Information For Our First Time Guests



All children are welcome to stay with parents in the Sanctuary during worship. However, for parents of children ages 0-3 years who want nursery care, we have a well-equipped and professionally-staffed nursery at the end of the hall nearest the Sanctuary. Each child brought to the nursery is given a number; only the parents of the child can take the child from the nursery. If a parent is needed during worship, the child's number will appear (in

red LED's) on the black panels beneath the hymn boards on both sides of the Chancel. Parents, please bring diapers, any snacks, and formula as needed for your child.



All baptized Christians are welcome to receive the Sacrament. If you have not been baptized, please come to the Altar rail for a blessing during Holy Communion (place your arms across your chest to signify your desire for a blessing). If you would like to be baptized, please speak with the clergy after the service. To receive Holy Communion, accept the bread in your hand and place it in your mouth, then sip wine from the Chalice when it is brought to you (guide the Chalice to your mouth please), or hold the bread,

dip it in the wine when the chalice comes to you, and place the bread with wine in your mouth. If you are allergic to wheat or are gluten intolerant, please let the person serving bread know to give you a rice wafer.

The Sixth Lesson

Matthew 2: 1-12

The wise men are led by the star to Jesus.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: `And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."



The Service Of Lessons And Carols...

... is based on a liturgy devised by Archbishop A. C. Benson from ancient and medieval sources, which was first used at Truro Cathedral in England on Christmas Eve, 1880 The present service is closely based on the one developed by the Very Revd. Eric Milner-White for use in the Chapel of King's College, Cambridge in 1918. The King's College service is broadcast around the world each year on Christmas Eve.

The lessons trace the history of man's redemption: from his fall from grace, through the expectant watchfulness of the people of Israel, and finally to the birth of the Messiah. The solemn beauty of the readings contrasts with the simple joyfulness of the carols. The lessons reach their dramatic conclusion with the solemn proclamation of God becoming flesh in Christ to dwell with His people.

The Feast of the Epiphany or the Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles, ...

...celebrates the coming of the wise men from the East to worship the Infant Christ. This feast marks the end of the Christmas season, and turns our attention to the way in which Christ came to fulfill the ancient promises that through the Messiah, the blessings of salvation would be extended to all the people of the earth. A Eucharist for the feast will be celebrated on Wednesday at 12:15.
