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### **From the Interim Rector: Fr. Mark Michael**

*Pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, that we may appoint to this duty.” Acts 6:3*

This summer, Rick Wilson resigned after twelve years as the treasurer of Saint Timothy’s Church. We all owe him a great deal of thanks for the way in which he has discharged his responsibilities with steadfast patience, integrity and care. For twelve years Rick has been a careful and diligent steward of the resources entrusted to us to God’s work.

One almost never hears of someone committing for so long to such a demanding (and often thankless) role in these days when so many responsibilities and social activities fill people’s calendars. Maybe he didn’t think he would be at the task for so long when he first took it up. But Rick has been faithful, pressing on to complete tasks week by week, and carefully training those people (two of them) who will continue in his stead.

Rick has been the classic “behind the scenes” worker, coming in on weekends and burning the midnight oil to keep up with the demands of our large and complicated organization. A highly skilled professional, his generous donation of time and talent has saved our congregation tens of thousands of dollars in accountants’ fees. Most importantly, Rick has maintained the trust that is

absolutely essential for the management of church finances.

It’s interesting that the early church’s first major conflict centered around financial management. As the Holy Spirit descended at Pentecost, He drew people together into a common life, where people shared their financial resources with each other as a sign of their love for each other. The community soon began providing a daily distribution of food to the widows among them, who had no other means of support.

But the process wasn’t being managed carefully. The author of Acts tells us that there were “murmurings,” a deadly thing in community life just as much then as now. The “Hellenist” widows, those from a Gentile background, thought they were getting less than the “Hebrew” widows. The resulting protests threatened to divide the church when it had only just begun to knit together.

The solution was to choose seven well-respected and capable leaders to administer the finances of the new congregation. The seven were solemnly ordained with prayer and the laying on of hands and became the first members of the order of deacons.

For much of church history, the management of finances remained with ordained deacons, who counted these administrative tasks Fr. among their duties in caring for the poor and stewarding the gifts of God's people. Paintings of deacon saints often show them with the keys to the church treasury. A few European cathedrals today maintain a post for the canon treasurer, a cleric who continues this work as part of his or her service of God.

We may have chosen the wiser course in handing these tasks off to lay people. My seminary training, at least, didn't provide the kind of detailed training in accountancy that one needs to do this work well. It's also a beautiful thing when people dedicate the skills and knowledge they have developed over so many years to God's service.

But financial management in the church remains a matter of great spiritual importance, even if we don't still expect our treasurers to take vows and wear clerical dress. The money we administer belongs to God. It is given as expression of people's faith. It's meant to be used for work that draws people closer to God and makes His loving purpose more tangible in their lives.

Rick has meditated on these things for many years. I've also talked about them with our new treasurer, Jean Shepherd, who is just as skilled as Rick was and brings the same deep commitment to her work. I know that Jean will maintain the same trust that Rick has stewarded so carefully in the days ahead.

Please take the time to thank Rick for his service. We are planning a way to honor him as an entire congregation in the near future as well. It's important to celebrate deep faithfulness, and to thank God for those who are steadfast in His service, maintaining the trust that unites us to each other and to Him.

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## New Course with Father Mark

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**The Story of the Prayer Book** is a six week course that Father Mark will teach on Sundays at 9:00 in Room A1. Edited by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, and first authorized for use at Pentecost in 1549, the Book of Common Prayer is perhaps Anglican Christianity's single greatest contribution to the mission of the Church and the history of Western culture. Though revised many times, it is among the most important sources of unity for Anglicans around the world, and its influence on the English language and literature has been immense.

This course will trace the story of the Prayer Book and the ways that worship has changed across the ages within the Episcopal Church and Anglicanism more broadly. We will look at the way the Prayer Book was forged in the midst of the English Reformation, its modifications in response to seventeenth century political crises, connection between the Prayer Book and missionary work, and the most important changes of the past century. Last summer's General Convention opened the process for a revision of the Prayer Book, and the final session will ponder some possible future directions. Join us for this fascinating journey across the history of our church.

## Rector Search Committee Update

### Exciting News for September

In September, The Rector Search Committee (RSC) will focus on learning as much as possible from individual members of the congregation through two new efforts, the Question of the Week (QTW) and a Parish-wide Survey. The QTW offers a unique opportunity for members to respond with their own perspective and priorities to a specific question. Thus far, the feedback from the initial QTWS is helpful and informative.

On September 25<sup>th</sup> during the services the congregation will have an opportunity to participate in a written version of the survey. It covers a wide range of questions and offers each person a chance to express their personal preferences. The survey can be submitted in writing on the 25<sup>th</sup> or in the following weeks. For those who prefer, an electronic version will also be offered. Members 16 or older are asked to participate. In order for the survey to be effective, it is important that individuals respond only once regardless of whether the response is written or electronic. Specific details will be announced in upcoming weekly bulletins and eNews.

In August, the QTW was introduced to hear feedback regarding specific elements of the Diocesan Community Portfolio. The Portfolio is a document the RSC will prepare and submit to the Vestry and the Bishop. As an overview of St. Timothy's congregation and its operation, the Portfolio is used to inform prospective candidates of the Rector position.

How can you respond to a QTW? Each week, during the next several weeks, a new question is posed in the Friday eNews and the Sunday bulletin and you are invited to email your response to the RSC at [rsc@saint-timothys.org](mailto:rsc@saint-timothys.org). All responses will be kept confidential and are for RSC use only. If you prefer to submit a written response, you may leave it in an envelope in the RSC mailbox near the coat closet. Any QTW may be answered at any time and you are encouraged to respond. The initial questions are:

**Question 1 - When you think about how St. Timothy's serves the emotional, physical, and spiritual needs of our congregation, what examples of how we meet these needs come to mind? How**

*successful do you think St Timothy's is in meeting these needs?*

**Question 2 - Where do you see St. Timothy's in 5 years or so? In what ways do we as a congregation need to develop to continue to be a vital Christian community in Herndon?**

**Question 3 - As a congregation, what is St. Timothy's practice of stewardship and how does it shape the life of our worshipping community?**

The previously introduced Focus Groups offer an additional opportunity to share your thoughts for selecting a new rector. The hope is that each congregant has the opportunity to make it to one focus group. Anyone interested is invited. The discussion each time is on topics that will guide the RSC in choosing a rector. Dates for upcoming Focus Groups will be publicized in the weekly eNews and Sunday bulletins.

The Rector Search Committee welcomes your feedback to any or all of these opportunities. Your contribution will help the RSC in selecting the most ideal candidate. ## **Christian Education - Changes for 2016-17**

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I hope you all are enjoying the last days of summer! As we get ready for the new school year, I would like to let you know about some changes we have coming to Christian Education, specifically in the middle school and high school classes. At the end of the 2015/2016 school-year we had six youth graduate high school and a family with three youth move to the mid-West. Due to this shift in numbers, we need to adjust our classes to maximize the impact of our program with opportunities for discussion and sharing.

With that said, for the 2016/2017 school-year (ONLY!) we will have our “upper classes” consist of 8<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> graders and our “lower classes” consist of 6<sup>th</sup> – 7<sup>th</sup> graders. Again, this will only be for the 2016/2017 school year. Next year (2017/2018) we will go back to having 9<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade classes. We want to have classes be as full as possible to encourage lively discussions amongst the groups.

Our Youth schedule follows the same pattern every month (with the exception of September) and allows for a great balance of Christian Education with opportunities to serve and participate in the life of the church. Starting in October and going until June, the first two Sundays of every month the youth have interactive classes where they can learn and share in the discussion. The third Sunday is “Family Service” where we encourage youth to either sit with their friends or family for service. The fourth Sunday we have a youth group meeting in the upper room where students can take ownership of the youth program and provide their creative input for programming and service opportunities.

For those wondering how we arrived at this schedule, look in the October edition of The Word to learn about this thorough process and the reasons for the changes that have been made over the last year and a half!

For the month of September, the youth class schedule will be as follows:

September 11 - class

September 18 – youth group meeting

September 25 – car wash (to support youth pilgrimage)

The 8<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade class will meet in the Upper Room and the 6<sup>th</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> grade class will meet in room A-8 on the lower level.

Classes will begin on Sunday, September 11, 2016 at 10:00 a.m.

## **St. Timothy Preschool News**

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### **Kicking off the year with a New Director**



The Board of Directors of the St. Timothy's Preschool welcomes Ms. Monica Despins as its new director. Monica grew up in Connecticut, went to college in Maine and has been a resident of northern Virginia since 1987, where her family resides in the Franklin Farm neighborhood. Monica first became acquainted with the Preschool as a parent when her three boys attended the school, then joined the staff in 1998 as the head teacher.

Monica plans to continue the St. Timothy's Preschool tradition of creating a loving, nurturing environment where children build self-confidence and independence while learning respect for themselves and others. She meets individually with prospective parents and students to ensure that their needs are met and that the student is ready for school. As one of the most well-established and respected preschools in the area, St. Timothy's relies primarily on word of mouth and reputation to fill its roster. The Preschool offers enrichment programs and "lunch-bunch" in addition to its normal curriculum for three to five year olds. This fall the Preschool will pilot a before school care program for working parents.

The Preschool is a non-profit organization and relies on tuition and some fundraising to meet its budgetary needs. This fall the school will offer Midland gift-wrap and other items (look for a table on Welcome Home Sunday) and plans to hold family night at the new Chik-fil-A at 3454 Historic Sully Way on Wednesday September 14<sup>th</sup> from 5 – 8 pm.

### **Vestry Update**

During the August Vestry meeting on the 22nd, the Vestry approved the addition of Nikki O'Malley and Allison Dodd to the Vestry Nominating Committee. Anyone considering running for Vestry in 2017 should speak with Nikki, Allison, or any of the four outgoing Vestry members: Larry Grantham, Bob Henry, Bob Kimmel, and Stephanie Kenis.

The Vestry heard a report from the Rector Search Committee, and a request for two pieces of information necessary for the completion of the Parish Portfolio: 1) compensation range for our new Rector, and 2) more detailed input on the expectations for the Latino ministry. A subcommittee will be working on each of these questions, to report back to the Vestry and the RSC.

The Vestry received the first Treasurer's report from new Treasurer Jean Shepherd. The Vestry approved the 2015 audit from the Finance Committee and heard from Finance regarding collaboration with Building and Grounds on upcoming required maintenance recommendations. The Vestry also requested that the Finance Committee begin a straw man 2017 budget for review at the September meeting.

The September Vestry meeting is scheduled to take place at 7:30 pm on September 26 in B1. Vestry meetings are open and any member of the congregation is welcome to attend. Our Registrar will post complete DRAFT Vestry Minutes [online here](#).
