From the Bridge Interim Rector Anne Turner

O Lord, you have taught us that without love whatever we do is worth nothing; Send your Holy Spirit and pour into our hearts your greatest gift, which is love, the true bond of peace and of all virtue, without which whoever lives is accounted dead before you.

Dear Friends in Christ,

We don't normally hear this collect, my favorite, because it comes from the Seventh Sunday after Epiphany. This year, however, Easter is late and Epiphany is long, so we will get to pray it in church.

It is easy to declare the sentimental virtues of love. The stores are already full of hearts and lace for Valentine's Day. But Christian love is much deeper, much less emotional. It is rooted not in feeling but in choice, in deliberate action over time.

Paul talks about it in his letter to the Corinthians, of course—that love is patient, and love is kind, and love never ends. Again, at weddings, our minds think first of the affective gift of romantic love—but, again, I think we are meant to think of something much sturdier. To Paul's list of qualities, I would add another: love is brave. Love is brave, to face conflict, to make the heart vulnerable again and again and again.

I write about love this way because I know that sometimes, in this place, loving is an act of bravery, and an act of vulnerability. But I believe that whatever



we accomplish at Saint Timothy's—our hard work on vestry matters, on finance, on service to Cornerstones or to Haiti, on the organ restoration, on the Spanish-language service, on the search for a new rector, in youth group, in Sunday School, in bible study—none of it is worth anything without love. We are like dead people if we can't figure out how to love.

Brothers and sisters, be brave. Start small: find one person in this place whom you have not loved as you should, and go love them, well. It is the greatest gift the Spirit can pour into our hearts.

Rector Search Committee (RSC) News

The RSC accomplished a significant milestone in early January when it delivered the Office of Transition Ministry (OTM) Portfolio to our contact in the diocese, Rev. Mary Thorpe. The OTM published the Portfolio for priests in search of a new position. Through use of this online tool, candidates will submit their applications to the RSC for consideration. The Search Committee is receiving names through February 28, 2017.

Everyone on the Search Committee is tremendously grateful for the contributions, support and prayers of the congregation. Preparing the Portfolio would not have been possible without your participation in the Focus Groups and Survey. Your willingness to send responses to the Questions of the Week (QTWs) over the summer was also a great help. We appreciate all your feedback in helping us arrive at this milestone.

Our next phase, while we await candidate applications, is to prepare for candidate interviews.

The RSC is coordinating with Rev. Thorpe for guidance and direction regarding the interview process. As we discern what God calls for St. Timothy's, our work includes screening applications as they are submitted and developing interview questions. During this phase of the search, confidentiality is particularly crucial. It is important that our work does not impact any priest's current circumstances.

As the RSC continues to move forward in identifying a priest to become our new rector, we ask for your prayers and patience. Through prayer and the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, we have faith we will be blessed with an ideal rector for St. Timothy's. Holy Spirit, thank you for guiding, inspiring and strengthening us so that we may glorify God through our work.

2016 Report to the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia

Diane Miller, President of Region 5 and a member of St. Timothy's prepared this annual report that was included in the packet for the Diocesan Annual Convention held last week in Reston.

Region V achieved profound results through our "Region Life Committee", an initiative to discern and act upon our "shared mission and ministry". We identified a number of challenges in our community for which we wanted to offer a Christian response, and pull our shared resources to deliver a comprehensive program on a selected topic each year. In 2016, we focused on Race & Reconciliation. Region V hosted a screening of the Emmy-nominated documentary, "Traces of the Trade: A Story from the Deep North." Filmmaker Katrina Browne led discussion around this film in which she discovers that her New England ancestors were the largest slave-trading family in U.S. history. Ms. Browne then followed-up to show "Repairing the Breach: The Episcopal Church and Slavery Atonement," Ms. Browne's short film sharing the process that the Episcopal Church went through to address the Church's role in slavery and to embark on dialogue and repair. Afterwards, led by The Diocese's Ellyn Crawford and Ms. Browne, we explored where we individually or collectively might feel led by spirit to further engage issues of racial equity in our community. We continued to seek opportunities to leverage the strengths and resources of our individual parishes to make an even greater impact in Northern Fairfax County. Highlights include:

■ Youth and Young Adult Ministry – Blessed with an extremely gifted and energetic Region Deacon, the Reverend Mary Beth Emerson, our youth ministry was very active again this year in Christian formation, opportunities to seek and serve Christ in others, fellowship and great fun! Highlights were the annual Region V Youth Service Event, the annual youth mission trip to Dungannon and hosting Syrian refugees settled in our community to share a meal and

- improve understanding through personal engagement. Rev. Mary Beth continued to leverage the network she created among youth leaders in our Region's parishes, led our Youth Delegate nomination process and shepherded Youth Delegates at the Annual Diocesan Council.
- Strengthening our Congregations Region V meetings actively engaged our delegates and increased awareness of activities and opportunities in other Region parishes and in our broader community. External speakers and Diocesan representatives also sparked our imaginations and helped us identify ways to strengthen our congregations and our shared ministry.
- Evangelism and Proclamation With relatively close proximity of our parishes, we sought creative ways to engage and serve God's people wherever they may be in our community. We continued to provide financial support to the ARISE Campus Ministry at George Mason University. Epiphany's 3rd annual Hypothermia Prevention Shelter brought volunteers and supplies from across Region V.
- Multiculturalism and Ethnic Ministries The Latino Ministry at St. Timothy's Herndon continued to flourish with active engagement from the Rev. Adolpho Moranta of St. Mark's Alexandria. In addition to weekly celebration of the Holy Eucharist in Spanish, the Latino Ministry celebrated baptisms, confirmations and marriages. All activities hosted by our Latino Ministry are open to all in the Region. We are blessed to also have St. Francis Korean congregation in our Region.
- Mission Beyond Ourselves A highlight is our annual youth mission trip to Dungannon.
 Over 60 youth from across the Region participated in this week-long service trip to one of the poorest areas in Virginia.
 Through strong collaboration among our

parishes and youth leaders and financial support from the Region, this continues to be one of our flagship initiatives and a model of effective shared ministry. Most Region V parishes have active domestic and international mission programs. For 2017, the Region dedicated funds for a young adult mission trip to Grace House on the Mountain in St. Paul, Virginia.

In 2017, we have re-dedicated ourselves to local, Regional and Diocesan outreach by sponsoring new and expanded ministries. We will seek broader participation in the Region Life Committee as we continue to address critical issues in our area from a Christian perspective.

Delegates from St. Timothy who attended the Annual Convention are Jean Bennett, and Mike Colie. Dean Rohrbach is the alternate. Look for their report in the next The Word.

Region V 2017 Budget Highlights

The 2017 Budget of Region V was approved by the Diocese of Virginia Executive Board at their meeting on December 14, 2016. Region V is blessed to receive generous pledges from our nine member parishes, enabling us to financially support a number of initiatives important in our area. Our total annual budget of \$6,350 benefits all parishes and parishioners in our Region of Northern Fairfax County..

In Local Outreach, we increased our financial support to the Hypothermia Shelter hosted by Epiphany Herndon to continue leveraging resources and assets from across Region V parishes to expand their service to those in need. We reinstated our \$500 commitment to the Latino Ministry at St. Timothy's and continued our \$500 commitment to the Arise Campus Ministry at George Mason University. This ecumenical community of students will receive additional Region V engagement as the Rev. Valerie Hayes of Holy Comforter Vienna will be a member of the Arise Board.

In Regional Outreach, we continued to fund our flagship program, the youth mission trip to Dungannon at \$3,100, and our Youth Ministry program under the amazing leadership of the Rev. Deacon Mary Beth Emerson at \$500.00. Our Region Life Committee, open to all members in Region V, will receive \$500 to continue producing impactful programs recognized across the Diocese. New this year is seed funding of \$150 to begin our support for a Young Adult Mission to Grace House in the Appalachia region of Virginia. This demonstrates our commitment to mission for those ages 18 to 30.

Additionally, the Region budget funds the Region President and Region Youth Delegate registration at Diocesan Annual Convention and the Region President's Retreat with Bishop Gulick.

Once again, St. Timothy's will be preparing and serving dinner for clients of the North County Hypothermia Shelter –this year we have moved our dates to **Saturdays** in March (March 4, 11, 18 & 25). Please sign up to provide a part of this meal or to volunteer to serve the meal. You don't have to do it all yourself! We created an on-line sign up through Sign-Up Genius. You prepare your portion of the meal at home and then bring your food, ready to serve and enough to feed 40 adults, to the North County Hypothermia Shelter at $5:30~\rm pm$, located in the North County Human Services bldg., $1850~\rm Cameron$ Glen Drive in Reston, just $\frac{1}{4}$ mile from the Embry Rucker Shelter and Reston Regional Library. Drive around to the back of the building and follow signs to the shelter. Two volunteers are needed each Saturday to serve the meal between $5:30-7:30~\rm pm$.

This is a great service opportunity for your family, ministry and friends (volunteers need to be 18 years or older).

Thursday Shopping Nights –Thursday shopping nights will return in March. Shop between 5:00 and 8:00 pm – no crowds and new inventory added between 2:00 and 5:00 pm.

Support The Closet -- St. Timothy's is one of the congregations that founded The Closet 41 years ago. There are three ways for you to support The Closet:

- Donate items can be dropped off between 8:00 am and 3:00 pm Monday through Saturday. Volunteers will assist you with unloading your items. Consider donating books, clothing, toys, small appliances (such as CD players, microwave ovens, blenders, toasters, irons, food processors), baby and children items and clothing that is clean and in good condition.
- Volunteer St. Timothy's is responsible for providing volunteers once or twice a month for two-hour shifts. Volunteers can work the floor or assist cashiers on sale days (Tuesday and Thursday 10:00 am to 2:00 pm and Saturdays 9:30 am to 4:00 pm). Or volunteer when the store is not open to put out new merchandise or price items.
- Shop There are bargains to be found at The Closet so add a stop to your weekly errands to see what is new and perhaps purchase an item or two.
