## From the Interim Rector: Fr. Mark Michael

"Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them." Matthew 19:4.

In the little town where I grew up, kids didn't go to sports camp in the summer. There weren't art or music camps either, for that matter, or academic enrichment camps or canoeing and rock climbing camps. My family didn't take much vacation, either, because Mom always played the organ on Sunday mornings. But there was Vacation Bible School, and it was pretty much the highlight of the summer.

We had Vacation Bible School at our own church, of course, the first two weeks after summer vacation began. But sometimes, mom would haul us off to the Vacation Bible Schools at other churches—at the Lutheran church up on the hill, where you could play tag in the enormous cemetery, or at my grandparents' Methodist church. One summer, I think we spent a full four weeks in Bible School, which probably amounted as many Bible stories, peppy songs and graham crackers as a full year of Sunday School at Saint John's.

My brothers and I never complained about it, though, because it was always so much fun. Our church didn't have very many kids, but Bible School drew together dozens more (and sometimes hundreds, as the one at our own church gradually blossomed into a grand community event). Many of our cousins and friends from school came to Bible School. It was helpful to know that you weren't alone in living your faith, that other kids like you prayed the same prayers and learned the same stories about

God's love and the way He worked wonders in the lives of His people.

My brothers and I memorized the songs and sang them on car rides, and the games and special presentations were often great fun. I still remember the time an arborist came and hauled a few kids up in a tree so we could see what Zacchaeus' view must have been like (no chance the insurance companies would permit this sort of thing today). Some years, a missionary would visit, or we'd watch a video about the place where our daily offerings were sent.

Even as a child, I was impressed by how many people were involved in the grand production that was Vacation Bible School. A big crew would gather a few weeks before to paint decorations. Men would stay after church to move furniture and room dividers to set up classrooms all over the church grounds (even in the pastor's garage). Teenagers acted out a skit every day that brought the themes of the story to life (I ended up taking this on for quite a few years, gaining much of my confidence in front of people through it). A crew of folks staffed the kitchen preparing snacks. One sweet older lady counted the offering every year. Others collected the materials and then led us through the steps of some pretty elaborate crafts. And of course, there were the Bible stories—brought to life by creative and committed teachers.

I never had an overwhelming spiritual experience at Vacation Bible School, but it certainly helped my faith to grow. The stories and songs shaped my confidence that God was faithful and that He wanted me to know Him

better and to do His will. I am grateful that I was raised among Christians who thought it was important that kids come to love and serve the Lord, and who worked so hard to put on such a production to bring the faith to life in such an exciting and fun-filled way.

I'm really grateful that we have such a strong Vacation Bible School program here at Saint Timothy's, and I'm excited that my own sons will be able to share in it again this summer. Christine and her key parent leaders have been working together with some people from First Baptist Church to plan our VBS for months now. Many of you will be involved in some part of it, from volunteering in some way here on site on July 10-15 to bringing in snacks or helping to set up. Some of you will be students, or will be inviting kids you know and love to become students for the first time.

Vacation Bible School is a way that we all share together in the joy of passing on the faith to those children who God continues to welcome, bless and encourage. It's fun and lively, and visitors are always welcome. It might just end up being the highlight of your summer as well.

from the Retreat Center. We also helped a small team from Illinois to create a community garden. One afternoon, we traveled to Thunder Valley, a nonprofit native organization focused on empowering Lakota families to improve the health, culture, and environment of their communities through the healing and strengthening of cultural identity. This effort could be the start of the selfinitiative needed by the Lakota people to break the continued cycle of poverty and depression set so heavily on them. We spent our afternoons playing with the children at the retreat center, giving them a safe place to play. On Wednesday, we hosted a children's worship at the center then prepared a delicious meal for the kids. In the evenings, we interacted with local artists, learning about their crafts and their lives on the reservation. We grew together as a team and as individuals, understanding more about ourselves and the Lakota People. We ended the week exhausted but recharged by seeing God's love in the Lakota people and knowing that while we made a small difference in them, God made a big difference in us. -Tina Pinkard

## Rector Search Committee Update

The Rector Search Committee (RSC) continues to move steadily toward our goal of preparing a profile of St. Timothy's that captures the personality and spirit of the congregation. In talking with many members of the congregation to understand what they believe are the most important characteristics of a new rector we have learned much about "Who We Are". In coming weeks the Search Committee will focus not only on "Who We Are" but also, "Where Are We Going?" These two areas, along with a simple explanation of "Where Have We Been," will inform potential candidates of the generous and welcoming style of St. Timothy's. It will also allow a candidate to understand what is most important to our congregation for worship and liturgy, stewardship, pastoral care, Christian education, and fiscal health. The six members of the RSC are learning as much as possible about "Who We Are" and "Where Are We Going?". Over the past several weeks, the RSC gathered information to develop the portrait of our parish in several ways. Focus Groups were held with six different small groups of parishioners sharing a similar interest or ministry. Focus Groups will be ongoing through the summer and all are welcome to participate regardless of a connection to a ministry. While Focus Groups offer general information about the congregation's needs, a survey will give specifics. To prepare for the planned parish wide survey in early fall, the committee is developing survey questions to understand specific individual desires for a new rector.

Another tool future candidates will use to learn about St. Timothy's is the Parish Website. Working with the church Webmaster, the committee is recommending changes and additions to the website that will reflect the involved and committed community we are. The website is an all important way of expressing the culture of St. Timothy's and one RSC goal is to tailor the website to be as informative as possible.

The Stewardship and Finance portrait of St.

Timothy's is one of the most important pieces of our parish profile. How we approach Stewardship and how successful we are in pledging and donating will be of particular interest to future candidates.

Accurately representing our Stewardship approach is an area on which the RSC is especially focused. Not only do we want to portray how we donate but

also, why we donate as we do. Likewise, a clear and accurate picture of St. Timothy's finances will be of significant importance to potential candidates. Naturally, they will want to know if St. Timothy's can pay our bills and, they will want to know if St. Timothy's can pay him or her! Understandably, these two areas require careful and detailed attention. The search committee is especially fortunate to have some volunteers who have the talent and interest to focus on these details. While much of this effort seems slow and drawn out the intent of the RSC is to present an accurate and attractive picture of our congregation. St. Timothy's offers all of us, and the community, a joyous home for worship, fellowship, and comfort. Portraying these gifts in an electronic profile or a printed document is the most important objective of the RSC during this phase of discernment. Hearing from the congregation through surveys, focus groups and one on one engagement is the best way to achieve an excellent picture of the church we all

# June Vestry Update

May Giving: **\$44,554.32** Budgeted Giving: \$58,167 May Expenses: **\$41,466.47** 

During the June meeting, the Vestry voted to adopt an amended budget received from the Finance Committee that adjusts expenses to meet the new projected income figure of \$682,000 adopted by the Vestry in March. Savings come primarily from continuing to receive Saturday evening priest services on a supply/contract basis, continuing to contract for Music services at the current level (handbell choir, adult choir, and two Sunday services) through the remainder of the year, making reductions to the Communications and Hospitality budgets, and eliminating our Reserve Fund contributions. The Vestry stressed the importance of realizing that all of these savings are temporary; in 2017 we will have a bookkeeper for the entire year and we will be looking to staff a permanent Music Director and Organist, and it is vitally important that we continue to save with regular contributions to the reserve fund. If income exceeds expenses at the close of 2016, the Vestry will reinstitute a reserve fund transfer.

The Vestry voted to increase Fr. Adolfo's compensation to \$260 per service. The Vestry also voted to amend the calendar process such that after each Ministry Summit, to be held 3 times per year, the Calendar Coordinator will send dates and all relevant information to Kevin, Kevin will enter those dates into the church Calendar, and Ministries will verify the information on the calendar. The next Ministry Summit will be held in October.

During the June Vestry meeting the Vestry also heard a brief update from Tom Davis about the Rector Search Committee, and affirmed the continuing relevance of our mission statement for inclusion in the Parish Profile. The Vestry also affirmed the Appreciative Inquiry Goals developed in 2015 as the basis for a church Vision statement, also to be included in the Parish Profile. The Vestry received an update from the Finance Liaison on inquiries to the Diocese regarding a potential line of credit for St. Timothy's to assist with cash flow, the completion of the yearly audit, and research into Church Windows replacements. The Treasurer's

Update indicated the Bookkeeper transition has been very smooth, and the Treasurer plans to step down at the beginning of August. Finally, the Vestry was informed that Nursery Assistant Maria will be leaving St. Timothy's. We are pleased to announce that Elba Poralta, who served St. Timothy's previously in the role, will be returning as a Nursery Assistant.

The July Vestry meeting has been scheduled for Wednesday, July 13 at 7:30 pm in B1 to accommodate a special presentation by the Gifts to Glorify the Lord Committee regarding final plans for Sanctuary Modifications and Organ Reinstallation. Also on the agenda is a formal vote to elect Jean Shepherd as the new Treasurer. All Vestry meetings are open and any congregant is invited to attend. # Music Director Changes

On Sunday, June 26 we bade farewell to Adrienne Salazar, who had served as our music director since March. Adrienne is stepping down because of family obligations. Her kind and gracious leadership has encouraged our choirs during this time of transition and she has helped us all to lift our voices to God in praise. We are also deeply grateful for the instrumental performances by our youth she coordinated over the past several months. We have much hidden talent among the youngest members of our church family, and Adrienne has helped to bring these gifts to light as a blessing to all of us.

In July and August, we will be relying on the services of several local substitute musicians to accompany the hymns and lead the summer choir at the 10:00 service. We are very grateful to Milan Shepherd and Joe Weeden, who will be helping to select anthems and coordinate the choir's ministry. Milan will also serve as the chair of a small search committee who will be interviewing candidates during the summer for a long-term supply musician position that we expect to begin in September. We expect that this position will extend until after our renovated organ has been installed and we have

The long term supply musician's position will be like Adrienne's, including playing at both Sunday services and directing the adult choir and bell choir. The supply musician may be a candidate for the permanent position. A separate music discernment committee is developing a vision and scope for this permanent position.

# Gifts to Glorify the Lord (GtGtL) Update

After a long delay last year when our organ builder's shop burned, our organ restoration is finally in full swing to conclude late this year. I just returned from a visit to J. Allen Farmer's (JAFI) in Winston-Salem NC. I met with both John and his wife Kristin who extended their warm Southern hospitality to myself and my husband Sean at their home and workshop. We inspected and took many photos of both the rebuilt shop which has just received its certificate of occupancy permit 2 weeks ago and the smaller studio barn where work on our organ has been proceeded as best as possible in the meantime. I've included some photos of the visit in this article and will be sharing more via our weekly E-news and church Facebook posts as well.

In addition to seeing our J.D. Moore organ components, the Farmers also took us to see and hear the organ they restored for their church just prior to beginning our project. The photo below is in St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Winston-Salem, and shows John playing the organ in the loft with Kristin and Sean in the foreground. Although the organ is about 3 times the size of ours, it is of a similar vintage and the church took 16 years from the time the organ was obtained until they began the restoration of it. So its story is much like ours...

Lastly, below is a photo of Mr. Farmer in his new
shop ready to move both equipment and our organ
components into the newly permitted space. While
they have continued some work in the small studio
barn over the last year, it's been very cramped
which I saw firsthand this past weekend. They
placed each piece of equipment on a small pallet so
it can be moved with a small forklift, and they've
had to reposition each time they change tasking
whether it be sanding, drilling, etc.



Once in the new space work will be able to proceed much faster since the equipment won't have to be shifted each time a different task is begun. There is also a 2-story tall portion of the shop where our organ will be fully assembled and tested before it is packed and brought back to us here in Herndon. With ~90% of the J.D. Moore pipes returned from A.R.Schopp and the keyboard action restoration work well underway, our restoration project is "picking up steam."

# An Observation from Jill Cox

I have a concern and that is the climate of unrest in the church at the moment. I am celebrating my 80th birthday later this year and have been a practicing Christian all my life, much of it as an active member on numerous committees and seven times as a church warden for terms of six years each which adds up to 42 years of experience. (Incidentally, a recent survey of aging states that if you attend at least four religious services per month you add nineteen years to your life, SO I should reach Biblical age and be around for a long time. It doesn't guarantee mental acuity however!)

Among those 42 years there have been several interregnums and a variety of churchmanship and differences of opinions etc., but the one thing to be kept in mind is; "Why do you go to church?" You should not be going for the preacher, the social aspects, the music, the building or anything but to meet with the Lord and worship Him and try to keep His laws, knowing that you are loved, forgiven and protected. When there is a change it is difficult to cope with – we all like continuity – but many things are permanent and can be held on to while realizing that interruption can give a taste of some better or worse and a time to evaluate your religious life. Personally I found quite late in life that I really liked to study the Bible both for its inspired message and for its place in history. Even later I came to appreciate going on retreats, particularly silent ones, when I was undergoing a difficult time in my life and felt I had no one to talk to.

What I am trying to convey is that one should always be prepared to be patient and not take offence when things are not quite as you would want them. I do not intend to preach to anyone or make any judgment, but I do pray that everyone will assist in the search for a new priestly leader, maintain the fantastic fellowship in St. Tim's, support all the ministry work done locally and internationally and pray for all our brothers and sisters in Christ. Amen
