Letter from the Rector: It's Time to Retire

My dear friends,

As many of you know, I've been battling Parkinson's for six years, and although the doctors say no one would know to look at me, it doesn't get any easier. It is time for me to retire. Sunday August 9th will be my last day. I can say with absolute candor and honesty that I believe I've done what God wanted me to do here. St. Timothy's now needs someone with different gifts and skills. There is no limit to what you and Miss Holy Spirit can do. I see miracles every day, right here in this building, in our preschool, in the meetings that occur every day and night, in Dungannon, in Pine Ridge, and in Haiti. People are alive because you feed them. People have hope because you don't give up. People are changed because you believe in a better world for everyone. When I think about growing up in the Episcopal Church, I realize that I mark my journey by the changes that have occurred along the way. When I was very young, gender rolls were well defined – men did "man" things and women did "woman" things. All of the men said this was ordained by God (who happened to be male). There were also brown churches for brown people and churches for people who wanted to be brown and kept baking themselves in the sun. (When that wore off we used spray on tan that we called "fake and bake.")

Sunday morning's were different too; we had Holy Communion one Sunday per month. Hugging was forbidden; we could pass the offering plate but not the

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

I know that many of you, like me, are saddened at Brad's announcement of his retirement in August, especially coming so soon after our Associate Rector Leslie's departure. It is clearly a time of great change at St. Timothy's.

God's grace has abounded as your Vestry and Wardens have worked quickly and closely with the Diocese to put together a plan for moving forward. The Rev. Mark Michael, a talented and experienced priest who currently serves as Rector of Christ Episcopal Church in Cooperstown, New York, is looking to relocate to our area this summer (due to his wife's enrollment in a Ph.D. program here). Fr. Mark has accepted our offer to serve as our interim priest beginning on July 15. He will have several weeks working closely with both Brad and members of St. Timothy's staff to ensure a smooth transition before Brad's departure. Fr. Mark comes very highly recommended by his own diocese and by the Bishop of New

Peace. Sermons were supposed to be boring because Episcopalians were not allowed to get excited in Church. "Decent and in order" was our motto and way of life, and that's the way it was. People who went overboard never came back.

I was on my way to seminary when The Book of Common Prayer was radically revised, a lot of old favorite hymns disappeared and many of my classmates in seminary were women, which was appropriate because in the Bible every mention of the Holy Spirit (whom we used to call the Holy Ghost) is feminine or neuter, but never masculine.

Then the LGBT wars began. We argued for more than thirty years and it finally dawned on us that Lesbian, Gay, Bi-sexual, and Transgendered human beings are human beings too, and, like the rest of us, also created in the image of God. It occurred to us that membership begins with Baptism, not Confirmation. We learned some new hymns. We now pass the Peace and have a hard time getting the hugging to stop. We continue experimenting with contemporary worship but keep going back to the ancient ways because we really don't have to reinvent worship – our Baptism covenant reminds us who we are and what we are called to do.

From time to time we get a time out—we get to coast. But there's almost always another challenge right around the corner. Ponder this when you're washing down your second Starbucks and there's enough zoom in you to send you to the moon: Spanish will soon be the predominant language in this nation - Dios bendiga a Estados Unidos y todo el mundo – there will be fewer and fewer wars, the poorest people on this planet will develop the most earth-friendly solutions to hunger and thirst, thousands of the churches in this country will die, more women will gain leadership positions, human beings will live 150 years, there will be an explosive increase in medical miracles, and the churches that do survive will include people of other faiths who share a passion to end poverty, who have discovered the great value of diversity, and who believe every child is beautiful and deserves to be loved. Women will eventually have access to all the jobs men have and earn as much as men earn. That will change everything.

There are huge shifts occurring right here. Leslie's chair and office are empty. She is one of the finest priests I have ever known and she left for all the right reasons, but facing the truth that things change is painful.

For twenty-one years and eight months I have been the most blessed person in the universe. I don't know what comes next for you or for me, but God's not done and I can assure you that everything is going to be fine—just fine. Serving you, serving with you, has been the greatest privilege and honor of my life. Thank you God. Thank you, dear people of God.
