

From the Interim Rector: Fr. Mark Michael

Peter knocked at the outer entrance, and a servant named Rhoda came to answer the door. Acts 12:13

In this new Easter season, I have been reading through Jesus' appearances to His disciples after the resurrection in the Gospels. And I have been struck how large a role doors play in them, and in the story of the early church that continues after His ascension in the Acts of the Apostles. In two different appearances, Saint John recalled that Jesus appeared among His disciples even though "the doors were locked." Later, after Peter is miraculously freed from imprisonment, he goes to a church gathering, where he initially confuses Rhoda, the servant responsible for minding the doors.

Locked doors and door minders point to the real hazards that our earliest brothers and sisters faced in living out their faith. The practice of Christianity brought private scorn and hostility, and was also illegal in some places.

The early Christians needed to gather in secret, in private dwellings, often in the evenings or before dawn, when their congregating could go undetected. The doors needed to be locked, or at least watched over by a careful attendant, lest an intruder threaten those who had gathered. The apostles and their earliest followers risked their lives to proclaim the good news of the resurrection, as Christians still do today in some parts of the world, and the presence of doorkeepers attests to that courageous action.

Over time, of course, as the church became welcomed and later endorsed by the wider society, the practical need for bouncer-style doorkeepers fell away. But change has never come particularly easy for us in the church, and the doorkeepers stayed on. At first they were responsible for moving catechumens, adults preparing for baptism, out of the church before the Eucharistic prayer began. They took on roles connected with preparing for services—marking the place in

Rector Search Committee Update

In March, the Rector Search Committee (RSC) began its mission by creating a prayer for the entire congregation to pray every Sunday during the search process. Writing the prayer was an ideal way to get to know one another as we undertake the meaningful work of finding a new rector for St. Timothy's. All members of the group contributed thoughtful and insightful parts to the prayer and we are grateful for each person's participation. Although one member, Melissa Randolph, has chosen to step down due to time constraints, we appreciate her guidance in writing the prayer and look forward to her participation as a parishioner in helping find a new rector.

With the loss of Melissa, the RSC recommended to the Vestry that two or more additional committee members be named. Since the committee has much to accomplish, it was felt that a slightly larger committee would expedite the work of calling our new rector. At the March Vestry meeting, Betsy Bosworth and Allyson Showalter were named as members to the RSC. The committee is delighted to welcome them and grateful for their willingness to serve.

After writing a prayer, the next priority for the RSC was to name a chair. William A. Odio is the committee chair and will be responsible for communicating

Fr. Mark to attend Anglican Communion Meeting in Zambia

The Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) is a group of Anglican and Episcopal Christians from around the world who gather every three years to direct the common work of our communion. The Anglican Consultative Council is one of the Anglican Communion's four "instruments of unity," together with the Archbishop of Canterbury, the regular gatherings of the Anglican primates (the chief bishops of each member church) and the Lambeth Conference (a gathering of all Anglican bishops held every ten years). Each member church elects between one and three delegates, depending on its size, to attend the meeting. In many ways, the ACC functions as the congress of our communion. It makes financial decisions, and is the only one of our instruments of unity to include delegates drawn from the laity and parish clergy.

The next meeting of the Anglican Consultative Council will be held next month in Lusaka, Zambia, in Central Africa. The plan for the meeting includes the launching of communion-wide efforts to improve discipleship training and to address the impacts of climate change. The group is

also expected to endorse continuing progress in ecumenical work and the creation of a new communion-wide agency to coordinate relief and development work. There will also be efforts to heal the continuing divisions in the church created by theological differences surrounding sexuality.

Father Mark will be present at the ACC Meeting as a correspondent for The Living Church. The only independent periodical serving the Episcopal Church, The Living Church has been in continuous publication since 1878, and publishes a biweekly magazine alongside the daily Covenant blog (<http://covenant.livingchurch.org/>), and continuous material through its website and social media presence. Father Mark has written regularly for Covenant and The Living Church for years. He regularly serves as The Living Church correspondent for Episcopalian-related events in the DC area and is the editor of an upcoming series of articles in the magazine about potential Prayer Book reform.

In addition to writing daily articles about the proceedings of the ACC meeting, Fr. Mark will also be writing some feature stories about exciting

mission and outreach work within the Anglican Church in Zambia, and has planned several visits to local congregations and church-related ministries. You should be able to follow his reportage from Zambia on The Living Church's website, <http://www.livingchurch.org/>. In May, he hopes to share some of what he has learned about the Anglican Community and our Anglican brothers and sisters in Zambia at a church-wide forum.

Father Mark will miss two Sundays here at Saint Timothy's, April 10 and 17. On those days, Father Adolfo Moronta will be our guest celebrant and preacher. The vicar of Iglesia San Marcos in Alexandria, Father Adolfo has also been leading Saturday evening worship for our Latino congregation since last fall. His work among us has been very fruitful, and has extended beyond the Saturday services to include pastoral care of our Spanish-speaking parishioners and a weekly Tuesday night prayer meeting in parishioners' homes. A native of New York, Father Adolfo is fully fluent in English, and welcomes the opportunity to get to know our "Anglo" congregation better. +

Vestry Update

February Giving: **\$51,648.30**

Budgeted Giving: \$58,167

February Expenses: \$59,572.28

Year to Date Budget Balance: +\$2,210.87

While January and February giving have held steady at approximately 82% of budgeted (anticipated) giving, St. Timothy's has held down expenses thus far, allowing us to maintain overall positive cash flow. However, given the overall trend, the Vestry voted at the March 30 meeting to institute a mid-year financial review every June, and to adjust projected income for the 2016 budget downwards to the 2015 actual income received: \$682,000. To balance the budget with the new projected income number, the Vestry will discuss financial priorities during the April meeting, and look for a revised budget from the Finance Committee in May.

The Vestry also voted to close the following funds and consolidate their balances into the endowment: the Kneeler, Stained Glass, Landscape, Funeral, Stephen Ministry, and EFM Scholarship Funds.

During the March Vestry meeting the Vestry also heard a presentation from Diane Miller about the 2016 Diocesan Council. Tom Davis and Bill Odio from the Rector Search Committee also attended and introduced themselves. Tom Davis will be the Vestry Liaison for the RSC.

Northern Virginia Vision Walk

Michelle Duquette, a member of St. Timothy's since birth, has been an active congregant all her life. As a child she was a member of the choir, an acolyte, and active in the Youth Group. At age 13 she started losing her peripheral vision and was eventually diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa, a degenerative retinal disease that eventually progresses to blindness. At age 21 she lost all vision. Michelle is one of 10 million Americans that are affected by degenerative retinal diseases such as macular degeneration and retinitis pigmentosa. Michelle has embraced and adapted to all the challenges that have come her way. She is a competitive swimmer participating in the Special Olympics and in a Masters Swim Team. She is an active member and secretary to the Service Ministry and has also served as the recording secretary for the Vestry and Ministry Leadership meetings.

Michelle is passionate about finding a cure for retinitis pigmentosa and other degenerative diseases of the eye. She is the secretary of the local chapter of the American Council of the Blind and raises money for the Foundation Fighting Blindness (FFB), a grassroots nonprofit leading the way in research for cures for retinal diseases. Michelle has participated in the Northern Virginia Vision Walk for the past 10 years, leading the "Michelle's Milers" team.

VML Meeting Notes

On March 12, 2016 Fr. Mark, members of the vestry, and church ministry leaders had the bi-annual meeting to review parish updates and ministry news. A majority of the vestry attended, including the senior and junior wardens, and several ministry chairs. The members of VoCoSum served a light breakfast and Jeanne Bennett of VoCoSum facilitated the meeting.

The vestry report from Senior Warden, Bob Henry, and Junior Warden, Genevieve Zetlan highlighted key vestry news including:

- Two ministries are in need of a chair: Stewardship and Communications. Anyone interested in serving is encouraged to step forward.
- The Rector Search Committee has been named and begun the work of profiling the congregation in preparation for inviting candidates to interview.
- An interim music director is contracted to lead the choir through the summer. A permanent director will be sought after the organ is reinstalled in late November.
- Minutes of the monthly vestry meetings will be published on the church website in draft form.

Brian Flusche, vestry liaison to Finance, reported on plans to hire a bookkeeper and the transition to a new treasurer. It is expected that a bookkeeper will be hired during the summer. Resumes have been solicited and a volunteer is chairing the hiring committee. Once a bookkeeper is on board, the transition to a new treasurer will begin.

Hollis Collie, vestry liaison to Christian Ed, reported the search for a new preschool director is ongoing and it is expected a new director will be named soon. Helen Guest, who retires this year, will be honored at a reception in May. More news about the reception will be published later this month. Hollis also noted that the adult Chris-

tian Ed program is thriving with several opportunities for study offered on Sundays and during the week.

Marty Brady, Gifts to Glorify the Lord representative, explained the date for completion of the organ restoration has been pushed out due to the fire at the refurbishment facility. The organ was not damaged but the organ workshop was. Reinstallation of the organ is expected before Christmas. Over the summer, the flooring in the sanctuary will be replaced to improve acoustics and better accommodate the organ.

A general report from Building and Grounds reps included updates on repairs to the HVAC units and exterior doors. In keeping with the recent parish cleanup, Lorna Moran, explained she is leading an effort to clean out the upper room closet, which tends to be a repository for ministry supplies that are no longer needed and are often forgotten about. Lorna will publicize a closet clean out date later this spring. The Altar Guild rep noted the closet in the music room also needs attention. Outdated banners have accumulated and will soon be disposed of once ministries have had an opportunity to claim banners they want to keep.

Father Mark gave an update on the Latino ministry. He noted there is a focus on developing the lay ministry and Father Adolfo, who leads the Latino service on Saturdays, will continue as a part-time priest. A grant is being prepared to obtain support for an ongoing part-time priest. While Fr. Mark is away later this spring, Fr. Adolfo, and other guest preachers, will lead the Eucharist on Sundays.

Diocese of Virginia Annual Council Held in Herndon

Saturday, March 5th was the 221st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia, held at Epiphany Herndon. St. Timothy's was represented by lay delegates Cheryl Brock and Jeanne Bennett. This was an abbreviated program, as the typical nearly 2-day Council scheduled for late January was postponed due to snow. The one-day event included over 500 clergy and lay delegates and Diocesan staff; highlights include:

1. The following two clergy and two lay were elected to the Standing Committee class of 2019: The Rev. Randy Alexander, The Rev. Elaine Thomas, Ms. Helen Spence, Mr. Steve Wachenfeld
2. All three resolutions were adopted:
 - R-1: Justice, Pay Equity, and Leadership
 - R-2: Support for Syrian and other Refugees
 - R-3: No Guns in God's House
3. All eleven Courtesy Resolutions were adopted.
4. All three Resolutions for Amendment to the Constitution and Canons were adopted:
 - C-1 Amendment to the Constitution to Implement R-2 – The Constitution of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Virginia be amended by striking the

word "Council" wherever the same appears therein referring to the annual meeting of the Diocese, and by replacing it with the name "Convention."

- C-2 Amendment to the Canons Implementing R-2 - The Canons of The Episcopal Church in The Diocese of Virginia be amended by striking the word "Council" wherever it appears therein referring to the annual meeting of the Diocese and by replacing it with the name "Convention."
- C-3 Amendment to Article XIII of the Constitution – Permits the Ecclesiastical Authority, in consultation with the Chancellor, also appoint one or more Vice Chancellors, who shall continue in office at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

5. The Annual Council also adopted the 2016 diocesan budget as proposed.

the Bible and service books, ringing the bell. Called the ostiarius, the doorkeeper became the lowest of the seven grades of clerical order by the early Middle Ages. A ceremony was developed for commissioning them, in which they were solemnly presented with a key. Every priest (or bishop) began his official ministry as a doorkeeper.

Ordained doorkeepers are rather thin on the ground these days. We've never had them in the Anglican and Episcopal churches, and the Roman Catholics officially abolished them back in 1972. But their role does survive, in a modified form, in the work of our ushers (and our greeters too, for that matter). In cases of emergency, we still rely on the ushers to keep

things calm and to make good decisions to protect all of us who gather for worship. Their dignified, attentive presence helps to assure order in tense situations, and their kind and gentle welcome helps to set visitors at ease.

We have a very committed corps of ushers at Saint Timothy's, many of whom have served for decades. We rely often on a group of four long-serving ushers: Dean Rohrbaugh, Jim McKenney, Vinny Donnelly and Bill Bate to serve at weddings and funerals. The guys care for each other and enjoy the work. They are mostly retired from their jobs in the world and have a bit more time available to help out. They know the work well, through many decades of service—probably over a century, between the four of them. At a major event, like Christmas or Easter services or a large funeral, it is

comforting for me to know that a reliable crew like them will be on hand to keep things going smoothly.

I was talking with Vinny last Sunday and remarked to him that I think of them as "the steadfast four"—like the points of the compass, always reliable. He said "the four horsemen of the apocalypse" might be more appropriate.

Whatever you want to call them, these men, and the other women and men who serve alongside them, deserve our thanks. Following a suggestion by Jim Wallis, our head usher at 10:00, we will be honoring all our ushers with special prayers and a coffee hour on April 17. We hope that many of you will be able to join us that Sunday in thanking them for their good work. +
