiting will last, when we find ourselves in times of uncertainty. The promise of advent is that the darkness will not overcome the light of Christ. We never wait in vain. Christ will come again and shine through the darkness.

What element of expectation is in your life this Advent? How will you mark the days of waiting?

Lose A Seminarian — Gain A Deacon

The Sacred Order of Deacons comes directly from the New Testament. As the number of believers increased after the Resurrection - and the demands on the original disciples also increased - the original twelve followers of Jesus laid their hands on specially selected individuals, conveying the Spirit of Christ, and thereby "ordained" them to the Christian ministry of service. On December 21st, seminarian Allen Pruitt will be Ordained to this Sacred Order of Deacons in St. Philip's Cathedral, Atlanta Georgia (in his home Diocese). When he returns to St. Timothy's in January for his field work he will be "The Rev. Allen Pruitt." Deacons in the Episcopal Church (1) read the Gospel at all corporate Sacramental services, (2) accept the elements and offerings of God's people, (3) prepare the Altar for the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, and (4) announce the dismissal at the end of worship. He will preach as well, as he has been doing. Allen will be a "transitional deacon" (as opposed to a "perpetual deacon"); he will be Ordained again in June to the Sacred Order of Priests. Congratulations Allen!

A Busy Month

January will be a very busy month for the Church. Our Annual Parish meeting is January 14th. During the announcement period of all three morning services members of St. Timothy's will be given the opportunity to vote for 4 people to serve a three year term on the Vestry. A luncheon will be provided at 12:15 pm, the Church's budget for 2007 will be presented for review and discussion, the results of the election will be announced, and the new Vestry will have their first meeting to elect officers. The Vestry will go on retreat on the weekend of January 19-21. Our Diocesan Council will meet in Richmond January 25-27, and will elect a Bishop Coadjutor to succeed Bishop Peter James Lee when he retires. Please pray for St. Timothy's and for the Diocese of Virginia.

The Episcopal Church will survive and thrive, as the Church always has in times of distress. Things will work out, in time. God will prevail; that is certain. While we wait for the dust to settle, we are called to "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord."

Something To Think About

During the month of December most of us think about Christmas, the gift of Jesus Christ, the gifts we might get and give. I invite you to think about something else. The Episcopal Church has come out in support of the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), the intent of which is to "eradicate extreme poverty and hunger on this planet by 2015." The 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church calls upon each Diocese, congregation, and parishioner to

- ◆begin giving 0.7% by 7/7/07 to support MDGs
- designate the last Sunday after Pentecost as a special day of prayer for global reconciliation and the achievement of the MDGs
- create a commission in every Diocese to work on the MDGs
- endorse the "One Episcopalian" campaign that calls on the United States government to spend an additional 1% of budget to combat global poverty, and
- designate 0.7% of our national Church budget to support the MDGs.

While we take our comforts and luxuries for granted the disparity between the wealthiest and poorest citizens of this planet continues to grow. The gross domestic product of the poorest 48 countries combined is less than the net worth of the world's three richest people. Nearly 3,000,000,000 people – half the population of the planet - live on less than \$2.00 per day. Approximately 11,000,000 children under 5 years of age die every year (30,000 per day) as a direct result of poverty. Half of all the world's children live in poverty. Approximately 790,000,000 people suffer from chronic malnourishment.

0.7% of income is a very small price to pay to eliminate the worst suffering caused by poverty. Please consider the abundance in your life, your material resources, the gifts you have received from God, and what you can give to support the Millennium Development Goals.

The curiosity has led to knowledge. I understand how our church works, how important our ministries are (and how many we have!), and how the community depends on St. Timothy's.

Dear St. Timothy's Family:

I'd like to give all of you a brief update on what I'm doing and how my life is progressing while I'm attending Seminary. We're currently in the middle of the second quarter, and I'm taking the second of three parts of New Testament and Church history, the first of three parts of Old Testament, and a history of the Episcopal Church. I've completed the Greek language requirement, and just finished up serving on a Chapel Team, being responsible for morning worship over a two-week period—I was even allowed to officiate, and that was a joy!

Apart from the classes, I have learned a lot about community. First, there is the broad seminary community itself, consisting of all who work, study, and serve at Virginia Theological Seminary (VTS). Then there are the students, and among them, my class - the Juniors. Next, there is small group worship every Friday morning. Finally, there are groups of people with similar "outside" interests, and those who have dissimilar interests yet share their talents, creating new bonds and new communities. I am also learning a lot more about our global community. I will be going to work in the Dominican Republic during the January term, and am starting to look into going to Tanzania next summer to do mission work. I will also be doing both my field education and pastoral care work soon, though I am not sure where as yet—although I am inclined to do the former in a small, rural church and the latter in a hospital, perhaps in the emergency room.

To conclude, in this time of thanksgiving, I recognize you, my St. Timothy's Church family. I want you to know that without you and your support—spiritual, financial, and familial—I simply could not do what I am able to do. So, thank you for your prayers. They strengthen me while I study late into the evening, when I awake from too little sleep, as I drive to Alexandria, and in my celebration of God's blessings—among them the gift of devoting many hours every day to the study and worship of God. I am overwhelmed by the amount of study and work we are given – reading volumes, writing long essays, completing assignments. Even so, I realize how blessed I am to devote my time, energy, and love to serving God and God's people. Thank you for your financial support! Without it, I simply could not afford seminary. Finally, and perhaps most importantly, thanks for being my extended family!

C is for Candles (we light one candle for each week in Advent).
- Create a paper chain on the way to Christmas. Alternate red and green paper, writing a Bible verse on each link. You may want to start with a few verses from Genesis, move to the prophets and end in the Gospels. Choose verses from your childhood that you remember hearing during Advent and share them with your chil-

Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) in El Salvador

El Salvador is no stranger to heartache. The prolonged civil war in the 1980s left thousands with physical and emotional scars. In 1998, Hurricane Mitch killed hundreds and destroyed half of the nation's crops. Today, almost 50% of the population lives in poverty. In early 2001, two major earthquakes and ten thousand aftershocks destroyed 25% of the country's housing, with damages near \$2.8 billion.

Barely four months after these devastating earthquakes, ERD began rebuilding the communities of Izalco, El Congo, Cara Sucia, and San Juan de Letrán from the ground up by constructing houses, offering healthcare services, and providing agricultural training. ERD is committed to providing long-term solutions to communities affected by the 2001 earthquakes through partnership with the Diocese of El Salvador. ERD provided social workers in several communities to train residents how to organize, select leaders and develop decision-making processes for the community. We constructed houses for families whose homes were destroyed using cinderblock materials which offer protection from future earthquakes. We constructed and reconstructed medical clinics and schools which were destroyed by the earthquakes.

Up A Creek; Food For Thought; Spare Time

Scouts from Troop 159 spent a recent Saturday morning on a treasure hunt -- through the streams of Fox Mill. It was their semi-annual creek cleanup.

Historically, it's been fun disguised as work, and this time was no different. Scouts have hauled everything from a tractor tire bigger than themselves, to a bed, out of the waterways. This year, nothing spectacular, just an eclectic collection of clutter-gone-wild:
