A Message from our Rector

Dear Friends,

My practice for baptisms has been to follow the guidelines of the current Book of Common Prayer. With the adoption of the 1979 Prayer Book our church made one of the most radical theological adjustments since the Reformation. Prior to 1979 baptisms were often private and rarely recognized as a community event. The '79 Prayer Book reemphasized the importance of Baptism theologically and placed it liturgically at the most important times of our church year. If you go to the Prayer Book you will note that the Rite of Baptism (Page 299) follows the Easter Vigil---the most holy night of the year---and precedes the Eucharistic Liturgies---the most Holy Act for Episcopalians. It is not a coincidence that Baptism is placed in this location.

Because the 1979 Prayer Book has a greater consistency and integrity to the liturgical year than previous Prayer Books, it specifies that Baptism should be reserved for the following occasions: The Easter Vigil, Day of Pentecost, All Saints Day, Baptism of Our Lord in January, and the visit by a Bishop (BCP, 312). As there is a long stretch of time between Pentecost and All Saints, my practice has also been to baptize on the first Sunday after the Feast of the Transfiguration in August. I feel that is in keeping with the intent of the Prayer Book, but also provides additional opportunity for those wishing to be baptized between Pentecost and All Saints.

Another reason that I hold to the practice of performing baptisms on the specified days is because when a priest is doing 20 plus baptisms year (as I have done in the past), it is easy for every other church service to seem to be someone's



baptism. It doesn't help the experience of the liturgical year for those attending regularly. Furthermore, random baptisms sometimes leave people in the congregation feeling like their worship has been hijacked by someone they may not even know. Lastly, baptism is at its heart initiation into the community. To serve that purpose, it must be a community event---and what better way to emphasize our community than to have multiple baptisms together, on the important days for the community, i.e. the Feasts for which they are reserved.

There is much more that I could write on Baptism as it is so important to our community, but I hope this brief and simple explanation is helpful to you when thinking about Baptism and what it means to be part of Christ's Body. I invite you to talk with me more about Baptism, or any of the Sacraments of the Church, and I look forward to celebrating with you all.

Vestry Report

September 2017

August Giving: \$40,527

Budgeted Giving: \$47,223

YTD Expenses vs. Income: \$4,728

At the September Vestry meeting on Tuesday the 12th, the Vestry approved the August meeting minutes and passed the Rector Housing allowance designating \$40,000 of Fr. Rich's compensation as housing. The Vestry approved the 2016 Audit conducted by the Finance Committee, and briefly discussed the need to have a professional audit from an outside firm completed soon, since one has not been done in at least 15 years.

Susy Nixon reported that there will be a call with Farmer on Friday, and we should have a firm date for his return to install the remaining pipes at that time.

Fr. Rich sought input on top priorities for St. Timothy's: 1) Integration of and ministry to the Spanish service congregants, 2) a strong Stewardship campaign, and 3) Christian Education. The Vestry approved continuing Bill Baker's work with the Saturday evening service through the end of the year while Fr. Rich transitions and brushes up on his Spanish preaching. Stewardship was discussed, with the need to educate Spanish service congregants on how the offering works, Stewardship as a spiritual discipline, and what happens if a pledge has to be changed. Fr. Rich suggested the national church resources may have pamphlets in Spanish. Fr. Rich sought input on Family Service, and plans to change it to the first Sunday of the month beginning in November. He also plans to put together a Christian Formation group to examine Christian Education at St. Timothy's.

An All Saints' Invitation

I am inviting you to bring in pictures of your deceased loved ones in October and display them behind the altar and on the wall with the columbarium. I will have some of my family on the altar on October 1st if I can find the box they are packed in. During the rest of the month, you will see that the altar will be increasingly crowded with pictures of our loved ones who have gone before us to become part of the Church Triumphant. They will remain there until after the 10 AM service on Sunday, November 5th.

We bring pictures of our loved ones into church for All Saints' Sunday to remind us of their love for us while they were on this earth, and to show our love for them. We also remember the good and bad times we had with them, and the hope we have in the Resurrection that will enable us to see them again. On Sunday, November 5th each photograph will have a candle lit in front of it as a symbol of that person's life and union with Christ. The candle is also a symbol of our love for them.

When you bring in pictures of your family and friends who are deceased, you may place them on the reredos and the wall with the columbarium yourselves, or ask a Greeter or Usher to help you. We would be glad to put them up before the service or immediately after the service during Coffee Hour. If you don't have a photo of someone you

would like remembered, you can simply have their name displayed using the name cards, which will be found at the back of the church on the table in the crossing.

There will also be some name cards available in the office. Name cards may be placed in front of the photos to identify those pictured. Baptismal Preparation


The next Baptismal Sunday is November 5, 2017. Anyone desiring to be baptized or to have a child baptized should contact Director of Parish Operations Kevin Hamilton at kevinh@saint-timothys.org, immediately to fill out the required paper work and be added to the list. Those who are to be baptized are to have at least two Godparents, both of whom must be baptized and practicing members of a Christian church. It is permitted to have more than two Godparents, but two is the minimum.

Godparent preparation is scheduled for November 1st, 2017, at 7:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Those adults being baptized and Godparents for all candidates must be present. Young children do not need to be present, but may if their parents wish it.

Organ Project News

John Farmer and his staff are performing the final part of the organ installation starting October 2 and concluding by October 17. During that time, ALL services will be held as scheduled. The restorers will work around our calendar; but please just be careful around their work areas while they are here.

The church office has received a few inquiries about when the organ rededication concert will be scheduled. Once this final installation phase is completed, we will begin planning for a formal rededication of the instrument – probably in conjunction with St. Timothy's 150th anniversary in 2018!



preached at the community-wide service at St. Paul's Memorial Church.

Your Region V was represented at the meeting of the governance bodies by Region V President, Ms. Joni Langevoort (Holy Comforter); Region V Dean, The Very Reverend Hillary West (Epiphany Oak Hill); and Region V Representative to the Diocesan Executive Board, Ms. Diane Miller (St. Timothy's Herndon).

Our Diocesan Bishop, Shannon Johnston, expanded the meeting to include members of all the leadership governance bodies of the Diocese—the Standing Committee, the Executive Board, Region Deans, Region Presidents –the Diocesan Race and Reconciliation Committee, and the clergy of Region XIV, which includes the Charlottesville area, for this rare treat.

Bishop Curry brought his message of love and encouraged us each to live a Jesus-shaped life. He spoke of a “revolution of relationships” where we intentionally connect with each other at a personal level and where we each find ways for truth to emerge – by allowing people to tell their truths, which emerge from their personal stories. When we listen to each other's' stories, we become changed. In providing guidance for how we move forward in the wake of recent violence, he admonished the gathered to start with reflection on Jesus' principles, morals and values—those will guide how we approach a situation. He noted the Church needs to be present as an agent of Jesus and love, not as an advocate of liberal or conservative perspective on any issue.

Bishop Curry encouraged us to refer to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s “Ten Commandments for Cultural Change,” written for the participants before the Birmingham March of 1963. In closing, Bishop Curry admonished us to “walk together, people of good will, and live the way of love until the love of God transforms this world.”
