It is an honor to be part of St. Timothy's, a Christian community committed to helping our neighbors near and far. With all of the bad news in the world it is encouraging to witness the goodness of God's people in this Church. God bless you, my friends, and may our Savior's love and grace ever touch more people through your ministries.

Among all of the ministries of St. Timothy's there is one that gets little notice. Every Sunday one of our members sits at a table in Henry Hall prepared to sell Giant or Shoppers Food Warehouse debit cards/scrip. Few people

know that these grocery chains sell the cards and scrip to us, and that we receive 5% back from them for our ministries and missions. You can buy, for example, \$100 worth of cards or scrip, with which you get \$100 worth of groceries. And St. Timothy's receives \$5.00 in return. What a deal!

## **Stewardship of Creation Committee**

The Committee began as the Commission on the Stewardship of Creation in August 1992 and was formed by Bishop Lee in response to a resolution passed at General Convention in 1991. The Diocese of Virginia was one of the first to create such a Committee focused on caring for God's Creation. The 1991 resolution called for Episcopalians to view environmental stewardship as a matter of the "highest urgency" and asked dioceses to develop committees and programs to help address threats to God's Creation. Shortly thereafter, the commission was "promoted" to full committee status as it was seen by the diocesan leadership to be an "ongoing program of the Diocese of Virginia." After the beginning of the Diocese of Virginia's Stewardship of Creation Committee in 1992, a seasonal committee newsletter began in April 1993 (now available on-line at

http://stewardshipofcreation.thediocese.net/). Over the years, the Committee presented several successful resolutions calling for: increased attention to environmental hazards in churches and schools; a more active clergy role in emphasizing the connection between Christianity and care for the environment; open dialog on the scientific, economic, theological and ethical aspects of environmental issues; increased ecumenical outreach and parish education on global change; increased energy conservation and use of renewable energy by parishes; and utilization of energy-efficient building materials and designs in new construction. Over the years, the Diocese of Virginia's Stewardship of Creation Committee has looked for ways to expand its ministry and message to more and more congregations. The Diocese encouraged individual churches to create the volunteer role of "Steward of Creation" to help promote and educate parishes on environmental stewardship issues and the activities of the Committee. The Committee's efforts have also resulted in other churches outside of the Diocese creating similar roles. The first Diocesan conference on "religion and the environment" was held in 1994 at the Virginia Theological Seminary conference facilities. Conferences have been held most years since and have featured keynote speakers such as Bishop Lee and other theologians, NASA astronauts, lay environmentalists, and scientists. This (almost) annual event is part of the Committee's on-going effort to bring environmental issues to the attention of our parishes and missions. (Thanks to Paul Conroy for this information!)


Over the years, the Diocese of Virginia's Stewardship of Creation Committee has sponsored projects throughout the Diocese in order to expand the ways we look at caring for God's Creation. Recent projects have included: creating a revolving loan fund to assist churches with costs related to improving energy efficiency; developing and advocating for a forest management plan to improve the stewardship of 1,000+ acres of church-owned forest; partnering with other faith groups to help establish Virginia Interfaith Power and Light; and launching a committee web site. 
Thinking about summer plans for your 4- and 5-year-olds yet? St. Timothy's Pre-School offers some wonderful programs to entertain

# Rebirth, Renewal, and Relevancy....





resurrection of the Son of God: what is next for us? How, over two thousand years later, does the resurrection relate to us as members of Saint Timothy's in Herndon, Virginia?

Yes, the story we know about how the Christians fared...how it went from a persecuted small band of followers to a major religion of the world is known to us. But even in the much larger, more sophisticated world of today, we can still be in a minority. We as members of Saint Timothy's can provide the encouragement we all need to survive in a world not really interested in a tolerant community of fellow believers. While many do not see a tolerant community of faith as important, or a God that gave his only begotten Son to die for all of us as valid; for us it is right and salutary to be in fellowship supporting each other. The encouragement and fellowship we can give each other, the strength we can provide to each other to find our way on our individual walks of faith, that is important, and valuable.

We, the people of Saint Timothy's, as a tolerant community of faith, will be finding our own rebirth and renewal. Yes, change can be uncomfortable, but our God is a God of change. We as his children must also be receptive to that change, in all the forms that it brings to us. The ministries of Saint Timothy will be looking at each individual mission, and how to become a more proactive part in the ordinary lives of our members and the community around us. All members will be invited

to partake, and the ministries of our church will be asking you what you need to be a more active part of the community of faith. The Stewardship and Finance committees will sponsor dinners twice a year to update you on the challenges and mission accomplishments of your community of faith. A yearly emphasis on stewardship will culminate with a fall celebration as encouragement, not lecture. In essence, Saint Timothy's is discovering its relevancy anew.

If you are not active in the church community, do not let any lack of communication be taken as uncaring or indifference. The best of our intentions can go astray, so that we lose contact with each other to the point of not knowing each other. But even the prodigal son of the parable was welcomed home because he was so loved.

It is our desire that you will be a part of that new beginning, make inquiries where you can help, challenge when you are told no without reason or alternative, and start something new if there is merit. Discipleship is not easy, it is not cheap, but it has rewards that last far beyond our own limitations.

This will take time, lots of coordination, a sprinkle of humility, a dash of patience, but it will endure. All that is God's handiwork endures...Now and Forever, Amen.

## Ministry of the Month: Hospitality

"Join us for refreshments..." Each Sunday morning during announcements, Father Brad warmly invites newcomers to join St. Timothy's family in Henry Hall after the service. Coffee hour is an opportunity to extend fellowship and community beyond the sanctuary, as an interim step back into the larger world. We connect with friends old and new, conduct church business, and catch up on news. Children (of all ages!) cheerfully grab a snack or beverage on the way to their next task.

Organizing coffee hour for the Sunday morning services is a major focus of the Hospitality Ministry. The ministry's mission is to provide opportunities throughout the year for all members of our church family to grow together socially while celebrating church events. The ministry seeks to create an inviting place and welcoming atmosphere for everyone. Hospitality is a wonderful, logical aspect of our larger mission and current stewardship initiative.

In addition to coffee hour, Hospitality joyfully organizes, hosts and supports a wide variety of special events. Examples include – but are not limited to – the Annual Meeting luncheon in January, Welcome Back Sunday in September, the Bishop's Luncheon, Christmas Eve dinner for clergy and choir, confirmation receptions, baby showers, and farewell parties. Hospitality inventories the kitchen and restocks the supplies (e.g., coffee, tea, cups, napkins, plates, utensils) necessary for all ministries to host events. Hospitality is also responsible for the water cooler in Henry Hall.

This year, the Hospitality Ministry is launching new, creative initiatives – such as St. Timothy's Silent Auction – to help stretch its budget (50% less than last year). Looking toward the future, the ministry hopes to

expand its membership, to get more people involved in hosting coffee hours, and to save for a new refrigerator.

Given this "full plate" of activities, I was amazed to discover that the Hospitality Ministry currently consists of its Chair, Beth Lumnitzer. As the Hospitality Ministry, Beth supports those who sign up to host coffee hour, and she quietly fills the gaps when no one volunteers. On behalf of the ministry, she takes the lead on special events such as the Annual Meeting luncheon. She supports other ministries when they host events that include refreshments. She assisted the Youth Group in hosting this year's Palm Sunday-St. Patrick's Day coffee hour. Marcia Andere frequently lends her talents to special events. Bill Sanger helps out by buying groceries. Hollis Colie serves as the Vestry Liaison.

Beth says, "I feel this is an important ministry because it brings everyone together every Sunday."

In researching this article, I learned that hosting a coffee hour is easy. Finding people to sign up has been difficult. If you enjoy refreshments and have not yet been a host, please consider signing up! Groups and ministries may also sign up. Hosting coffee hour is an ideal opportunity to honor special occasions (birthdays, anniversaries, baptisms), pay tribute to loved ones, share a favorite recipe, or simply take a turn. The sign-up sheets are in Henry Hall. Volunteers can also e-mail Carol Frost, Parish Administrator (office@saint-timothys.org). Pamphlets provide step-by-step instructions for first-timers – and Beth will be happy to assist. You can host coffee hour for a service and still attend that service.

In Beth's words, "Your donation of time and talent is greatly appreciated. The Hospitality Ministry will support you in any way possible to make your hosting experience pleasant and rewarding."

The Hospitality Ministry is actively seeking new members; meetings are few and very short. In addition, this ministry is a great fit for busy people in search of one-time tasks such as:

- Coffee hour immediately following the 8:00, 9:30 or 11:00 a.m. Sunday service
- Luncheons and other special events
- Kitchen clean up
- Kitchen restocking, including donations of items for the "kitchen shower" each May.

The words hospital and hospice derive from the same roots.
