A Message from our Rector

Dear Friends,

I am writing to share with you how excited I am to be coming to St. Timothy's. I also want to share with you an amazing story that happened just today (August 3, 2017). We had our Joy of Living (seniors) Summer Cookout and it was a marvelous event. The sun was shining, it was 78 degrees, and a light breeze was blowing. A beautiful white tent set up on the Rectory lawn covered the group as they laughed and told stories across blue, pink, yellow and green table cloths. One of the attendees was Allen Perry who told me he and his wife Nell lived in Herndon on Glenbrooke Woods Drive for more than 20 years while he worked for the Department of the Interior.

Allen said he knew St. Timothy's well and that I had been called to a great parish. If it is not a small world it certainly is a small church. Since our joint announcement on July 30, I have had several people tell me about their connections to St. Tim's. One man even told me about being married at the old St. Timothy's. He currently lives in Pennsylvania and is an Episcopal priest. I have not yet arrived, but I can already tell that St. Tim's has both a legacy that is multi-generational and a reach that is broad, even international. As a church community your arms reach around the world.

Sometimes I wonder if the people in our churches are aware just how much of an impact their church makes in their community, not to mention in other countries. St. Tim's has an amazing school, a solid Christian Formation program, and people who make a difference not only in Herndon, but Haiti, the Dakotas, Pennsylvania, and even Taunton, MA.



You have connected with the Hispanic community in your midst and embraced then, too. As an outsider coming into a new community, I can see that St. Tim's has a heritage of which it can be proud. It is a heritage that has bettered the lives of generations and communities across the country. It is a heritage that has been faithful to God's call to love each other and the world.

I am grateful to be joining a community that is vibrant and "has long arms". I am excited for the opportunity to learn how you do things at St. Tim's, to make new friends and support the members of St. Tim's as we work together for God's continuing redemption of creation. There is a saying that goes: "There are no strangers only friends we haven't met yet." The people of St. Timothy's are friends I haven't met yet. I am so looking forward to getting to know you and working with you as we move St. Tim's forward in faithfulness to God's plan.

Vestry Report

July 2017 July Giving: \$47,650 Budgeted Giving: \$47,223 YTD Expenses vs. Income: (\$2,880)

At the August 28 meeting, the Vestry received the General Fund balance as determined by the dedicated work over several months of Andy Hamm and the Finance committee, along with Treasurer Duane Hartge. The General Fund has a cushion of \$55,000. The newly projected deficit for the close of 2017 is \$47,000. The Vestry determined to draft a letter and announcements to the congregation to clearly communicate the situation and ask for help.

The Vestry approved the Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines, and appointed Dean Rorhbaugh to fill the current vacancy in the Endowment Committee.

The Vestry heard a Music and Organ report from Susy Nixon, and determined to send a letter to John Farmer outlining our understanding of the next steps and dates for the remainder of the organ installation, including completing the installation of the remaining pipes by September 30 and final payment once final tuning and punch list are complete. The Vestry also heard a request from Interim Music Director Roger Long to turn the storage room at the end of the upper hallway into an office. Sporadic and unscheduled use of the Music Room and of Roger's desk for meeting space has caused interruptions to his work schedule. The Vestry determined not to make office/building changes at this time, but passed a resolution regarding the use of the Music/Altar Guild room, that "The room on the upper level known as the Music Room, shared with the Altar Guild, is to be used only for Music and Altar Guild activities, and not as the location for unrelated meetings or events." If Ministries need to use space in the church, that space usage needs to be scheduled in advance with Kevin, and needs to occur in a public room of the building and not in a staff member's office.

The Vestry heard from Building and Grounds Chair Sean Brady about a list of upcoming expenses from deferred maintenance, including the removal of a dying tree on the edge of the property, water damage to the choir room from a roof leak, the need to replace the choir room HVAC system, patching the parking lot, and re-tiling Henry Hall, which might necessitate remediating asbestos from the tile underlayment. Priorities for the next two months are installing a humidifier in the Sanctuary to keep the restored organ in good repair and repairing the steps at the front of the building, both of which have already been approved by the Vestry.

The Vestry approved the Vestry Nominating Committee, consisting of the four outgoing Vestry members (Genevieve Zetlan, Duane Hartge, Hal Hallett, and Vilma Lemus) and two members of the congregation: Nikki O'Malley and Brian Fluche. The Vestry approved changing Vestry meetings from the fourth Monday of the month to the second Tuesday of the month, beginning September 12.

Lastly, the Vestry discussed two questions from Jill Cox: first, how to handle grown children of parish families in Church Windows. The Vestry advised that as Jill is assisting Nikki O'Malley with cleanup of Church Windows records, she may contact adult children to determine if they would like separate records of address or continue to be listed with their families. The Vestry also discussed her proposal to take up a special collection for churches in Texas affected by flooding. Understanding the deep desire St. Timothy's folks have to help those in need or trouble everywhere but also recognizing that our funding and accounting systems are not set up for efficient disaster relief, the Vestry determined, as in the past with Katrina, Sandy, and Matthew, to encourage donations directly to Episcopal Relief and Development, which is working with Dioceses in Texas and Louisiana on the ground now, is set up to take donations and get them where they are most needed, and they has extremely good accountability and transparency.

The Search Committee, comprised of committed and prayerful folks, led the way from the driver's seat; listening to the Saint Tim's family dream of what the destination could look like. And a couple of weeks ago came the news from the front seat when asked are we there yet?... yes, we're here! The new Rector will join us September 10.

And like my five-year-old self in the back seat we all want to unbuckle, climb out of the "tank", and run towards the dreams of what can be.

I know you are excited, I am too. The last two years have been a time of personal growth and a lot of challenge thrown in for good measure. Father Mark and Mother Anne both sat in the car with us all for parts of the journey; reminding us of where we were headed and all that it could be. What a special group of people you are! I would just say to be patient and give him the time that he will need to get acclimated to his new surroundings as he settles in. I am sure he is going to want to get to know you all, and that means he may have a pretty full calendar for a bit, so we can help by setting expectations that he will need time to have those introductory conversations.

Talents for a Change

On July 30th, you may have heard Rev. Jackie Thomson preach upon the Gospel written in Matthew 13:31-33; 44:52, in which Jesus relates five parables to his disciples to describe what the kingdom of heaven is like. He ends by asking them if they understood and like many obedient students they said "Yes", but like many of us after sitting in class for an hour or two, they were only too glad to be released to get something to eat or chatter among themselves.

But also like those faithful men and women, maybe you went home to think a little more about what was read and discussed, especially in light of the changes coming on September 10th with the "Welcome Home Sunday" and "Ministry Fair," where we welcome our new Rector and will be invited to share our talents in furthering our work in the church family.

I would like to share the last part of the commentary on this passage written by my favorite commentator, William Barclay:

Every person comes to Jesus Christ with some gift and with some ability. Jesus does not ask that they should give up their gift. So many people think that when a person declares for Christ they must give things up and concentrate on the socalled religious things. But a scholar does not give up his scholarship when they become a Christian, rather they use it for Christ, A business person does not give up their business, rather they should run it as a Christian would. One who can sing, or dance or paint must not give up their art, but must use their art as a Christian would. The sports player need not give up the sport but must play as a Christian would. Jesus did not come to empty life but to fill it, not to impoverish life, but to enrich it. Here we see Jesus telling people not

to abandon their gifts, but to use them even more wonderfully in the light of the knowledge which He has given them.

I have taken license to assist Barclay with the addition of some inclusive pronouns, as he was writing in a different era when women were excluded from duties they easily and effectively perform. Yet the inspiration from this passage can spur us on to Christian service.

So I appeal to all members of our church family to consider what talents they have to offer to our Christian work and to consult with those who are already committed to the various Ministries who will be available with information and VOLUNTEER LISTS on September 10th and I also urge you not to be shy of offering other ideas and areas of spiritual studies you may like to pursue in the coming year.

Harvesting Creation's Bounty

With another annual harvest season upon us, and as our farmers begin to reap a broad variety of agricultural crops here, the first chapter of Genesis in the Holy Bible comes to mind. That biblical chapter tells us about the third day of creation, when God separated the waters and the land, "saw that it was good," and caused vegetation to grow on earth, including "plants yielding seed of every kind." We are are blessed with a variety of seed-related money crops as a major and these form a very significant part of many local economies. Take winter wheat. Its seeds, planted last fall and germinating in the earth over the winter, came up bright green as the climate warmed with approaching spring. It reached maturity in the late summer and has been harvested. Virginia's corn crops seem to be coming along nicely, standing tall on its stalks and promising what appears to be a good harvest; its leaves pointing skyward, indicating it is getting enough rain to grow – so far.

Soybeans cover a number of fields in the Commonwealth. Their leaves, currently green, soon will turn to old gold as the plants ripen, then become brown as the plants are ready for harvesting. Barley also is grown in Virginia, some of it destined for the making of beer, especially with the increasing number of small craft breweries popping up around Virginia. There are more than 60 of these craft breweries in Northern Virginia alone. Many more can be found throughout our Commonwealth.

Canola, its flowers bringing a blanket of eyecatching yellow to our environment, is being grown here in recent years. It will be the source of the oil many of us use for cooking in our home kitchens. Sunflowers also have become a lucrative crop here, turning their yellow flowery faces each sunshiny day to follow Old Sol as Earth's rotation makes it seem to move across the sky. Sunflower seeds will be part of the mix we put in our backyard bird feeders. And many professional baseball players, not permitted in recent decades, use to use the oncetraditional, cheek-bulging wads of now-banned chewing tobacco long associated with old-time baseball, have converted to more healthful sunflower seeds, removing their tasty inner kernels in their mouths and spitting out the husks. Combined, these grains contribute considerably to many local Virginia economy, ranking agricultural products right along with seafood, forestry and tourism as major parts of the abundance enjoyed, for example, in Virginia's Northern Neck.

In fact, economists for Virginia's state government report that, after harvest, nearly 95 percent of these local crops are sold to processing companies and other producers bringing in millions of dollars to local Virginia farmers and those involved in crop harvesting and transportation, as well as the retail merchants and commercial providers of goods and services with whom they and we deal. Indeed, we all benefit from it. So – the next time your car is caught behind some huge farm equipment as it lumbers slowly along a narrow rural road, relax and appreciate that it is all part of what makes farming in Virginia the beautiful thing it is. And you might say, even aloud, "Thank you, God, for your bountiful creation."

The Lord will hear you – surely.
