# <u>Seasons of life – seasons of the spirit</u>

I marvel at how beautifully green the trees, bushes, and grass are. We are obviously in a season of growth, and there is no place more resplendent with new life than the grounds of St. Timothy's. The specter of living things, the songs of birds, the longer days and warm sunshine feed my soul. Thank you God for this season of growth!

We mark four distinct seasons here in the Mid-Atlantic area, all of fairly equal duration. It's one of the things I most appreciate about this part of the world. There are seasons of the soul too. There are times of new life; springtime of the soul. There are times of growth and abundance; summer of the soul. There are times of harvest; autumn of the soul. And there are times of dormancy; winter of the soul. We may think of this in a linear fashion – birth, full vigor, aging, and death. But we may also think of this as circular; as aging invariably leads to death, so death - by the grace of God – always leads to new life. Each season has its own blessing, and each has its own challenge. But thanks to the love of God in Jesus Christ, life is victorious. Death no longer has the last word.

Seasons of new life, full vigor, fading light, and dormancy are apparent in the human journey - not just in a lifespan – but in the "ups and downs" of the human spirit as well. There are times in our life when we experience spiritual regeneration, new life. There are times when we experience spiritual vitality. There are times when we experience spiritual degeneration. And there are times when we experience spiritual bleakness. The latter, especially, may be uncomfortable – especially to us who want to always have physical and spiritual springtime – but this is how God created the world, and how God created us. And the periods of darkness are always prelude to new life.

It is important to remember that our spiritual journey is marked by seasons, ups and downs, and respond to these in a faithful way. The journey is not static: it is not a perfect incline. We should praise God for the wonderful gifts of spiritual springtime and spiritual summer – and for spiritual autumn and winter as well. Each season is an essential part of our journey toward everlasting life with Jesus Christ. -Brad

# We are all Stewards of Creation

We have been blessed this spring and early summer at St. Tim's to have had dozens of baptisms on Sunday mornings. During each baptism service we say, "We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life." Everywhere I turn this spring, I am reminded of the gift of oceans and fresh water. Our youth have been terribly disturbed, like the rest of us, by the horrific oil spill in the gulf. They feel as if they are standing by watching the disaster unfold without knowing what to do. Sometimes it takes a disaster of this magnitude to make us turn our attention back to creation and the gift that we have in it.

It's easy to forget that creation isn't just the backdrop for our projects and busy lives. The Bible reminds us that we are inextricably linked to God's creation. Paul writes that God's plan to redeem us is part of a larger plan to redeem all of creation: "The whole creation has been groaning in labor pains...the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God" (Romans 8:21-22). Craig Dubishar, our Steward of Creation, attended a Diocesan meeting on water conservation on our behalf on May 15 in Culpepper, VA. In our summer newsletters, Craig will give us concrete ways to conserve water; Rachel Muir, one of the USGS's experts in ground water and water conservation issues, will further increase our awareness on these issues so that we can make a difference. For example at our June 6 car wash, the youth's biggest fundraiser for the Dungannon Mission Trip, we can save as many as 150 gallons of water when washing each car by turning off the hose between rinses. Doing only full loads of laundry and dishes can save up to 1,000 gallons of water a month. (www.livestrong.com/article/121146-conservewater/). I hope that we can all enjoy creation this summer and be good stewards at the same time!

# <u>Celebrating God's Gifts</u> <u>All that we do, with all we have, once we</u> <u>say we believe</u>

One of us was recently browsing the website of another Episcopal Church and noted to his surprise (and perhaps yours also) a comment that the folks on the Stewardship Committee are having "fun"!

Wait a minute! "Fun!"



"When you hand the ushers the offering plates, I wish you would stop saying, 'Here... Go stick it to 'em!' "

Somehow the words "Stewardship" and "fun" do not seem synonymous! Ask most folks what it means to them, and words and phrases like "Pledging," "Fall campaign," 'Time, talent and treasure," and even "Christian duty" will be mentioned. "Celebrate" or "Celebrating" are unlikely to make it into any of the top ten descriptions of Stewardship.

So that got us thinking we must be missing something. Reflecting on the past few years we noted there has been a consistent move towards inclusiveness within St. Timothy's. For example

- The Vestry/Ministry meetings were initiated,
   o Fostering better communication and cooperation
- Evangelism has become Open Arms
  - Focusing on welcoming new comers and helping them integrate into the church
- Creation of VoCoSuM
  - o Bringing volunteers and Ministries together and providing support to both when needed
- This year we have had two Vestry Sundays with another to come this year
  - Providing opportunities for the congregation to meet those responsible for the "business" of the church

We are working towards a realization of the "church family" concept that Fr Brad refers to every week in the Announcements. The term family implies oneness, the members being integrated and complementary in their activities. We refer to ourselves as the Body of Christ, and the Apostle Paul writes elegantly drawing an analogy between the Church and the physical body. He stresses our interdependence and in particular that we all have gifts and all are to be treasured.

So where does fun and Stewardship come in?

A month ago we had the Spring Clean-up. While spring and fall clean-ups have been a feature at St. Tim's for many years, they have not taken place for a year, mainly because of a perceived indifference by the congregation. No matter; as an act of faith, Buildings and Grounds put together a well-organized program, let us all know about it, and what happened? More than 50 of us turned up, spent two to four hours using our varied talents to spruce up the church building and its surroundings, and generally had a great time. In addition, B&G estimated we completed tasks worth several thousands of dollars if they had been carried out by contractors!

This was stewardship at its best; the people of the church working together, giving a little time to blend their many and varied talents to save some of the church's treasure.

So what did we learn from this? Certainly, to quote the famous Prayer of St. Francis, "For it is in giving that we receive," also the pleasure that we get from corporate effort, but perhaps for some of us it was more personal lesson that we have gifts and talents that benefit the common good. Perhaps for the first time, some of us realized that we possess skills that are useful to St. Timothy's and for which we are appreciated. In summary, we now feel more part of the church family.

In some little way for some folks St. Timothy's has become more "we." This is a good thing; to use a phrase in our minds we have taken some degree of ownership.

So let us extend the thought of ownership to what St. Timothy's does. The most obvious, of course, is worshipping God through the services on Sunday morning and Wednesday afternoon, and through our observation of Easter, Christmas and other Christian festivals. Worship, however, is not restricted to the Sanctuary; we are called by James to demonstrate our faith through "works". The work of the ministries is an ongoing act of our worship. These activities are a reflection of our faith. Note the use of the word "our." Each ministry is an expression of St. Timothy's mission to do the work God gave us to do; it is work done by St. Timothy's, it is our work. By coming here on Sunday morning, praising God and contributing what we do, we are all part of what St. Timothy's does.

So what do we do? Well here comes the surprise! VoCoSuM compiled a list of what we do and amazingly identified 70 different ministry opportunities! From shawl making to visiting the elderly, from singing to taking bread to new members, the list is comprehensive. In typical selfeffacing Episcopal fashion, folks are living examples of Stewardship at its best; using their talents and gifts to further the work of the Church and (quietly) enjoying themselves while doing so.

That is what we want to celebrate!

Over the next few months we want to bring before you examples of this kind of Stewardship; to show that serving can be a joy. Now we have to recognize that it may take a little effort to get folks to talk about what they do because Episcopalians are not generally known for their skills in self promotion; we tend to pay less attention to Jesus' admonition regarding "hiding our lamp under a bushel" than most. But we are sure we will manage.

## And why so?

First, it does no harm to celebrate ourselves sometimes. Mainly however, to let everybody know who we really are and to show them how easy it is to become more part of the St. Timothy's mission. We want to show you that whatever talent or gift you have, there is an opportunity for you to nurture it here, whatever time you give will be well spent, and whatever treasure you contribute will help do astonishing things!

## Alternative to Fossil Fuels -- Hot Water??

Well, not the hot water from your home faucet, but geothermal energy from within this magnificent Planet Earth. The Geothermal Energy Association (GEA) is reporting that geothermal energy supplies a total installed capacity of 3.15 GW to the U.S., in states including Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The report identifies up to 6.44 GW of new geothermal power plant capacity under development in the U.S. in those states as well as Oregon, Colorado, Florida, Louisiana and Mississippi. This pushes the prospects of



nearly 10 GW of installed capacity in the coming years over a broad section of the nation. At that level, geothermal power will satisfy the needs of over 10 million people in 14 states and still have tremendous growth potential. Unlike taking too long a hot shower and wasting the water, this sounds like an excellent way to use our alternative energy sources. (A message from St. Timothy's Steward of Creation)

## Línk Needs Volunteers

LINK, an all-volunteer non-profit coalition of churches and community organizations providing emergency food assistance to needy families in Herndon, Sterling and Ashburn, is looking for volunteers. Please look over the list below and see if one of these might fit your schedule. Again, thank you so much for your compassion of our neighbors in need! If you have friends who might be interested, feel free to pass on this information.

<u>Food Phone Coordinator</u> – This is a great job for someone who works from home, retired individuals, or someone with a flexible work schedule. They would remotely retrieve messages from the LINK answering machine during the  $15^{th}$  –  $31^{st}$  of April, August, and December and then schedule deliveries, up to 4 a day. LINK delivers food Tuesdays – Saturdays, so there is some flexibility. Total time needed each day is up to 3 hours but some days it will be less. It adds up to about 6 weeks a year all done from home!

<u>Weekend Food Sorters</u> – Trader Joe's has generously donated leftover perishable food items to LINK. We are looking for volunteers (or groups) to sort through the donated food on Saturdays and Sundays, disposing of whatever is spoiled, and cleaning up the good stuff. This is a great family project or a group volunteer project.

<u>Food Donation Pick-up</u> – Various businesses donate food to LINK. We are looking for drivers to pick up donations from stores on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings.

## Do you want to change the world?

I grew up in the Deep South after World War II. I saw newsreels about the war, witnessed a lot of racial bigotry, and knew I wanted to do something to make the world a better place for everyone. I wanted to do it all - put an end to war, eliminate poverty, overcome discrimination, and cure disease. I wrestled a lot with this in high school and college, but couldn't quite figure out what to do, or how to do it. Changing the world is a tall order. After college I had a variety of jobs, most of which had little or no positive impact. I floundered. But God had a plan.

One day, in utter frustration, I told God he could have my life; I didn't know what to do with it. And nothing happened (as far as I could tell): I didn't hear any heavenly voices; there was no lightning or thunder. But very

slowly, imperceptibly, God took over. After years of avoiding Church, I wandered into St. John's Episcopal

Church and knew, instantly, that I was exactly where I was supposed to be. Over the next several years I found myself leading the youth program, teaching Sunday School, serving on the Vestry, assisting in worship services, going with the Rector to visit people in hospitals, and helping the Altar Guild. I became aware of the things that Christian communities do to change the world - raising the next generation in faith, guiding young people through all the "landmines" of life, offering support to people in distress, sending members out into the world "to love and serve the Lord."

And now, here I am, here we are; the people of St. Timothy's are changing the world in innumerable ways. We host recovery programs for people with the disease of addiction, an excellent preschool for children, a Boy Scout troop, Fairfax County's parenting program, a "Challenger Dance" for young people with special needs. We send our members to Dungannon (the poorest area of Virginia), and to the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota (the poorest people in North America). We sponsor 15 children in Haiti (the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere). We pray for anyone - member or not - who needs our prayers. We distribute handmade shawls to people in crisis. We conduct "Godly Play" and Journey to Adulthood" programs for children and youth. We have a very active program for teens. We provide Sacramental support and worship for anyone who wants to attend. We offer a variety of educational programs for adults who want to grow in faith. We visit people who cannot come to Church. We assist dozens of people everyweek with basic necessities. We support community enterprises, some of which were created by members of St. Timothy's - Link (food pantry), LAWS (Loudoun Abused Women Shelter for abused women and children), Reston Interfaith (multiple service organization), Embry Rucker Homeless shelter, Hypothermia Shelter, Jeanie Schmidt Free Clinic, The Closet (good second-hand clothing), Moreover, all of us are involved with family members, friends, neighbors, class mates, co-workers, and people we meet during the week, offering support, sharing our gifts. And that's not the half of what this Christian community does week after week, all year long, year after year.

"Where there is hatred, we sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where

there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is

despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy."
