Our Episcopal Church's Future

The Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion have received a lot of press in recent months. There is talk of schism. To date 7 of 110 Dioceses of the Episcopal Church are considering other options or have asked for "Alternative Primatial oversight" (meaning they no longer recognize the authority of our Presiding Bishop). However, there is no such provision at this time, and there is disagreement within the Dioceses in question. So, what will happen, and when it will happen, has yet to be determined.

In our most recent General Convention the Episcopal Church decided to take no action that would further strain the bonds of the Anglican Communion. We did, however, elect the first ever female Presiding Bishop, the first female Primate in the Anglican Communion. This has raised the question of women's Ordination in parts of the Communion that do not acknowledge Ordained ministry for women. There are a lot of meetings and discussions going on all over the world right now.

There are fewer than two dozen congregations out of 198 in the Diocese of Virginia that are considering some other path. Only two clergy so far have renounced their vows in favor of allying with other parts of the Anglican Communion. No property suits have yet been filed, and I pray it will not come to that. We have much more important things to do with the financial resources entrusted to us.

My greatest concern is that the Church's voice in a war-torn and broken world has been compromised. Those who look for reason to denounce the Church, Christianity, or organized religion, find ample excuse in our internal conflicts. All our talk of love and forgiveness has no credibility if we cannot love and forgive one another in the Church.

At the heart of all this is the question of Biblical interpretation – how we understand the Word of God, and who is welcome at the Lord's Table. It is important to remember that the Sacraments of the Church are reliable sources of grace. None of us is worthy of

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A New Perspective on "Let the Little Children Come To Me"

On my first day at St. Timothy's, I was sitting crosslegged in a circle of Vacation Bible School students. We were in music class and had just sung about Jesus' saying, "Let the little children come to me." The music teacher asked, "Why do you think Jesus says that?" A second grader responded without hesitation, "It's his *job*. It's what he came to do. It's not like he was busy."

The unsentimental, matter-of-factness of this answer surprised and delighted the adults in the room. Of course Jesus was busy. He had crowds pressing in on him all the time. The disciples certainly saw how busy Jesus was. That's why they "spoke sternly" to the people bringing babies to Jesus and tried to push them away.

The disciples were busy themselves. Shortly before this encounter with the children, they'd been arguing over who was the greatest among them. They'd been trying to stop people from casting out demons in Jesus' name.

Like the disciples, it's easy sometimes for us in the Church to get caught up in the world's message that the busier we are, the greater we are. If we act on that message, we miss the point of Jesus' ministry: to care for "the least of these" as God's own children. Instead, we busy ourselves trying to define Jesus' job as we think it should be done. We try to figure out who is right or wrong, who needs to be stopped and encouraged with certain agendas, who deserves our time and resources and who doesn't. We even try to figure out if, with all our flaws, we are worthy of Christ's love. This busyness is exhausting.

That's why I found the second-grader's perspective on Jesus so refreshing. She knew that Jesus was never too busy to lose sight of what he came to do: to love and to care for "the least of these" as God's own children. How would it be if we responded honestly from our own needs and trusted Jesus to do his job? We could let go of worrying about the job we think we should be doing in Jesus' Name and let him do the job

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the Sacraments; we are all sinners. Our reception of them makes us worthy. We are transformed by them. Therefore, no group of people should be categorically denied access. The church welcomes us as we are, and calls upon us to examine our lives, our attitudes and behaviors; come to grips with how we fall short, pray for God's grace, and submit "ourselves, our souls and bodies" [Rite I, prayer II Holy Eucharist] to God so we may be made new, like Christ.

I think we have lost sight of God's transforming grace.

I pray for the Church, for my own faith and understanding. And I trust that "All things work for the good for those who believe" [St. Paul]. God's people will ultimately be better and more faithful for this time of trial.

From the Music Director

Fall Choir Schedule Offers Something For Everyone

Sing to the Lord a NEW SONG! It is time once again to announce the beginning of a new year of singing and ringing to the glory of God! We have many opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to become involved in our Music Ministry. As always, I want to encourage everyone to come and check us out! Our choirs meet weekly for rehearsals and sing and ring regularly for Sunday services and other special occasions. Previous musical experience is never required and becoming a member of one of our ensembles is a fantastic way to become acquainted with the basics of music.

So, without further ado, here is our schedule for the 2006-2007 season of music at St. Timothy's:

TUESDAY: 6:00 – 7:00 p.m. YOUTH CHOIR Ages 8+

7:00 – 8:30 p.m. ST. CECILIA CHOIR Intergenerational - no minimum age requirement

WEDNESDAY: 6:00 – 7:00 p.m. HANDBELL CHOIR Ages 13+

7:00 - 8:00 p.m. HANDBELL CHOIR Ages 14+

THURSDAY: 7:30 – 9:00 p.m. ST. AMBROSE CHOIR Ages 14+

Youth Choir: is for youths ages 8 and older. We use the training methods developed by the Royal School of Church Music which teaches choristers the basics of music reading, theory, and correct vocal production. It is a valuable way for youth to become actively involved in the life of the Church and learn about the vital ministry and gift of music.

St. Cecilia Choir: provides choral support in the form of hymns and anthems for the 9:30 a.m. service each Sunday. Beginning this year, we will be meeting on Tuesday evenings to rehearse music for the following Sunday. We encourage everyone interested, including parents and their children, to come together and help lead the congregation in making a Joyful Noise!

Handbell Choirs: We have such a great interest in ringing handbells at St. Timothy's that we discovered one choir simply was not enough! Therefore, now we have two choirs that will begin meeting on Wednesdays to rehearse and ring as scheduled throughout the year. Traditionally, our first handbell choir is more accessible to those who may be new to ringing or reading music. However, both choirs continually welcome new members as space permits, so I encourage everyone to turn in their registration forms as early as possible!

St. Ambrose Choir: is for "adults" ages 14 and older. This choir meets regularly for rehearsals and sings each Sunday for the 11:00 a.m. service, providing musical support through the singing of hymns and anthems.

Concert Series

Last year the Music Ministry began what turned out to be a successful and inspiring concert series featuring musicians from the area, followed by dessert receptions and a time for fellowship.

This year, I am excited to announce we have a number of exceptionally talented artists planning to come and share their gifts with St. Timothy's.

Below is a glance at what will be happening this Fall and Winter. I want to encourage everyone to plan to attend each event as they will be excellent ways to support the important ministry of those God has blessed with the vocation of sharing the gift of music, and to support St. Timothy's which also benefits from the funds raised through ticket sales.

SEPTEMBER: 16th -17th Choral Workshop & Hymn Festival - David Cherwien, clinician. Dr. Cherwien is director of Music at Mt. Olive Church in Minneapolis, MN. His work as an organist, director, and composer has led him to become a familiar name in the realm of church music. He will come and lead a workshop for our choirs and those in the community interested in attending, sharing his knowledge of vocal technique as well as introducing new and exciting music. Also, on Sunday the 17th, he will lead a Hymn Festival at St. Timothy's. More information will be available about this opportunity soon!

OCTOBER: 7th Once again St. Timothy's will host the local ensemble "The Treble Clefs". An offshoot of the "Herndon Town Square Singers", the Treble Clefs will be with us for an evening of familiar favorites!

NOVEMBER: 3rd The "Hermitage Ensemble" of St. Petersburg, Russia will perform a concert of Russian Orthodox and traditional a capella music at St. Timothy's.

DECEMBER: 9th The "VOCE" Ensemble will perform their concert, "Christmas in The Americas".

Again, I want to encourage everyone to take part in these fantastic opportunities. As Director of Music, I feel privileged to be able to host such a talented group of performers this year and hope you will all take time to come out and experience them all.

Our Tracker Organ Is Well Known

One Friday in late June I had a providential meeting with the two organ curators at the Washington National Cathedral. I had arrived early for an Ordination rehearsal, so I wandered into the great choir area. I was admiring the magnificent carved stone and wood when I noticed two men working on the organ; I introduced myself, "Hello, my name is Brad." They gave their names and we shook hands. Then one of them asked me, "And where is your Church?" I responded "St. Timothy's in Herndon." Their jaws dropped. Then one of them asked, "Do you still have that old Tracker organ?"

Both of these men, I discovered, had worked on our Tracker organ in the 80's, and they quickly offered their expert opinion. From their perspective as musicians and technicians they declared, "It is a very difficult and limited instrument. It doesn't compare well even to similar size organs by other makers. The foot pedals are in an uncharacteristic parallel configuration making those toward the outside very hard to reach. There are no couplers or presets, which means every change in sound (voice) is very complicated. It has a limited number of voices and is not expandable. And it's placement in the Sanctuary (i.e., in a pit so the organist is below floor level with his/her back to the choir) is completely untenable." In summation one said, "It's an interesting historical instrument, but it's an organist's nightmare." The other man nodded in agreement. They both looked apologetic.

I've heard similar comments from several other sourc-

es - guest and interim organists, organists we interviewed in our search for Peter, and even our previous organist. It certainly isn't what I want to hear, but I understand it is the truth. Moreover, we are finding that the cost of maintaining and repairing the Tracker is growing, dramatically.

An organ committee was created about a year ago to study this dilemma. The committee members have learned a great deal about our instrument, and about organs in general. We have visited other organs, and talked with organ makers. We have explored every option we can see, assessing the pluses and minuses of (1) renovation, (2) replacement with a used instrument, (3) replacement with a new organ – digital, hybrid (electronic and pipe combination), and pipe. We are still studying.

However, the honest truth is thus far all our research points in the same direction. We are going to have to replace our 1870 Tracker organ, and we believe a new pipe organ is the best solution. This is the most expensive course initially, but a new pipe organ would last many decades longer than a new electronic or hybrid, and cost less to maintain than a used instrument. Digital or partially digital instruments are plagued with rapid obsolescence (like computers). A new pipe organ could also be made with a detached console so the organ would fit in "the pit", and the console could be situated to allow our organist to direct the choir.

The Organ Committee expects to present all our findings and make a recommendation to the Vestry by this Fall. Please keep this very important project in your prayers.

The Our Little Roses Story

In Honduras where the plight of abused and abandoned girls was once ignored, the ministry of Our Little Roses home has become an oasis of hope and opportunity for the girl child at risk. This is important because uneducated girls with no skills have little to no opportunities to escape poverty level circumstances. Poverty produces abusive situations for many pre- adolescent girls who are deprived of an education by being kept home to take care of younger siblings, with no adult supervision or oversight. There is no other institution in Honduras dedicated to building lives, preparing and equipping once homeless girls to enter and supporting them in the middle class society.

The sense of family at Our Little Roses sustains all the girls, who are active in church. At Our Little Roses Homes, every girl is given not only shelter but education and love. Uniforms and school fees are provided, and a staff of teachers helps newly-arrived girls catch up with their peers. With a firm foundation in education and the support of a loving environment these girls will grow into educated young women contributing to society in a positive way and breaking the chain of poverty and oppression.

Accompanying Mike were his children Janelle and Stephen, Chris Brock, Tim and Ruth Ellen Coffey, Paul Conroy and Jay Lawalt. The team stayed in a brand new facility used to house out-of-town volunteers, which was built by a number of charities serving Charlotte County, including Habitat. The team began work on Monday, July 10th. Upon their arrival at the site, the team found that the slab had been poured, and the outside wall frames had been constructed by a previous team, but they had not been erected. The team worked about seven hours a day for five days straight under the direction of a Habitat construction supervisor and two carpenters. Everyday, one or two volunteers or future Habitat homeowners would stop by to also help with the work. By the end of Friday, the walls were erected and covered with exterior pressboard. All the metal hurricane strapping (which was significant) was in place. The trusses were erected and the roof pressboard was nailed down. Also, all the interior wall framing was constructed and erected. The three-bedroom house is one of seven under construction in the Port Charlotte area and will be completed in the coming months. The team worked very hard and the Habitat supervisor said he had seen teams of 30 people who had not accomplished as much as St. Timothy's team did in one week. The team was well pleased with its accomplishments, and except for a few thumbs getting in the way of hammers, the team returned safely on July 16th.

While in Florida during its off-duty time, the team attended services at St. James the Less Episcopal Church, went to the beach, visited the landing site of Ponce de Leon, went dolphin watching, had a low-country boil at the home of a Habitat board member, rode on go-carts, and went on the Habitat Volunteer Coordinator's boat on the Peace River looking for alligators, but did not see any. The team was also featured in an article in the local Charlotte Herald-Tribune newspaper.

The team thanks all who supported this mission and prayed for its success. They also give thanks to the Lord for this opportunity to serve, and for allowing their safe return. The team wishes to thank publicly Mike Colie for his leadership and hard work, both in Florida and in organizing this trip. Please let any of the team members know if you might be interested in joining St. Timothy's Habitat Team in 2007. We are also looking for suggestions for the 2007 destination, and as usual, donations to get the next team started are always welcomed.
