Líving Our Easter Faith

With every Baptism the Celebrant prays "that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ ... may live in the power of his resurrection" [BCP page 306]. It is a very loaded and confounding prayer. What does it mean to be "baptized into the death of Jesus?" And how do we "live in the power of his resurrection?"

We in the Episcopal Church believe that Baptism is a ritual of welcome; the person being baptized becomes a member of God's family and the particular Christian community where the baptism is conducted. It is a celebration of love and forgiveness given to us by God in Jesus Christ. It is our acceptance of the gift of new and eternal life with God. In Baptism we "die" symbolically and spiritually to the old ways of sin and death, and rise to "the new life of grace." Baptism is a Sacrament in which the Holy Spirit enters the person being baptized, conveying the grace to grow in faith.

The essential elements of the faith we grow into are presented (in question and response form) in "An Outline of the Faith" in our prayer book on pages 845 - 862:

Q. What do we mean by the resurrection of the body?

A. We mean that God will raise us from death in the fullness of our being, that we may live with Christ in the communion of the saints.

Q. What is the communion of saints?

A. The communion of saints is the whole family of God, the living and the dead, those whom we love and those whom we hurt, bound together in Christ by sacrament, prayer, and praise.

Q. What do we mean by everlasting life?

A. By everlasting life, we mean a new existence, in which we are united with all the people of God, in the joy of fully knowing and loving God and each other.

Q. What, then, is our assurance as Christians?

A. Our assurance as Christians is that nothing, not even death, shall separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.

Living in the power of the resurrection is living Easter faith, living with the understanding and belief that we are members of God's family and heirs of God's Kingdom.

We are adopted sons and daughters of God, sisters and brothers to one another in the Church. All of our sins are forgiven. By grace we live like Christ lived, loving and serving God, loving and serving our neighbors. And we bear the suffering of this life with hope and joy, knowing that when our journey in this life is done we will be with God and all of the faithful departed in paradise.

During this Eastertide and always, may God give you the grace to live in the power of Christ's resurrection.

May God work to bring us all closer together as a parish family and bless us with a spring teeming with new life and opportunities to renew our mission as the people of God at St. Timothy's.

Give for the glory of God and the well being of God's people. Our gifts change the world; our giving changes us.

Caring for God's Church

Thanks to some generous donations St. Timothy's has ten new tables in the parish hall. And we need to take good care of them. We all need to be good stewards of God's household.

Please, if you are setting tables up for parish events, tip the tables gently on one side, using minimum force pull the legs out until they are straight, and then turn the tables upright. The small rectangular brackets will slide down

over the joint to secure the tables when the tables are upright.

If you are cleaning up, please wipe the tables (and chairs), then tip the tables gently onto one side, pull the small rectangular bracket away from the joint, and using



minimum force press the legs back into the folded position with one hand. Lift the table off the floor and place it gently on the stack.

If you put posters on the walls of the parish hall or hallways please use push pins or masking tape – not scotch tape or duct tape.

If you are the last person to leave the parish hall or any room of the Church, please turn off all of the lights.

Please clean up after yourself. Please place prayer books and hymnals back in the pew racks. Please recycle Sunday announcements and worship booklets.

If you use the kitchen please make sure everything is clean and put away for the next person or group.

If you use one of the restrooms please make sure it is clean and neat for the next person. Turn off the light when you leave, and leave the door open.

Repairs and replacements are expensive. A little care and maintenance goes a long way toward preserving this wonderful facility and its contents, making St. Timothy's an inviting space for everyone. Thank you.

From Our Diocesan Council Delegates

Dear Members of St. Timothy's.

We want to express our gratitude to you for allowing us to serve as your Diocesan delegates over the past year. It was an honor to represent St. Timothy's at the regional meetings, sharing and learning the myriad of opportunities for worship and service within Region V.

The highlight of our year and our last official act as your delegates was the opportunity to participate in the 215th Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia. The Council began at St. Paul's, Richmond. In this exquisite setting we witnessed our Presiding Bishop, Katherine Jefferts Schori, conduct the investiture of Shannon S. Johnston as the 13th Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia. The service was awe-inspiring and incredibly beautiful, with Bishop Shannon's gifted wife serving as musical director. Words cannot adequately express the majesty, beauty, and wonder of this event.

The opening session of the council convened that afternoon under theme of "GO: go teach go baptize, go preach." There were parliamentary procedures to address, elections for various diocesan posts, the adoption of the budget, and reports from various committees. Rev. Lauren Stanley spoke as did Rt. Rev. Julio Murray, Bishop of Panama. Bishop Shannon, in his pastoral address, noted the challenges facing our church, but ended often with the refrain, "Don't you doubt that we can do it." He outlined his five priorities: ministry to Youth and Young Adults; strengthening existing congregations; evangelism, including Christian Education; multicultural missions, especially with respect to our Native American neighbors in Virginia; and Commenting on declining church local outreach. attendance, Bishop Shannon set a three year goal of 50% attendance by communicants vice the current 37% attendance.

Due to the predicted severe snowstorm, the Council was suspended at the end of the day on Friday. We reconvened at the Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria on February 20, 2010. There, our Suffragan Bishop, the Rt. Rev. David Jones, in his report, encouraged us to be mindful of the connection among individual parishes.

In a report regarding the situation in Haiti, we were informed that \$30,000, raised from the offering at Bishop Shannon's investiture, has gone toward the purchase of four trucks to accomplish the distribution of supplies in Haiti. The Diocese will supply an additional six trucks

needed to support this mission from additional targeted donations.

There were additional reports from others, before moving on to the Resolutions Committee report. The revised resolutions were presented to Council for consideration. Most passed after limited discussion. The most discussed resolution was R-14s, a substitute for resolutions R-3 (Inclusiveness in Ordained Ministry), R-4 (Authorizing Rites of Blessing) and R-11 (Defining Sacramental and Civil Understanding of Marriage). This substitute Resolution requested that the Bishop appoint a panel to study the issues with a report due by All Saints Day 2010. The Committee's position was that the diocese should carefully prepare for the time when same sex blessings and/or unions may be considered in our Diocese. An amendment was proposed from the floor that incorporated the original language of R-3 and R-4. This amendment, however, failed and the substitute resolution

Bishop Shannon officially adjourned Council until 2011. There is a link to highlights of the investiture, the Bishop's Pastoral address, as well as original and revised resolutions on the Diocesan website at www.thediocese.net.

Thank you for your trust and faith in us. We were honored and blessed to represent St Timothy's this past year as your Diocesan Delegates.
