As we observe daylight waning, leaves turning, and the temperature falling – the changing of seasons – our thoughts shift as well to God's providence. Celebrated quite deliberately on Thanksgiving Day, we are mindful of God's generosity day in and day out, throughout the year, our whole life long. God gives us life, people to care for us, a home, food, education, freedom, wonders and gifts, challenges and opportunities, the support of the saints and the Holy Spirit, forgiveness for our failures, grace, our Savior Jesus Christ, the promise of eternal life – blessings too numerous to count. And we are grateful! As we recall our Sovereign's continual providence our hearts and minds swell with thankfulness. We are blessed!

I can't think of anything more important than recognizing God's generosity, and making a pledge to share this generosity with others.

And we want to express our thanks to God, which we do with prayers of thanksgiving, hymns of praise, acts of care for other people, and a pledge of God's bounty to the Church. In thanksgiving for all we have been given, we return a percentage of our time, talent, and treasure to promote, share, extend the love of God in this community and the world.

Each fall – in light of all we have been given - we are asked to consider what we can give to the work of God through the Church. Your pledge, your return gifts, insure meeting spaces for people who suffer with addictions, instruction and support for parents through the county's Nurturing Parent program, a wonderful preschool, Sunday School classes and children's chapel, a place for Boy Scouts to assemble, pastoral care for members and non-members, clergy to counsel and assist anyone seeking help, worship, adult Christian education, outreach near and far, guidance for our youth, ministry planning sessions and resources, practical education for seminarians, and much more. The love of God reaches people through our offerings.

I can't think of anything more important than recognizing God's generosity, and making a pledge to share this generosity with others. For our own spiritual wellbeing, we need to pause and consider all that God has given us, and return a fare share in thanksgiving.

What Do 9 Do With My Hands?

Look both ways and hold hands when you cross the street. Idle hands are the devils playground. A hand up, not a hand out. Do you know these sayings? It seems that what we do, or don't do, with our hands makes a statement about us. What are your favorite activities? What helps you relax? What brings peace into your life? I bet the answer to these questions is also the answer to this one: *What do you do with your hands?* 

A few Sunday's ago (the Sunday where we heard about the dishonest manager who got praised for being crafty— remember that confusing story!), the reading from first Timothy contained this line: "I desire, then that in every place, people should pray, lifting up holy hands without anger or argument." Do you think of your hands as holy? I bet the first time you held your son or daughter your hands felt holy. What about the first time you grew something in the garden or when you wrote your name for the first time—both

times of holy hands. What about taking the bread at the Eucharist—a time when your hands and mine are holy.

As we enter the fall, we enter the stewardship season. St. Timothy's has begun asking you, What do vou do with vour hands? How do you give back to God? Do you use your hands to plant flowers in front of the church or by the outside chapel? Do you use your hands to make dinner for the Nurturing Parent program? Do you help the tiny hands among us learn the story of Jesus in

### Let's Pause to Reflect ...

Stewardship may mean the every-member canvass and the fall pledge drive for next year's budget. Someone else might think of stewardship as setting aside a percentage of our income for the Sunday offering. Even more Important than our definition is our motivation. Do we give out of a guilty sense of obligation to the Church or to God, afraid that — if we don't — we're subject to judgment? Or do we allow ourselves to become so filled with the love of Jesus Christ that our hearts simply spill forth with joy and thanksgiving?

As we begin our 2005 stewardship campaign, let us consider that stewardship is nothing less than the end result of having a relationship with Christ. Good stewardship practices are clear, demonstrable indications of what kind of relationship we have with Jesus. Paul offers this explanation In his letter to the Colossians, "As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established In the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving" (Colossians 2:6-7). Paul understood where the strength for our stewardship must come from. When we allow the love of Jesus to permeate our beings, effective stewardship is able to take root. We are able to give from hearts so filled with thanksgiving that our giving becomes an extension of God's love to the world around us. Stewardship isn't meant to be a chore or drudgery. It's meant to be a joy-filled response to our relationship with our Lord Jesus Christ. So when you fill out your pledge card, consult him in prayer, ask for his guidance and thank him for the way he manifests himself in your life.

Watch for your yellow 2005 pledge cards to arrive in the mail soon. We really need to hear back from you promptly this year. The accuracy of our budgeting for next year depends on an indication from each parishioner family as to the amount of weekly or monthly giving intended. We understand that this is not an iron-clad commitment and you will not receive payment overdue notices from the business office. But it is vital that we get a reasonable indication from you before November. Remember that we are able to adjust your pledge at any point during the year.

The information you place on the card is confidential. The office staff records the amounts on the individual cards and forwards the aggregate totals of the number pledging and the total amount of the pledges to the Finance Ministry, whose task it is to formulate a budget to propose to the vestry in December. Projected expenses must be adjusted so as not to exceed projected income. Imagine doing this with your household budget and not knowing how much money you expect to deposit in your checking account each week or month. We can proceed on faith and with much prayer, but we believe the Lord expects each of us to do our best to help.

We have had to do some trimming this year that has resulted in fewer mission accomplishments than we had budgeted for, that would have been avoided had we had a more accurate projection of income. Please pray that you will be lead by God to respond to the letter by returning your pledge card promptly when you receive it.

We thank God for your participation in our community of worship here. May God continue to bless you and those around you as you share God's love and the story of the many blessings you continue to receive. We constantly pray that St. Timothy's is being used to the fullness that God intends here in this area, and the accounts we receive from many in the community are evidence that our prayers are being answered. St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Herndon, Virginia is growing in the grace of God!

As always, your comments to clergy, vestry members or members of our various ministries are welcome. While this particular plea only concerns the "treasure" aspect of rendering to God what is God's, we recognize the many gifts of much time and considerable talent our parishioners also share here. We are truly blessed of God!

St. Timothy's, through both the Service Ministry and Youth Group, has continued to support this ministry. Over the years the Jr. High has taken pride in providing its volunteers on the Saturdays St. Tim's has been assigned. We ask parents and those in Jr. High to continue to sign up. Parents typically help out and function as chaperones during these Saturday sessions.

"Oh, so you are the Steward of Creation for your church? What does that mean?" "Hmm, doesn't that conflict with the Bible's teachings that man has dominion over all Creation and the right to use its resources as he wishes."

To say the least, I was very dismayed at the lack of understanding of the overall picture in caring for God's creation. I was even more dismayed that this same individual had not focused on or "seen" the many, and beautiful, passages that highlight our responsibility as Stewards to care for God's Creation. Perhaps they should visit the Environmental Stewardship Commission's site at <a href="http://www.env-steward.com/worship/hymns.htm">http://www.env-steward.com/worship/hymns.htm</a>. The Diocese of Minnesota has put together a wonderful list of music and hymns that celebrate God's Creation and the natural world around us.

Our liturgy is rich with references to God's Creation. Here is a wonderful Collect from a New Zealand Prayer Book: "God of unchangeable power, when you fashioned the world the morning stars sang together and the host of heaven shouted for joy; open our eyes to the wonders of creation and teach us to use all things for good, to the honor of your glorious name; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

What's the point? It is our Christian responsibility to protect and care for Creation and to allow future generations of Stewards to marvel at the wonders of Creation.
