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The summer is almost gone and life in this area will soon jump into high gear. For the next nine months we will be racing from one thing to the next, barely connecting with the most important people in our lives – including ourselves – and barely connecting with God. And we know (because we've all done this) that there is a price to pay, including feelings of loneliness, depression, burn-out, difficulty sleeping, and a longing for serenity. We need to pay attention to our soul.

Check in with yourself, run a body scan. Start with your toes and work your way up to the top of your head. Notice the tension you load in various areas. Tighten those muscles for ten seconds, then release for ten seconds; repeat this simple exercise until the tension melts away; match your breathing to the rhythm of tightening and releasing. And imagine God's Spirit moving into your body, imagine healing light entering your feet and moving up your body, filling you with peace (you can start at the top of your head and work your way down if you prefer).

Eat slowly and actually taste what you're eating. Feel your stomach; stop when you've had enough.

Listen to music, but choose the kind that relaxes you. Or just turn everything off (pc, tv, radio, ipod, etc.).

Resist the compulsion to race through your day. Take short breaks from your work several times a day. Take a walk. Notice nature. Breathe deeply. Say a silent "Thank you God" for every good thing, for the good people in your life. Drink less caffeine.

Create time to sit and talk with the people who are important to you. Skip the superficial conversation; ask them about their dreams, their hopes for themselves and the world, their faith. Don't anticipate what you will say; just listen.

Sit with God too. Say whatever you want to say, then just be quiet. God is with you, always, even when you don't sense God's presence.

Don't think of St. Timothy's as just another place that drains you. Give what you can – no more and no less. Think of the ministries as opportunities to help other people, the annual fund campaign and capital campaign as opportunities to share your financial blessings, and Sunday morning as your time to connect with God. Very simply, in our worship we receive the

love of God, and we give our love to God.

Remember that you are precious and unique. When you doubt that, read the Gospel stories about Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection. You are of ultimate value to God. Take care of your body, your mind, your spirit. Make your physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual health your highest priority.

Slow down. Take it easy. Live and enjoy your life, and the people who love you.

The General Convention of the Episcopal Church

Delegates from every Diocese of the Episcopal Church meet every three years. And it is anticipated that the 2012 General Convention will approve liturgy for same gender blessing. No Priest will be required to officiate at a same-sex blessing, but those who believe this is right, and have the permission of their Bishop, will likely have an approved liturgy after the

General Convention in the summer of 2012. In this Diocese same gender blessings will only be conducted if the Vestry and congregation are supportive.

Homosexuality in the Bible

The Episcopal Church has been discussing this for decades, particularly with regard to passages in the Bible that address this subject. The relevant texts are Genesis 19:1-14 (the sin of Sodom), Leviticus 18:22

and 20:13 (male to male sexual intercourse is explicitly forbidden), Romans 1:18-32 (unnatural sexual practices are condemned), 1st Corinthians 6:9-11 (homosexual lust is condemned) and 1st Timothy 1:8-11 (which talks about sexual pervers). As we study these and determine who wrote them, when they were written, to whom they were written and why, we must also consider why we completely ignore other Biblical passages like the injunctions against eating shellfish and pork, admonitions in Exodus 21:17 to kill those who curse their parents, and the teaching of Jesus on divorce and remarriage. Why do we accept some passages of Holy Scripture as true, and dismiss others?

The Historical Context

Beginning with the migration of the former slaves of Egypt and their encounter with other tribes and other faiths, the people of the Exodus had two very significant concerns. (1) The people they met (Amorites, Hit-

tites, Jebusites, Perrizites, Canaanites, etc.) had their own religions, their own gods and goddesses; they did not worship Yahweh, the “One True God.”

In addition, the gods and goddesses whom the residents believed most powerful controlled fertility of the land, of herd animals, and of humans. Of course each tribe had to be successful in gathering or cultivating crops, breeding herd animals, and producing offspring, or they would perish. So the various tribes prayed to these gods and goddesses, made sacrifices (of food, animals, and people), and practiced rituals to appease their deities. The rituals included sexual acts to excite the gods and goddesses to bless the people and make them fertile. The Jewish people took very strong exception to these "false religions" and to the sexual rituals (orgies) the believers practiced. The Jewish people considered these an "abomination."

(2) The people of God, the Hebrews, also encountered a widely practiced Greco-Roman institution called pederasty (from which we get the word "pedophile"). It was customary throughout the ancient Middle East for fathers to give their young sons to another man who would train them in a skill (like carpentry or masonry). And it was understood that these teachers or mentors would have a sexual relationship with the young boys in their charge. The Jewish people took strong exception to this practice, believing instead that a father should teach his own son(s), and that adults having sex with children is abhorrent.

Adult homosexuality - erotic and romantic love between two men or two women - was fairly common and socially acceptable in the ancient Middle East. Most Biblical scholars agree that Old and New Testament passages about "homosexuality" actually denounce false religions (false gods and goddesses), indiscriminate sexual practices (religious prostitution and orgiastic rituals), and pedophilia (sex between adults and children) – not love between two men or two women. The Gospels do not record Jesus saying anything about homosexuality.

We understand that some people are attracted to their own gender, that orientation is not a choice. So, we must ponder, can two men love each other, or two women love each other, even as a man and a woman

love each other? Can an intimate relationship between two women or two men be blessed? Can their love enrich the lives of the people around them? To what standards does our Creator hold all of us regarding our erotic desires and our yearning for love?

St. Tim's To Offer An Additional EfM Opportunity – Beginning in September with a school-year schedule, EfM (Education for Ministry) will meet weekly on Tuesday's from 9 am -12:30, co-mentored by Janet Koch and Rebecca Page. A new class will meet Sunday Evenings from 6:00 – 9:30 pm. Keith Nelsen Stroud and Tim Lally will be co-mentoring this new group. Through study, prayer, and reflection, the EfM groups move toward a new understanding of the fullness of God's kingdom. In-class discussion and guided reflection provide us with an opportunity to deepen our understanding of the reading materials. More important is the development of skills in theological reflection. The goal is to learn to think theologically. By examining our own beliefs, participants can learn what it means to be effective ministers in the world. St. Tim's currently offers EfM with a calendar year schedule that

meets on Tuesday morning and will reconvene after our summer hiatus on September 6. Additionally, the new class will meet on Sunday evenings from 6:00 to 8:30 pm in room B1. 
